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The most important step in doing anything significant is to find a reason for doing it. Motivation is the hardest thing to find both in school and in life generally. A long term goal, such as a good job, or a good result after a year's work, is perfectly reasonable, but it is not really urgent enough to provoke a consistently strong effort throughout the year. Competition and friendly rivalries between students of similar ability is one of the best ways to produce high quality performances consistently.

There is a tendency to resist streaming of classes, because of the possibility of feelings of inferiority developing in pupils with low ability. The positive effect, that of giving students competition of their own ability, and thus incentive to improve their work, is often thought to be effective only in certain groups of students. As with any other aspect of psychology, the effect of streaming is entirely a matter of attitude.

If Hutchins has a worthwhile goal, it is to create an atmosphere in which learning becomes a pleasant experience, and where every student is always voluntarily stretching his own ability. When students leave school, they will enter a world where they must find their niche, and discrimination is an important aspect of everyday life. The word 'discrimination' unfortunately carries undesirable connotations, but its original meaning, that of learning the differences between people, is something desirable in a school. Hutchins is a group of a thousand individuals, with individual potentials and talents, all of which should be recognised and understood. This means that to be fully successful, a thousand different people should grow in a thousand different ways each day, which is, of course, a daunting task. Life is a competition, and the best way to prepare for it is to compete at school, providing that the school can provide the right sort of competition.

For now, though, it's the end of another year, even shorter than the last, and this year's competitors can take a well-earned rest, and hopefully enjoy reading their 1989 school magazine.

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE HEADMASTER



SOME VARIED QUESTIONS AND SOME FRANK ANSWERS

How do you see the future of independent schools like Hutchins in Tasmania? In an economy as fragile as Tasmania's and with the school age population decreasing any school will have to be energetic and forthright in its determination to achieve its aims and objectives. Governments will have to be prepared to protect the rights of parents to choose the sort of school they judge best for their children, by providing an equitable return to parents for the taxes they pay. Equity should not be compromised by the choice of school. If Hutchins is vigorous in its pursuit of excellence and Governments enable justice for all parents, then it will continue to prosper.

With the large number of new buildings on the Campus, what further facilities does the school need? The recently completed Resources Development Plan was seen by the Board of Management to provide a platform upon which a Master Development Plan can now be based. The substance of that plan will be devised as a result of visits and research I will do when I go overseas on Study Leave in 1992. In the meantime, the Science Block needs refurbishment, I would love to provide proper student common rooms and offices for the Prefects and the SRC to develop student management even further in the school, and an indoor sports centre incorporating the swimming pool would be wonderful. The school is unlikely to have the resources for such projects for some time yet. Frankly I think we have cause to be grateful for what we have at the moment. There are a lot of schools less fortunate.

If a haemophiliac boy infected with HIV through blood transfusion applied to enter the school, what would you do?

Admit him without question, and expect the support of the school for him.

Is Hutchins like the school in "Dead Poets 'Society" in that it promotes conformity and conservatism? A school which has a slightly conservative context, as opposed to being reactionary, provides a buffer against every fad and trend of incessant change. This allows truly intellectual radicalism to develop, as opposed to mere adolescent rebellion. A radical, individualistic view of the world stems from a deep sense of one's stake in one's own future - a firm belief in one's personal accountability.



Boys who cling to the rituals of fashion or lifestyle are merely conforming. It is worth noting that some of the most radical and challenging women of Australian history have been products of conservative single sex airls' schools, particularly Catholic convents. They developed a real sense of "self" in those environments. That was the message of Mr. Keating in the film. He made the point strongly that one "should suck the marrow out of life" but not choke on the bones.

Earlier this year, you said you would name teasers and bullies in Assembly. Have there been none?

I stressed that if, in the opinion of other students and staff, an individual persisted in such destructive behaviour over a period of time, then I would hold him publicly accountable for the damage he was doing to the corporate life of the school. I stand by that. Fortunately I have not judged it to be necessary. We all hope it never will be.

We progress as we must, and with us we take memories of the past. A new decade is on our doorstep, and although only significant as a period of time, it will nevertheless prove a new era for Hutchins. The increasing uncertainty with which we look at our future both nationally and globally has at last begun to take effect in the lives of the students.

From the students' own initiatives, I have seen a new awareness developing. The SRC's resource conservation programme and the paper recycling in the computer room are but two examples. This, combined with a greater interest in outdoor activities, is evidence of the growing environmental responsibility at Hutchins.

For this responsibility to continue, we must ensure that Hutchins remains a compassionate school, for without compassion, inspiration is lost through fear of rejection. I have found the school to be a most compassionate place this year, with students from throughout the school showing a friendly and interested attitude towards me and towards each other. This attitude must continue to be encouraged, for without it, Hutchins cannot remain an outstanding institution.

Hutchins is an outstanding institution, and its successes this year are evident. From Academia to Sport, both individuals and teams, the school continues to dominate the field.

The SRC and CRC have played an increasingly important role and will hopefully continue to do so, after the temporary departure of Mr. Peter Carey. Mr. Carey's commitment to the SRC and student activities has been of huge benefit to the school. Mr. Carey's place is to be filled by Mr. Sprod, and I wish them both well for the future.

To next year's students and prefects, I would like to leave this thought. The school is an intricate system, and each of you is important to this system. Every move you make and every word you speak will affect this system. It is up to each one of you to determine the future of this system. I know you are capable of making the school a kind and compassionate place to learn at, and I am sure that you will. Finally, I must offer my thanks to Mr. Bednall for his friendship and guidance. To Mr. Smith, who has kept the whole prefect body in tune, I say farewell and thank you for your support throughout the year. And

to the leavers of 1989 especially, I thank you for making this year the pleasure it has been. At the end of a major part of our lives, ponder this thought: "Let the intermediate ends be warrantable, the ultimate end worthy." Let us all make our lives worthwhile!

SECRETARY & TREASURER'S REPORT

1989 has been and will be the year to remember for the Hutchins S.R.C. This year the foundations for a truly strong example of Student School Management Programme have been laid down. The work of previous S.R.C.'s is at last truly bearing fruit as the body of students involved has expanded and their influence on the running of the school greatly increased.

The number of students involved this year in all aspects of the S.R.C. has been quite outstanding. The general student input now covers effectively Grades 5 to 12. However, student representatives are only one aspect of the Student Council.

Additionally, the S.R.C. is comprised of many Sub-Committees beyond the Executive. These subcommittees carry out many useful activities both within the School and in the general community. Included in this S.R.C. report are individual reports from the leaders, or co-ordinating officers of the sub committees. It is useful however to have a general overview of the activities of these committees,

The Social Committee, led by Dominic Rea, is assigned with the task of co-ordinating social activities as well as liaising with the Social organisers of other schools. During the year, five Grade 7 and 8 discos were held; two Grade 9 and 10; two Grade 6; and one Grade 11 and 12 Informal Formal. All socials were successful - they being a significant money earner for the S.R.C.

The Activities Committee is assigned with co-ordinating various activities both within the School as well as in the extra curriculum. Led by Simon Willcox, it has supplied lunch time sporting equipment for the Middle and Senior Schools and has held tug-of-war competitions throughout the School. Finally, this body has been a significant contributor to the organisation of the various Southport Camps held throughout the year.

The Welfare Committee is one of the most significant new bodies within the School. It is responsible for many different examples of improving the general climate of the school. This committee is subdivided into many various groups, these being:

(i) The Be-Friender Group, co-ordinated by Phillip Lipscombe, which involves Senior students participating in the lunch time activities of the Junior School. During the year there were about 28 consistent Senior students involved in this, with some tripping down to the Junior School up to 3 times per week. An additional highlight of the Be-Friender Group was the camp held at Southport for selected boys from Grades 6, 7 and 8;

(ii) The Peer Leadership Group, which is primarily aimed at anti-smoking campaigns. Senior students conduct informal classes with Middle School boys with the aim of creating a relaxed, pleasant atmosphere in which to advise the boys. Thanks must go to Scott Latham for his leadership in this area as well as other service students involved:

(iii) Junior School and Middle School service is aimed at those students involved providing help for the teachers, essentially acting as teachers aides. It extends through many grades and has been extremely successful throughout the year;

(iv) The final group of the Welfare Committee are the Student Liaison Officers. These Senior students were charged with the responsibility of assisting certain students in their academic studies. This provides a very crucial service as, in many cases, assistance is better coming from a student rather than a teacher.

A final committee of the S.R.C. is the Curriculum Review Committee. This is a long established body which this year has had many achievements. Some of these include: the abolition of athletics standards in the Senior School; establishment of a Working Party into the reviewing of Religious Education; many voluntary education programmes were also undertaken with as many as 318 people having completed the various courses.

Other important activities of the S.R.C. have been: the Career Talks Evenings organised by James Downie; and the establishment of a Resources Programme headed by Edward Fader which is aimed at such things as energy efficiency around the School.

Essentially the S.R.C. has had a very productive year. The various bodies of the Council are now established and their running has set a precedent for future council members.

THE PEER LEADERSHIP GROUP

The Peer Leadership Group is a programme of antismoking education for Grade 7's and is conducted by Senior boys (Grade 11 & 12's). The programme has 9 x 1 hour sessions and deals with three main areas; pressure to smoke, the effects of smoking, and the traps of advertising.

As in 1988, the programme proved highly successful, this time operating all year and reaching all Grade 7 boys. The Peer Leaders, who had attended a vigorous three day training course, handled the situation well, largely because we had decided that the scheme had to be more than just telling younger boys why they

shouldn't smoke. The secret of the group's success is that it is primarily about making friends and discussing issues, and not merely the dissemination of information. We deliberately avoided any sense of a normal classroom environment; we were there as friends, not as instructors.

THE BE-FRIENDER GROUP

It is now nearly three years since the original formation of the Be-Friender Group, a programme which has consistently proved its value to the school as a whole. This year, the scheme continues to be dynamic, with 40 H.S.C. students regularly (at least once a week) spending their lunch period down in the play areas of the Junior School, not as police-

JUNIOR AND MIDDLE SCHOOL SERVICE

One group which particularly benefitted from a camp there was some men and women from the Walkabout Workshop who accompanied 13 senior students and 2 teachers for three days. During the camp the clients participated in many activities which I am pleased to report they, and we, enjoyed very much.

In term two, a Be-Friender Camp was run by Activities Officer of the S.R.C., Simon Willcox. This camp was also a great success and bonded many friendships between the younger boys. It also helped strengthen ties between the Junior and Senior boys within the School.

The final, and major, camp or the year was held in term three for a group from the Walkabout Workshops (as previously mentioned). This is the second successive year we have attempted this camp and many people will remember the success of last year's camp or Orford.

As well as the camps we have managed to perform some of the traditional activities which are religiously undertaken by the S.R.C. each year, including yet another record breaking year for the 40-Hour Famine, which I understand brought in well over \$2,500. Numerous Door-Knocks for organisations such as the Retarded Citizens' Welfare Association and Freedom from Hunger were successfully undertaken. Lunchtime sports equipment and games were purchased and rostered out by the S.R.C. representatives. As always, the scheme has been overseen by Mr. Peter Carey whose dedication and



hard work has ensured not only success with the projects, but a willingness to be involved by students outside the S.R.C. We thank him sincerely for his unfailing support and co-operation.

THE CURRICULUM REVIEW COMMITTEE

The CRC is nominally a Sub-Committee of the SRC, but enjoys a freedom from central contact that allows it to be a particularly effective way of expressing student concerns. Unlike the SRC itself, the CRC rarely goes in for high profile projects, but works patiently and quietly behind the scenes to influence educational priorities within the School.

This year we built significantly on the social foundations laid for the CRC by last year's varied and highly successful programme. Among the projects continued or newly established are a thriving Clubs and Societies Sub-Committee (which assists in the management of 12 student-based clubs), the Values Working Party into R.E., and the Voluntary Education Programmes, which the CRC co-ordinates. We also succeeded in negotiating a resolution to the problems surrounding Athletics Standards and a whole host of specific issues relating to exams, courses, classes and teachers.

1989 was, in conclusion, one of the CRC's most successful years to date, and the 1989 Executive would like to thank all the subject teachers who attended our meetings to help resolve issues and especially Mr. Bednall and the Director of Studies, Mr. Morton, for always being willing to listen to the ideas and problems of students and to help resolve them.

One of the main reasons for its success was the fact that Collegiate and Hutchins students could invite a partner of their choice. This meant that the function played host to a wide range of students from different schools.

S.R.C. STUDENT CAREERS OFFICER

This year saw the first attempts by the S.R.C. to assist Senior students with the planning of careers, and to make the choices that confront all school leavers as easy and as safe as possible. The primary way this can be achieved is through the dissemination and availability of information, and as a result the school has produced its own Careers Handbook and has also erected a Job Vacancy Board and a panel of literature.

The Careers Handbook was perhaps the most important initiative, as it has filled an important gap in careers information available, by providing just the sort of information Hutchins graduates, in particular, require. The Handbook was produced entirely within the Office of Student Support Services, and is a veritable mine of useful information on job applications, résumés, and inter-

view techniques, as well as job descriptions from over 150 employers from Tasmania and interstate. This now forms a crucial and well used part of choosing a vocation at Hutchins, as all Grade 11 and 12's were offered a copy, and the Library is also stocked with 10 copies.

CAREERS PLANNING AT HUTCHINS

The transition between school and the workforce is never an easy one, and for many boys leaving school holds hopes, fears, and usually a sense of apprehension at the unknown ways ahead. To assist with this transition for school leavers and to help those planning tertiary education towards a Career path, the Student Support Services Office has run a variety of programmes.

As well as providing a resource base for the distribution of pamphlets on all manner of careers, courses and institutions, the Office also developed its own Careers Planning and Placement Handbook, giving advice on résumés and job applications, and with sections on specific jobs and information for both parents and students. This volume of some 150 pages should form an ideal reference work for Hutchins school leavers for some years.

A Careers Fair was also held, where representatives of specific employers, the professions and educational institutions set up stalls in the Auditorium and discussed matters with parents and sons. This concept again, as in 1988, proved to be highly effective and allowed for many boys to rationalise their future objectives. Mr. Carey also organised courses for boys leaving school to learn interview and job application techniques and assisted many boys in their searches for information on a course or job they were interested in. The Hutchins Employment agency gave students access to employment opportunities before leaving the school.

Mr. Stevens continues to run a successful programme of Work Experience for Senior school boys, which links well with the services provided by the Student Support Services Office. The regular information sessions and job interview sessions organized by Mr. Carey and conducted by employers were popular and informative, some leading to job offers.

Hopefully these and other initiatives in the future will help making decisions about his future less daunting for a student at Hutchins.

DEBATING

This year has been one of the most successful in some time for debating at Hutchins, with highly successful teams in all three divisions, especially following the mediocre season of 1988. 1989 was the first year of an expanded and re-organised roster system, involving a much larger number of teams. Some participating schools felt the season was too long and large, but Hutchins still had boys who missed out on debates. Nearly 400 debaters were involved in the competition with nearly 80 from Hutchins. This added to the organisational difficulties but, largely thanks to Mr McQueen, the season and all our 14 rounds of hosting passed largely without a hitch.

Our teams performed strongly at all levels and particularly those teams with some degree of experience. At the Junior level our 6 teams were all consistently competitive and performed at a high level. The Junior A's made the semi-finals via a repechage and were unlucky to lose their semi in a split decision by the three adjudicators. Similarly, our Intermediate A's narrowly missed a berth in the final

series, It was in the Senior section however that our debaters really came to the fore. Out of four divisions Hutchins won two and came second in two others, putting 2 teams through to the finals series. Unfortunately, they drew each other in the semi-finals, which meant one team had to be knocked out. After a close contest and six wonderful speeches witnessed by nearly 100 people, the team of Scott Davidson, Tim Lyons and Nick Brodribb triumphed over Mark Bell, Scott Latham and David Sims. This team then beat Dominic in the final, giving the team a perfect record of wins for the season and also registering our Fourth Senior Premiership in 10 years, a record which surpasses that of any other school.

Particular mention must be made of some of our less experienced teams at all levels, who gained reputations for beating teams with far more experience, especially among our younger debaters this augers well for our fifth and subsequent Senior victories.

Hutchins boys also entered several speaking contests. Tim Lyons entered and won the Lions National Youth of the Year quest and the Jaycee's Youth Speaks for Australia State Final.

The Literary and Debating Society also ran several events which are now becoming traditional, including an HSC debaters' camp with Collegiate, a series of Oxford debates and a Debaters' Dinner. Senior members of the Society have also worked as adjudicators for the Inter-School debates and the Middle School Impromptu Speaking.

Thanks must go to all the coaches and adjudicators who helped to make season 1989 such an unqualified success, and the I express my sincere hope that the Society continues its good form into 1990.

SCHOOL MUSICAL

The fact that this year's School Musical was about seven lively, healthy, young lads known for their fighting and lack of culture, all attempting to get a woman, may indicate that Hutchins boys are rapidly becoming type-cast. In reality though, this year's combined musical with Mt. Carmel, "Seven Brides for Seven Brothers", was a show that allowed a large number of our boys to show just how cultured they really are.

THE VOLUNTARY EDUCATION PROGRAMME

For a growing number of Hutchins students the question 'what time does school end?' no longer has a simple answer, as for many 3.35 p.m. is only the beginning of a whole host of other activities. As well as sport and House competitions and training there is a growing number of extra-curricular courses being offered under the collective banner of 'Voluntary Education Programme'. In total this year 18 courses have been offered, offen with Junior, Senior and Advanced variations and with two seasons during the year. This unprecedented rise in places available in courses has been precipitated by the interest shown by boys in these courses last year, and has allowed 316 boys



from Grades 7 to 12 to take part, many in more than one course. This is a remarkable effort, and means that roughly half the eligible boys have taken some course.

The courses were arranged by Mr. Carey and the Student Support Services Office and began in Week 2 of Term 1 and continued to the very end of the year. For the courses run by the School, special certificates have been printed to allow boys to receive a written qualification and any benefits they can from the courses with regard to employment.

This year, the old favourite courses were run again such as First Aid, Cookery, Defensive Driving, Mechanics, Weapons Safety and Leadership Training, as well as a variety of new courses never before offered at Hutchins. This included Esperanto (the international language), Scuba Diving, Shorthand, Yachting, Word Processing and Typing, some of which involved certification to an internationally recognised level.

All of these courses are important to the students' personal development, as well as providing a useful outlet for personal talents and interests and complementing the Life Skills. Duke of Edinburgh Award programmes and assistance in Career prospects. It is hoped that this extraordinarily high rate of participation can be continued into the future, and that even more boys will take part in these undoubtedly valuable programmes.

ACTIVITIES DAYS

This year, three Activities Days were held, 20th March, 1st August and 17th November. All were great successes with students selzing the opportunity to learn new skills and provide leadership. Many exciting and interesting activities were offered, ranging from House Sailing, Cricket, Tennis, and Surfing Competitions, Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Bushwalks and a Cartoon Drawing day through to a Japanese Cultural Day and the popular hot air ballooning. Boys spent their time learning intriguing chemical reactions or wading in a cold lake with a fishing rod. Thanks must go to all staff and parents who assisted in the smooth running of Activities Days and especially to Mr Chris Smith for all the effort he has put into making these interesting and educational days the success they have been over the past two years.

THE ADVENTURE CLUB

This year the Adventure Club has been fairly active with many caving trips and rock climbing after school. One of the main things the club has done this year has been the construction of a rock climbing wall in the gymnasium. This was constructed by Allan Adams of the Climbing Club of Tasmania towards the end of the September holidays. DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD SCHEME

Although 1988 was the best year for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award at Hutchins, with a record number of awards at all 3 levels, the successes still follow in 1989. A re-shuffle in the State Award Office saw a new regime taking control, committed, somewhat paradoxically, to reducing award numbers. Hutchins, being the State's largest and most successful operating group in the State, come in for immediate and sometimes over-intensive scrutiny. This has had the short term effect of slowing down our gold participants. It hasn't however, stopped our candidates; each new barrier appears only to have increased their determination. Our Bronze and Silver level candidates are still proceeding well.

At the end of first term, we made a breakthrough in assisting our School's input into the Scheme when Mr. Carey, Tim Lyons and Phillip Lipscombe were appointed to the Southern Regional Committee, which functions as the State governing body. Tim and Phillip have also been made members of the Expedition Advisory Panel. This input by 'Hutchins men' at a high level in the scheme's management has proved very useful in assisting our planning for the future.

The year began early for the Scheme, when we conducted a Gold training Expedition in January on the Central Plateau. Blessed by remarkably good weather which allowed swimming in the headwaters of the Mersey, the trip was run by an old friend of the Scheme at Hutchins, Mr. John Findlay, while two Gold Awardees tagged along to train as assessors. There has been a steady stream of expeditions throughout the year; at Gold level trips visited the Central Plateau, Mount Anne in winter, Mount Field, the South West and the East Coast. A final trip visited the Western Arthurs over Show weekend. Bronze and Silver trips have again visited a great variety of challenging areas. To further improve our camp skills at Bronze level, a snow training weekend, one day navigation courses and evening lectures were organised on all aspects of bush craft.

On behalf of all the participants in the scheme from Hutchins, I would like to record our gratitude for the work done by a number of people during the year; Mr. Calder and Mr. Clipstone, whose support with Bronze expeditions is invaluable and Mr. A. Hack, Mr. M. Bowden and Mr. J. Findlay for their time as assessors or trainers. Finally, thanks must go to Mr. Carey for his co-ordination of the Scheme. It was a life, but a hard life, being a Chicago aanaster back in those days. It was the sort of life that gave you fun, adventure and really wild parties during the day, and whores, casinos, machine guns and nightmares during the night. But it was my life. I was smart, and my father was Vincent Despore, Al's right hand man. I suppose you could say I was born into the profession, like a farmer's son will often become a farmer. I won't bore you with my life story though; I'm going to tell you a story that my father used to read to me when I was just a little kid, and before they found him at the bottom of the river.

Little Johnny was a small man, about four and a half feet if he was a centimetre. But for a small man he had a lot of guts, enough to go up directly against Capone. He ran guns, at a price cheaper than Capone's. To do this was a sure way to considerably shorten you life span, but only if you could be found, and little Johnny was a hard man to find, even in a city as small as Chicago. Being so small he could hide in the most extraordinary places and he was making a hell of a lot of money while staying on the run from Al's heavies.

Capone wasn't used to being denied. This is because he never was - as my daddy found out when he tried to take his Christmas bonus, without telling anyone, in July, and ended up taking a permanent Christmas vacation. But it couldn't be said that Capone wasn't imaginative. He loved sport, especially when it involved death, and he often devised amazingly entertaining games when he wanted to get rid of his foes. He was being denied by little Johnny and he had devised such a game for his death, a very extravagant game which Capone rated as one of his best.

Little Johnny was not captured by Capone, but by the police, which was almost the same thing. The police received handsome monetary benefits and little Johnny was handed over to Capone, who could now play his little game. And his little game was this: Little Johnny was brought into a room. It was a small room, the walls and ceiling were blue, the carpet was white, and there was a piano in one corner from which a light jazz tune was emanating. In each of the other corners was an attractive indoor plant. The plant and the plano were all done for effect; Al Capone was the master of effect. The only thing that caught your eye as you entered the room was the four doors situated on the far wall, one red, one blue, one green and one black.

The striking thing about these doors was that they were only about four and a half feet high, only tall enough for little Johnny to walk through comfortably. Capone explained this to little Johnny while my father aimed a Thompson sub-machine gun at the frontal lobe of his cerebal cortex. Capone then politely asked if little Johnny would like to undertake the test and little Johnny politely replied that he didn't have much choice. He spent a few moments pondering his decision and then cut a knife through the tension by instructing the old piano to start playing it hot as he was going to find our what was behind the green door.

He opened the door slowly and stepped into the room. Following instructions he recited the passage:

- What a lucky guess you did,
- What a lucky feller,
- You can go away now,
- and be a little aun seller."

Capone was never much of a writer; he dropped out of school at first grade. After he had finished the passage, a trap door opened and Johnny slid down it. On the way down he wondered why Al was being so generous and he came to the conclusion that he wasn't really surprised when he was knifed by a huge bodyguard as he walked out the door at the bottom.

I have often ruminated on this story while sitting in the small cell that I occupy in 'D' block. I now realise that Chicago gangsters must have been one of the most warped and twisted human species and we would have been a lot better off if they had been isolated in rooms with rubber walls at birth.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

This year saw quite a few structural changes to the Archives. Shelves have been added to store the large collection of old and valuable books, and access from the Ray Vincent Wing has been made available.

There have been a number of donation from friends and Old Boys. To note a few: a large leather bound Bible donated by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Burbury. The inside leaf has written "Martha Louise Buckland, March 31st 1860". Martha Buckland was the second eldest daughter of J. R. Buckland (First Headmaster), she married F. G. (Ginger) Howell, who taught mathematics at Hutchins until 1893. Other additions to the Archives include a scrapbook from the 1920's donated by Mr. W. S. Hannon and a set of photographs (1934-35) from Mr. E. Valentine.

There have been a number of requests for biography information throughout the year and the Museum has been a popular place of interest for visitors to the School.

Next year it is envisaged that an "Archives Club" will be initiated to ease the burden slightly for the Assistant Archivist. This year Phillip Lipscombe has been a valuable Assistant and has earned praise from a large number of visitors.

Plans are also under way to establish a secure Archives Section within the School for the safe storage of documents and ordered records management.

Towards the end of 1985, I decided that a year off would be a pleasant thing so I applied for a year's leave-without-pay. I was asked to postpone my leave. Mainly through my involvement with squash, I had already come to know some of the Grade 8 students of that year. I was very impressed by the pleasant enthusiastic manner of those boys so I took very little convincing to stay for 1986 as Year Group Master of the group.

A very pleasant camp finished 1985. I wonder do the individuals involved remember a teary bout of homesickness one morning or an earnest apology on behalf of the groups so that I wouldn't think the "Grade 8's were all ratbags". It is highly unlikely that one boy could have realized my trepidation as I supervised his skin-diving expedition as I had promised. Those rocks seemed terribly menacing. I kept seeing sharks.

No-one's perfect and 1986 saw some very serious problems: the boy who assured me that the packet of cigarettes which fell at my feet out of his blazer pocket were not his, for example. But, already, a mark was being made: a screening of a video-tape of a certain production of – "The Pirates of Penzance" is solid evidence. In the chorus scenes and the scenes with the policemen, the screen fills with enthusiastic Grade 9 faces. There were so many Grade 9 debaters that we had to make our own roster up. We experimented in theatre sports and I seem to remember reports of how talented, friendly and reliable the Grade 9's were in their academic and sporting pursuits, too. Play-On Tour ended the year. It is always fun. A slight mishap as lines were altered and the set collapsed at Launceston Church Grammar School but again it was fun. I recall a certain Torana in pieces on a back road into Richmond and some very sensible, constructive help from two members of the cast – both Grade 9's.

By the time I returned in 1988, the many programmes run by the SRC and the CRC were benefitting greatly from the input of that year's Grade 11's. Staff were making positive comments in all sorts of areas. There were some excellent results in HSC examinations of that year. Participation in all sorts of activities had again been excellent. Some staff were anxiously volunteering to be Grade 12 form masters. Suddenly, the final year was upon us. Many boys got the recognition they deserved, being made Prefects and sub-prefects and they spent this year leading the school in a thoroughly excellent manner. But I noticed others too: the boys who coached debating teams, the people who regularly volunteered to help with the ongoing action of debating evenings, the boys who were continually mentioned at assembly for being excellent sporting captains or organising successful camps for others to enjoy, those who undertook the thankless task of helping me to try to run an efficient Grade 12 Common Room, guest speaker organisers, House Drama producers, leaders in Burbury House and there are many I've missed – some I never even knew about, probably. It is not only what this Year Group has done but how they did it and the large percentage of them

who contributed so much.

So why is this a "Year Head's Lament"? Except for the silly little boys who wagged school or skipped class, I've had so few problems to deal with because of the positive, co-operative nature of this group, I've forgotten how and I lament the fact that I might have to learn it all over again.
