We reiterate our apology to these Old Boys and recognise the Royal Commission's identification of past failings by the School. The Royal Commission also found that the School's apology has contributed to the healing of Old Boys who suffered abuse in the 1960s and noted that The Hutchins School has policies and procedures in place to protect boys at the School.

I wish to conclude by returning to speak to the Class of 2015.

The pressures and concerns of examinations and assessments are over. This is our chance to acknowledge you all as good young men. I would also ask you to at some stage to pause and to thank your families and friends that have helped you during your time at Hutchins.

As Shakespeare's Henry V said:

From this day to the ending of the world, But we in it shall be remember'd; We happy few, we band of brothers (Act 4, Scene 3)

I ask you as a band of brothers to make the most of challenging, but at the same time exciting times. Such times are a test of character for all good men. HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Welcome to Virtus 2015

Academia

And what a year it has been!

We commenced 2015 elated that once again Hutchins students achieved outstanding recognition through their academic results. Congratulations to Gavin Yang for his perfect academic score of 99.95. This truly is an exceptional effort. Gavin achieved perfect scores in Year 11 and in Year 12 in Mathematics Methods, Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry and Music and for that we applaud him; I hope his achievement encourages others to strive to do likewise.

As a whole school Hutchins was strong in the national measure of academic achievement - the Australian Tertiary Admissions Ranking (ATAR). Almost 40% of Hutchins students achieved a score above 90.00 and one in four students scored 95 or more from a possible 99.95 score. This is an outstanding result and continues the trend of nationally successful academic outcomes of which The Hutchins School community is proud. On the basis of these results, if any school views itself as academically strong, then it should be prepared to stand shoulder to shoulder with The Hutchins School.

In particular I am pleased that almost all students achieved entry to their post school tertiary training destination and enjoyed their choice being realised. The Hutchins provision for Vocational Education and Training is extensive and I would like to recognise Nicholas Bonnitcha for his success this year as the winner of the VET in Schools Student of the Year Award 2015.

This year it was also a highlight to congratulate 2007 leaver, Harj Narulla on achieving the distinction of his award as a Rhodes Scholar, as The Hutchins School's 23rd Rhodes Scholar, we wish Harj well in studies at Oxford University where he will join Hutchins Rhodes Scholar and 2005 leaver, Sam Forbes. '...you have learned to be unafraid of being innovative and creative; you have understood the qualities worthy of being called a Good Man.'

Co Curricular Outcomes

The Class of 2015

To Year 12, the next generation of Hutchins men, I congratulate you on your energy, your maturity, your resilience and your willingness to simply do for others. I have expected much from your energetic and youthful qualities and have seen your responses to that challenge, and I urge you to inject our State, our Nation and our planet with those sorelyneeded attributes and the exercise of them in true leadership, first of yourself and then of others.

I prompt you to adopt a thought of gratitude for a fortunate life and a sense of thankfulness for opportunities with which you have been presented. Even with all its challenges, disappointments and frustrations, and with all its successes, triumphs and celebrations, a life lived in Australia, particularly in Tasmania, is a life lived with far more opportunities than billions of others on our planet cannot even know.

I realise that we often urge valedictorians to be true to themselves and in that exhortation there is merit. Challenging the next generation to know themselves by being true to their own words, actions and thoughts is indeed important.

But, I am not sure of the extent of the merit of that message alone to a Hutchins graduate. This quest to be true to oneself risks a vision of life that begins with self and ends with self. Too often that message is misinterpreted in a myopic framework that feeds the "I" and "me" and not the "us", and the "we".

So my message is that I ask you to consider the idea that the greater community good is based in exercising for life the foundations of the education you inculcated here at Hutchins: strength of character, confidence, compassion and a manly gentleness that exhibits personal control, self-belief, kindness and empathy towards others, personal integrity, humility and courageous determination.

But, in being true to yourself, do not find your future by asking, *what do I want from life*? For if you do, you then only become a consumer of life.

Your start at Hutchins has enabled a life littered with chances to develop new knowledge, new skills and greater personal understandings. As you move from School, the opportunity you now have in your possession, is to be able to pursue the gift of a life-long education and so take up the quest to improve life for others.

If you believe this, the accumulation of these opportunities can lead to greater wisdom, a wider world view and the capacity to do more, better, and for many more. If you do so you become a generator of life, not just a consumer of it. To do this you must ask two questions of yourself: What is life asking of me? And how can I match my talent with the world's needs?

So, my message is twofold and it is this: Do contemplate with gratitude the wonderful gift that The Hutchins School, our wonderful staff, and your parents and carers have given you and consider, what are the values you have adopted and that you will never negotiate away. Do contemplate what you may give to life? Do ask, "How can I use what I have that might complement the world's needs?" If you do this, as I see you leave the School for the last time, I can with a smile and a warm heart say to myself and others who ask about a Hutchins education, "Those are the people we want to be".

In his book, "The Moral Bucket List", David Brooks argues that ..."people on the road to inner light do not find their vocations by asking, what will life give me? They ask, what is life asking of me?" and that is my point.

Gentlemen, be outward looking and make the horizons of the world your gaze; do not be satisfied simply to narrow your view to yourself but expand your scope, thinking on your actions for a global world and take it on with all you know, and have learned here at Hutchins.

I urge you to take up the endless possibilities in this world to create a better life for as many as possible.

In a real sense you have already commenced this journey while at The Hutchins School. Keep going.

In Year 12, in the classroom with your peers and teachers you have learned much in content and in developing intellectual thinking skills; you have learned by academic and sporting success and failures; you have learned who you are becoming; you have learned to work with others and in teams; you have learned about being independent and accepting responsibility; you have learned to be unafraid of being innovative and creative; you have understood the qualities worthy of being called a Good Man.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

A significant part of the foundation we provide in building good men comes from encouraging boys to be spiritually engaged.

The Chaplaincy program at Hutchins supports the boys as they seek to work out what this means. As an Anglican school, commending and encouraging a Christian life, as a response to Jesus Christ, is our focus.

Chapel services at Hutchins occur according to age groups to engage effectively with boys at their developmental age and stage. Every service from Kindergarten through to Senior School seeks to build good men who, in being challenged to follow Jesus, are inspired to act with kindness, integrity, compassion, humility and courage.

To do this we draw out the relevance of the Bible for us living in the world of the 21st century.

Global awareness

Critical to this is maintaining a global awareness. Guest speakers and an ongoing connection with Cambodia serve this purpose. In 2015 guest speakers included David Boyd, Church Missionary Society - Congo and Lauren Jones, 2014 St Michael's Collegiate School leaver and youth ambassador for the Anglican Board of Mission– Papua New Guinea.

Since 2012 Hutchins has continued to grow its relationship with the school ministry of Abraham Hang in Cambodia. Abraham works establishing schools, community support projects and churches in two of the poorest areas of this country, which is one of the poorest countries in Asia.

Hutchins old boy, Mr Chris Bowditch ('02), visited the schools in 2015 in Cambodia and shared his observations with all boys at chapel services this year.

A group of Hutchins' staff provide a model of generosity to the boys, as they voluntarily give directly from their wages to pay the ongoing wages of two teachers at the school in the poor rural province of Oddar Meanchey.

Hutchins was able to provide funds from Senior School chapel donations and the

Junior School Lap-It-Up fundraising to contribute to purchasing a new vehicle for Abraham following an accident that left him injured and unable to travel between the two schools.

Generosity

Being generous to those with less than us is a tangible way to demonstrate kindness and compassion. Through the chaplaincy at Hutchins we encourage boys to become regular givers of their time, money and resources. During 2015 the boys gave generously to these groups: Cancer Council's Relay for Life, schools in Cambodia, World Vision's Forty Hour Famine, international needs, Uganda- Child sponsorships, Church Missionary Society (CMS) - Congo, Anglicare (Hobart), Anglican Aid - Nepal Emergency Appeal and Edmund Rice Camps.

Leadership teams

The Chaplaincy at Hutchins also provides the opportunity for a group of key boys to be intensively trained in Christian service. In 2015 the following boys were trained as leaders:

Junior School chapel leaders: Fraser Cumming, Harrison Jones, Sonny Pybus and Joshua Wiese.

Senior School chapel leaders: Joshua Summerfield (Chapel Warden), Samuel Jones, Alexander Murray and Ghislain Ndimanyi. Joshua and Alexander preached their first sermons in front of their Senior School peers. Both boys were superb in completing this daunting task.

All of these young, budding Christian leaders assist in organising and running chapels including contributing creative ideas to engage the student body. Plans are underway to formalise a similar system of student leadership in the Middle School chapel.

Baptisms and weddings

During 2015 it was a great privilege to baptise one infant of a family with Hutchins connections going back three generations. It was also with great joy that I was able to officiate at the weddings of three staff members.

Arrivals and departures

In 2015 we have seen the retirement of the Anglican Bishop of Tasmania, the Right Reverend John Harrower. Bishop John has been a regular visitor and great supporter of Hutchins throughout his tenure. Bishop John was farewelled by the School and the Tasmanian community at St David's Cathedral in September.

Hutchins has appointed Reverend Lee Weissel as School Chaplain to commence in January 2016, and return the School to having two chaplains.

It is with a sense of great thankfulness that I acknowledge the assistance of so many people who have helped in this busy year, as I have tried to fill the shoes of two chaplains. One example alone is the fifteen different people from inside and outside the Hutchins community who have eased the burden by preaching at chapels this year.

My very first experience in the Hutchins community was when I had a tour with Mr Barrie Irons around the School, six years ago in May 2009.

As a young Year 6 boy, what I remembered most about my tour with Mr Irons was his "smorgasbord" analogy: he said that life at Hutchins is like a party table, with all sorts of different foods and flavours on it. You might like some, you might not like others, but you'll never know what you're missing out on unless you give it a go. And so he challenged me to have a go at as much as possible and get involved in as many different areas of the School that I possibly could. So that's exactly what I did. And I loved it.

As time passed I began to notice the focus that Hutchins has on "building good men". So I decided that it should become my focus as well. I thought for a long time that building a good man was just like building a house. You make a design, you stick one stone on top of another and after a while, you have a finished product. So that's what I did. I made my design; I looked around me and I tried to figure out what the best way to fit into the model of a good man would be and then I did whatever I had to do to get there. I would often look to the School motto for guidance; I wanted my character to live on after death. But a point came when I realised that something was wrong. I realised I had confused being a good man with being

perfect. I had became so obsessed with leaving behind the perfect footprint that I totally missed the true meaning behind the School motto. It isn't about being perfect; it's about being true to yourself. The perfect footprint is one that can be found anywhere on a beach, regardless of who it came from. It's raw and unchanged and distinct to the individual – and that is what your character is: it's yours! You don't have to be perfect, you just have to be you. Being a good man is about being the best version of yourself that you can be.

My challenge to each of you is to have the courage to let your character grow freely. If you try and hold it too tightly, then it cannot grow, but if you let yourself be courageously authentic to who you are, then your character will grow and you will know joy, because the freedom in that is worth more than any amount of perfection. This was such an important lesson for me to learn (and I'm still learning it!) but what I found was that when I adopted this frame of mind, I was able to achieve more than I could have ever done otherwise.

We have an amazing opportunity for growth of our character because if the seed is in our heart then the fertiliser is in our home. Here in the Hutchins community we have the amazing support of a team of passionate staff who are committed to finding the best in each of us. Here in the Hutchins family we are given the opportunity to find our true character, to develop it and to strengthen it. And you will find, as I have, that as you immerse yourself in the life of this amazing school, your character will develop. It won't be easy at times, but when you venture beyond what is comfortable, when you throw yourself into the deep end and when you find the courage to be proud of who you are, then your seed of character will open and something truly awesome will grow out of it.

STRATEGIC PLAN 2016–2020

The Hutchins School Strategic Plan for 2012-2015 reaches completion at the end of the 2015 academic year. Reflecting on the Strategic Intents and Strategies set for 2012-2015, we look back with pride at our progress and achievements. We are confident that we have provided a strong foundation for the coming years, establishing the School as a leader for boys' education. In order to produce a comprehensive 2016-2020 Strategic Plan, Hutchins pursued accreditation with the internationally recognised Council of International Schools (CIS). Hutchins gained accreditation in October 2014 and received a comprehensive report with recommendations to bring Hutchins in line with international benchmarks across all sections of the School. This report and recommended actions was compiled by 11 high performing national and international CIS accreditors.

At the commencement of the process our goal was to create a Strategic Plan that will take us into the future and build upon our existing strong foundation. We included the CIS recommendations, and extended our previous model from three years to five to fall in line with the CIS re-accreditation phase.

As we look to the future and how strategic planning will define the School's growth for the next five years, we have the opportunity to plan in advance and earmark appropriate resources to pursue the overall educational, structural, governance and financial direction of the School to "Build Good Men".

Our first step was to refresh and review our Guiding Statements, as they uniquely state who we are and for what we stand. They lead all decision making in the School and are an important basis for informing the Strategic Plan. Another important step was to involve and consult with the extensive Hutchins community and key stakeholders. This included support and teaching staff, parents, students, Old Boys, Foundation Board and the School Board. The Hutchins School Strategic Plan 2016-2020 is a consolidation of the following resources; The Hutchins School Guiding Statements, The Hutchins School Strategic Plan 2012–2015, the 18 month CIS self-study, the 2014 CIS Accreditation Visitors Report and the Hutchins community response.

We now look to how we will achieve the 2016-2020 Strategic Intents and Strategies. A large part of the planning process involved a thorough examination of all the strategies to ensure they are; beneficial for the students, in line with CIS recommendations, have the required resources, staff understand their input, and timeframes for delivery are clear. At each stage we asked ourselves, "What will Hutchins look like when the strategy is completed?"

The Hutchins School intends to follow its Council of International Schools 2014 accreditation with re-accreditation in 2019. This process will support The Hutchins School in ensuring all Strategic Intents and Strategies are achieved and appropriately acknowledged.

We look forward to the ongoing support of the Hutchins community in bringing the 2016-2020 Strategic Plan to life over the next five years.

This year we also farewell four long serving and highly respected staff members: Mr Chris Rae, Mr Ian McQueen, Mr Barrie Irons and Mrs Rita Mulcahy.

Mr Chris Rae

Mr Rae attended the Hutchins School as a student between 1963-1966 and commenced his employment with Hutchins in 1972, making this year his 43rd year of teaching at the School, an incredible achievement. He commenced at Hutchins as Form Master of 2R. Middle School House Master of Stephens House and coach of the U13 football. He was Middle School Form Master, 2R until 1979 and from then until 1986 was Master of Forms for IV, V and VI. Mr Rae was House Master of Stephens House from 1983-85, House Master, School House from 1987-2000, House Master Junior School Boarding House from 1984-86, Senior House Master of Burbury House from 1987-97 and Head of Senior School from 2001-08. He was awarded the HSOBA Honorary Life Membership award in 2008 and the HSOBA lvied Tower Award in 2010.

Mr Rae shares with us some memories of his time at the School. His first impressions of the School was that it was very traditional and over the years the biggest change he has witnessed is that the culture is now softer and there is a greater sense of compassion.

Mr Rae has enjoyed working with so many dedicated and passionate colleagues, being part of an all-inclusive team of staff and he greatly respects the contributions of all staff members teaching and non-teaching. Mr Rae recalls one of the most memorable moments at the School was the 'house hop' which was an end of year event for Year 9 students taken from the BBC Comedy "Tomkinson's" School Days where students competed in a hopping race on the hockey/soccer pitch and a House was announced as the winner.

Mr Ian McQueen

Mr Ian McQueen arrived from Queensland in 1979 and commenced his career at Hutchins as a Speech and Drama teacher. He was the Master-in-Charge of the Literary and Debating Society between 1979-92 after which he continued to coach debaters for some years under his successor. He coached U15 and Middle School squash teams between 1979-88 and coached the swimming team from 1980-86. In 1980 he joined the boarding house and became Deputy Boarding House Master in 1983 and Acting Head of the Boarding House for Term 2 in 1984.

Mr McQueen directed countless musicals and plays, organised and assisted with House Drama and other productions from 1979. He conceived of, directed and wrote plays for the annual Play-On-Tour, touring it to schools around the state from 1984-1994. He was Assistant Housemaster of School House between 1983-86 and Stephens Housemaster from 1991-2000. In 2001 Mr McQueen was appointed the Head of Middle School and was a member of the Middle School English team. As Head of Middle School he oversaw the introduction in 2010 of the hugely successful 'Time and Space' program for Year 7 students and their parents, this continually grows today as

annual Mother/Father and Son events. In 2013 the Ian McQueen "Yellow Jacket" award was introduced 'for a Stephens House student in Year 12 who has demonstrated significant growth in his time in the Senior School'.

Mr McQueen believes the biggest changes he has observed at the School is the modernisation of the physical environment with it now being much more open, colourful and inspiring. He will miss the daily contact with such wonderful people: the staff, both academic and non-academic; friendly, kindly, boy-focussed, conscientious and also the boys; enthusiastic, kindly and their every-ready sense of humour.

Mr Barrie Irons

Mr Barrie Irons commenced at Hutchins in 1990 as the Head of Senior School. He was the First XI coach from 1990-98 and again from 2000-10, he also led a cricket tour of South Africa in 1998. He taught accounting, economics and religious studies and attended the International Coalition of Boys' Schools in Boston USA in 1994. Mr Irons was appointed Deputy Headmaster and Head of Senior School in 1999 and held that position until 2000. In 2001 he was appointed Deputy Principal and from 2009-11 held the position of Deputy Headmaster. In 2012 he was appointed to the position of Registrar.

Mr Irons is not only a highly respected educator and mentor to the students, he is also the 'wheel master' of the School Fair chocolate wheel and our resident photographer.

Mr Irons' first impressions of the School was when he brought the Mentone Grammar School cricket team on a tour to Tasmania. He loved the situation of the School, starting of course with the WMO, and the most important part was the culture of friendliness and caring. His most memorable moments are the standing ovation the String Quartet received at this year's Awards Assembly, the First XI Cricket Team winning three state premierships in a row and the importance of the Ben Chuck Good Man Award in raising the profile of 'being a good man' as the central thread that runs through the entire school.

Mr Irons has an incredible memory for all of the students' names as well as their families and wherever walks through the School he is met with a hearty greeting from all students.

INTERNATIONAL BOYS' SCHOOL COALITION REPORT

Action Research at Hutchins through the International Boys' School Coalition (IBSC)The Hutchins School is a founding member of IBSC and has over the past three years connected strongly with the IBSC action research program.

Each year IBSC select, with the support of their respective School, action researchers from boys' schools across the world who are passionate about improving their pedagogical practice through evidence based research that has an impact on the teaching and learning of boys.

Mrs Kate Turner (Kindergarten teacher), Mr Martin Chambers (Head of House and teacher of Computing), Mr Erik Marr (Teacher of Chinese), Dr Keith Martin-Smith (Teacher of Science) and Mr Alan Jones (Deputy Headmaster) attended the IBSC 22nd Annual Conference in Cape Town, South Africa. Since its beginning eight years ago, the IBSC Action Research program has grown from strength to strength, and is a recognised leader in action research on boys' education on a global scale.

Mrs Turner and Mr Chambers have been working on their Action Research for 18 months with other researchers in boys schools across the world on the IBSC topic *Boys as Makers*. Both presented their findings at the conference. Mrs Turner's Action Research topic is *"The potential for Kindergarten boys to improve their empathy"* and Mr Chambers' Action Research Topic is *"Enhancing curiosity in Year 9 boys"*.

Dr Martin-Smith and Mr Marr have already begun their initial action research processes with the topic *Boys as Global Citizens*. Their projects will build upon the work of global citizenship already being undertaken at Hutchins on international mindedness, and will reflect on ways either to initiate or improve global awareness. They will generate, gather, and analyse data on their introduced action in order to evaluate the effectiveness in regard to the development of boys'

as global citizens. The nature of projects undertaken are guided by the United Nations' proposed Sustainable Development Goals that are currently being developed to replace the *Millennium Development Goals*. Mr Martin-Smith and Mr Marr will present their Action Research findings in Vancouver in 2016.

Joining them in Vancouver in 2016 will be Mr James McLeod and Ms Cath Hogan. Mr McLeod and Ms Hogan were successful in their applications to join the IBSC action research program. The topic will be collaboration and the power of learning groups. This will look at what skills we need to deliberately teach our boys to enable them to participate meaningfully and successfully in collaborative thinking and learning groups. These skills might include learning to listen to others; involving all members of the group, not just the leader or the more vocal students; valuing all ideas and contributions; developing confidence around risktaking and making mistakes; vigorous questioning of ideas; learning how to accept criticism; and learning how to give constructive feedback. In addition, we need to ensure that we are providing opportunities for meaningful group learning: exploring meaningful topics with real-world connections, and setting aside enough time to think and respond and develop ideas.

Congratulations to our staff that have worked tirelessly through this process. They have been engaged in higher order research and thinking to improve their knowledge and teacher practice for the betterment of improving student outcomes in our boys at Hutchins.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

HUTCHINS FOUNDATION

The Mission of the Foundation states: The Foundation works to ensure the future of Hutchins by supporting the School in an ongoing capacity. While the vision of the Foundation is: To create a financially secure school where each student is able to develop their personal best.

It is gratifying to see that through the hard work of members of the Foundation in pursuit of this Mission and associated Vision together with that of the School and the School community the number of students at the School is at an all-time high.

Over this year we have seen the continuing refocussing of the Foundation, which I flagged last year, with significant effort being put into updating of records and core requirements of the Foundation and bringing its governance to the level required to manage investments and fundraising on behalf of The Hutchins School.

The Foundation continues to fund the office of the Director of Development including the Director of Development and the Foundation Assistant as well as specific and special events such as the Hutchins Art Prize and the Follow Your Dreams Awards.

Over recent years the Foundation has been able to provide financial assistance to the School with part or full funding of such projects as the Burbury House renovations, the Early Learning Centre extensions, purchase of the J W Burton, a RIB Inflatable, for use in association with water sports and most recently providing funds for the purchase of a new school bus complete with all the required and updated safety features, all only possible through the generous support of the School community.

The Foundation has core roles in managing and growing an Endowment Fund, Trustee of the Building Fund, Library Resources fund and Scholarship and Bursaries fund. Investing funds so as to grow the value of the total investment and assisting the School with financial support as and when appropriate to assist in its aim of Building Good Men.



Mr Andrew Nesbitt again Chaired the Investment Finance, Audit and Risk Committee until his resignation due to a transfer to Sydney, Mr Robin Allardice has since undertaken this role. Both have maintained close scrutiny of the investments and finances of the Foundation in association with Evans and Partners and also supported by Mrs Gina Fenney the School's Financial Accountant. A key adviser with Evans and Partners is Mr Edward Kemp ('87), son of Mr Andrew Kemp ('54) who was one of the original signatories to the Foundation and served on the Foundation Board for over 25 years.

The Hutchins Arts Committee has again been chaired by Ms Kristian Falconer and this year ran a hugely successful Hutchins Art Prize which has achieved national and international recognition with its exhibition in the Long Gallery at Salamanca Place.

The Arts Committee has been assisted by the Hutchins Art Curator, Mr John Anchor and Mrs Michelle Mizzen the School's Marketing and Media Manager.

The Bequest Committee has been renamed The 1846 Society Committee to better highlight the history and traditions of Hutchins and to focus its attention in support of the Director of Development in his role of fundraising for the School. The 1846 Society Committee is chaired by Mr John St Hill ('60).

This Committee has also absorbed the tasks of the Membership and Fundraising Committee and we thank Mrs Jenny Inglis for her sterling leadership of the Committee over a number of years.

A new committee, the Appointments Committee has been formed under the Chairmanship of the Foundation President Mr Ian Johnston with the role of selecting and assessing potential Board and Committee members for the Foundation.

Its first task this year was to select prospective Board Members resulting in

the appointment of Mr Trevor McKenna ('01), Mr Tim Scott ('93) and Mrs Katharine Lack to the Foundation Board to replace Mr Scott Harvey ('79), Mr Andrew Nesbitt and Mr Nicholas Dwyer ('99) following their resignations.

The unfortunate resignation of the Director of Development, Mr Michael Thornton, in October 2015 due to ill health, has delayed some of the Board's initiatives which were in hand, however a suitable replacement is being actively pursued and hopefully an appointment will be made before the end of the year.

Our Foundation Assistant Mrs Sarah Moss has been a key component in progressing the business and organisational aspects of the Foundation. Mrs Moss has provided the liaison and inter-connection with the School to allow us to collectively function and to better support the School.

Follow Your Dreams Awards were made to seven students from Years 11 -12, in the form of financial assistance to assist them in pursuing their dream. Each student wishing to enter for an award was required to submit a written application and attend an interview.

The Foundation has also continued its support of students through the awarding of a number of scholarships.

Looking ahead the Foundation hopes to reinvigorate the spirit of philanthropy first established in 1846 when a group of forward thinking individuals provided the necessary funds for a new school, The Hutchins School, and set it on the path to the success it is today.

An exceptionally busy year has seen continued development in Archives.

Progress with our digitisation program has enabled electronic access to the entire set of school newsletters, dating from the first publication in 1962. The capacity to search such records quickly adds considerably to the usefulness of the information they contain. The recent purchase of an A3 flatbed scanner will assist further with the digitisation of large documents and photographs.

Thanks to the dedication of our hardworking volunteers the *picture* (including artworks and framed photographs) and *audio-visual* collections have been added to the Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection (HAHC) database. Now that the first stage of our *staff bibliography* is largely complete, staff photographs are being sorted, collated and annotated for digitisation and potential addition to the staff bibliography. Cataloguing assistance from library technician Ms Leanne Weeks has seen the completion to date of our recording of the book collection.

Professional learning for the year included attendance at a Records and Information Management Professionals of Australia (RIMPA) workshop in Term 1; the wonderfully stimulating Museums Australia National Conference in Sydney during Term 2; and in Term 3 a workshop based on Content dM (the library database which includes a selection of archives objects). The 2015 Australian Society of Archivists (ASA) National Conference, which the Archivist had been working towards for months as a member of the ASA (Tasmanian branch) organising committee, was also held in Hobart during Term 3. As part of this conference, Hutchins hosted a meeting of school archivists from all over the country, who toured and were impressed by our archives and museum.

As well as visits from both Year 2 classes for their annual immersion in school history, we have at various times this year been visited by historian and author Ross McMullin. on the lookout for new subjects for his next book of World War I stories; architect Garry Forward in his search for photographs of old Hutchins at Macquarie Street; former student Mr Rod Reynolds ('60) to donate a large collection of Tasmanian architect Alexander North's drawings and plans of the old school; a touring group from the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA); and a group of budding archivists from Fahan School on an information-gathering exercise.

More recently we had a visit from one of from Arts Tasmania's Roving Curators, Melissa Smith, in her search for items to include in next year's major exhibition, 10 Objects, 10 Stories: Celebrating Community Collections; also from Old Boy John Elliston (1938, no. 3431), who at a sprightly and alert 91 years of age brought his wife and daughter along to visit his Alma Mater. We are looking forward to a visit soon from archivist Melinda Clarke to examine our museum displays in preparation for giving those of The Friends' School a facelift.

Donations have been strong this year and we have been fortunate to be able to add some significant items to the HAHC. A tip-off from outside the School led to the purchase of a number of photographs, both framed and unframed – many of them new additions to the collection. Our sincere thanks go to all donors,

particularly John Duke of Avram for his generous donation of time, effort and finances in conducting the authentication research and producing certificates of heraldic registry for the Hutchins coat of arms.

Recently we hosted an unexpected visit from Mrs Alison Wilson, current Hutchins parent and great-granddaughter of R H Isherwood, a long-serving and highlyvalued member of staff, 1913-37. After joining the staff in 1913 Richard Henry Isherwood taught every form from fourth to lower sixth, principally in maths and commerce. Outside of school work his chief interest was landscape painting and he became recognised as one of the leading water-colour artists in Tasmania. Following his retirement from full-time work in 1935 he was employed part-time at Hutchins as drawing master.

WEBBER LECTURE

The Headmaster Seminar Series

includes the annual Webber Lecture which is an address delivered by a leading presenter whose topic is always one of ethics. The Webber lecture is named in honour of The Reverend Webber who delivered the first lecture in 1998. Reverend Webber was the Dean of Hobart from 1959 to 1971.

This year we were delighted to welcome Her Excellency Professor the Honourable Kate Warner, AM, Governor of Tasmania as our guest speaker on Wednesday 20 May 2015. The topic of this years' debate was "Towards Ethical Relationships: addressing sexual and family violence".

Her Excellency presented in her lecture that the confronting issue of violence against women requires more than a criminal justice response and that the key to tackling the problem is to dismantle the traditional gender stereotypes and roles so that healthy, equal and respectful relationships between men and women can flourish.

HUTCHINS ART PRIZE

The 14th Hutchins Art Prize exhibition was held during September in the Long Gallery, Salamanca Place as the visual art component of the 1st Hutchins Arts Festival. Downstairs in the Peacock Theatre, Hutchins Performing Arts and Music students provided the festival's colour and movement, drama, dance and sound track.

Over 1,500 art lovers visited the Hutchins Art Prize during the two weeks of its duration. Most left highly impressed by the variety and quality of the 65 works on display and the versatility of paper as a vehicle for making art. Mercury art critic Clyde Selby concluded his review of the show by stating that 'the Hutchins Art Prize is one of Australia's most lucrative prizes for works on paper and is one of the artistic highlights in Hobart this year'.

Headmaster Mr Warwick Dean launched the Hutchins Arts Festival at the Art Prize's Gala Opening and welcomed Her

Her Excellency presented examples of society's response to violence against women and how violence supported attitudes reflect broader social norms. Addressing violence against women, sexual violence and domestic violence needs to be tackled on multiple levels. Her Excellency discussed the National Plan to Reduce Violence against Women and their Children 2010 – 2022 and the Line Campaign which is informed by research commissioned by Our Watch. The research revealed that young people are struggling to work out what healthy, respectful relationships look like.

Excellency Professor the Honourable Kate Warner, AM, Governor of Tasmania who officially opened the exhibition and presented cheques to the prize winners in the presence of 300 invited guests. The Bluenote Ensemble enlivened proceedings with their cool jazz while the Hutchins String Quartet welcomed new arrivals in the classic style. Hutchins Hospitality students served the multitude with aplomb. Members of the Hutchins Art Committee hosted the evening.

The 2015 Hutchins Art Prize worth \$20,000 was won by Tasmanian artist Rosemary O'Rourke for her brilliant drawing inspired by the weave of fabric, 'Cloth Drawing'. Locust Jones from Victoria won the \$2,000 Falconer Advisers' Award (Judges' Special Commendation), Lily Ward from NSW won the \$1,000 Artery Student Award and Eamonn Jackson from Victoria won the Tasmanian Coffee Roasters People's Choice Award.

The Hutchins Art Prize has extensive sponsorship but even with this and the entry fees paid by the 376 participants there is a significant cost burden associated with running the event. Fundraising has been part of the Hutchins Art Committee's organisational activity and a new initiative, ARTRENT,

MUSIC

At Hutchins, we endeavour to ensure that all students have the opportunity to experience a wide range of musical experiences.

Ensembles

It has been very pleasing to see a large variety of instrumentalists in Music classes interested in various styles of music. This is the key to developing ensembles in contemporary, jazz and classical idioms. 2015 has seen the addition for several new large ensembles to our Music program. On top of the Senior String Orchestra (Mrs Anna Maguire) Hutchins Big Band (Mr Scott Cashion) Hutchins Symphonic Band (Mr Scott Cashion) and Hutchins Brass Ensemble (Mr Glenn Schultz), we have formed an Intermediate Symphonic Band under the direction of Ms Rebecca Haight and an Intermediate Big Band renamed "The Big Band Theory" under the direction of Mr Les Johnston. Both these ensembles create a training opportunity for students to develop skills within the co-curricular ensemble program.

Senior String Ensemble

The Hutchins Senior String Ensemble has had a terrific year and performed at assemblies, Open Day, Music Camp, the Ensemble Showcase Concert, a Spring Soiree and gained first place at the Hobart Eisteddfod. Some of our senior

The range of subjects within our academic program combined with the enthusiasm of the boys and staff has resulted in a successful year, both in our curricular and co-curricular offerings.

Highlights of our year include:

Year 7

History

Year 8s were involved in collaborative website productions as well as an active integrated history unit on the Battle of Hastings, which incorporated elements of Art and Physical Education. They also undertook a deep immersion research project on Medieval Japan which allowed students to apply their research through an interactive presentation. In this Centenary of ANZAC year, Year 9s had the opportunity to share their personal family experiences. Connor Noble's willingness to share his family history was particularly poignant. The twentieth century focus in Year 10, as well as the study of Islam and Judaism, provided our students with a richer world view.

Legal Studies

Students were enriched by a detailed study of Australian political institutions, law making, and the nature and prevalence of crime in society. A student directed inquiry on topical legal issues including surrogacy, metadata and reform to the Australian Senate was undertaken. Students benefited from guest speakers from organisations including the Office of Parliamentary Counsel and Tasmania Police as well as from participation in Lawfest.

Economics

Students undertook a study of the key determinants of economic activity both within Australia and globally. Students applied their understanding of economics in a variety of ways such as examining the Intergenerational Report, the role of the Reserve Bank of Australia and the study of globalisation. Students were active participants in the University of Tasmania's Economics Challenge as well as being privileged to learn from distinguished Tasmanian economist and Old Boy Saul Eslake ('74).

Behavioural Sciences

In their major investigation projects, students applied psychological principles, research methods and empirical evidence to investigate the processes that influence the behaviour of the individual. This year, the topic was 'remembering'. Students designed and conducted a range of experiments in this area, investigating things such as the effects of sleep deprivation upon recall ability, environmental cues influencing facial recognition and the tip-of-thetongue phenomenon.

Additionally, either as a part of or over and above our rich academic program, boys participated in competitions at both a state and national level, giving them the opportunity to be recognised for their success. A number of our boys have been awarded at the highest levels:

BUILDING GOOD MEN

HUMANITIES

Australian Geography Competition

This challenges Australian secondary school students to demonstrate their geographical knowledge and skills. Fenn Gardner (Year 11), William McCullum (Year 11) and Joshua Gatehouse (Year 8) earned High Distinctions.

ASX Schools Sharemarket Game:

Offered as an in-class activity in Accounting and Personal Investing, as well as a co-curricular opportunity either as an individual or in a group, a syndicate starts with a virtual \$50,000 and there are 10 weeks of trading at the same prices as the live market. James Padgett (Year 12) and Spiros Daglas (Year 12) chose to participate as a co-curricular opportunity and were the state winners of Round 1.

CPA Australia Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition

In Business Studies, students participate in this competition either as an individual or in a group. In both categories students from The Hutchins School were declared state winners. In the individual category, James Moroney (Year 10) won with his business plan for *PhoneFurbish* which repairs damaged mobile phones and tablets, restoring them to a factory level of production using precise techniques and high quality materials. In the group division, Robert Jiang (Year 10), Harrison Wallace (Year 10) and Peter Mercado (Year 10) won with their business plan for *The Tapas Truck* which will provide customers with great food made with only the highest quality ingredients, wherever that customer may be. Additionally, The Tapas Truck was judged as the best business plan at the national level. It is the third year in a row that Hutchins students have been awarded the national group prize.

Our diverse Humanities faculty cannot be successful without the ongoing support and commitment of our dedicated staff. Thank you to our Humanities teachers who have all worked very hard to ensure that our boys have had a rewarding and fulfilling year.

DESIGN, PRODUCTION AND DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

This year we welcomed Mr Roger Hawkins to our staff. Mr Hawkins joins our team having an extensive teaching career across education sectors in both Tasmania and Queensland in design and digital technology. He has worked in the ICT/Education industry and recently for Independent Schools Tasmania, an association for non-government schools. Mr Hawkins brings a wealth of experience to his position as Teacher and Co-ordinator of eLearning/Design.

As we move to the implementation of the National Design and Digital Technology curriculum in 2016 we have also maintained a broad focus on all curriculum opportunities for our boys and this includes the VET sector. Our VET Engineering and Design and Production continues to develop across Year 10-12 with Mr Roy Servant sharing a wealth of experience and delivering instruction to our boys.

Design and Production - VET

The VET course focus is on practical skills and theory. These challenges have become very valuable for those considering Trade careers and we have been successful in placing our boys in apprenticeships again this year.

Some really high quality work was produced by our Year 11 students: Jack Field, Stevan Djeric and Timothy

The general progress and improvement of all students was really impressive with most electing to continue in this area next year.

In Design and Production

Metal: the variety of work was again rather interesting with our Year 10 students, William Kregor and Angus Szoke producing some good practical products and Dane Friberg did some really impressive rehabilitation work on small engines. The general atmosphere in the workshops was really positive not only in a practical sense but also in the area of relationships in a less formal but more traditional workshop environment

Design and Production Wood:

two small plywood dinghies were made. The dinghies having been inspired by this year's wooden boat festival were built by Jack Field Year 11 and William Kregor Year 10. These boats proved to be a great inspiration for other students and a good example of tying together old and new technologies. We are all looking forward to the launch.

Design and Technology

Middle School

The design make and appraise process continues to develop. With the implementation of RORY, our online learning system, the boys are now producing digital portfolios to

record their learning processes by a collection of evidences using digital tools like feedback blogs, photos, videos and written commentary. Our trials looked promising and all Middle School boys will produce them next year together with realtime feedback for the boys and Parents.

The boys continue to work with a variety of materials, tools and equipment in a problem solving design based context. The projects challenge the boys while giving them the opportunity to have input and ownership.

Designer Maker 9

The boys worked on fairly tight design briefs based on upcycling as opposed to recycling. A whole range of furniture was produced based on the boys design work breathing new life into previously used objects and materials.

Digital Technologies

We are very supportive of new and emerging technologies and how they provide relevance and high levels of engagement to our boys as learners. Our 'off class' Minecraft competition continues to be popular with the Houses in both Middle and Senior School vying for the

prestigious honour of Minecraft Champion Team.

Our Middle School ICT compulsory core continues development with Year 7 coding through their regular Mathematics classes and general capabilities with ICT delivered to all Year 8s via set lessons in the weekly timetable.

Year 4 "First Settlers" in MinecraftEdu

The boys conducted research around the first settlers and prepared themselves for their 'voyage' to settle Sydney Cove, Port Jackson. On arriving in the 'Virtual World' a high priority for many of the boys was to build replicas of the buildings used by the first settlers based on a 1769 map, others were tasked to establish farms for growing all types of crops and build shelter and fencing for animals. On visiting the class a number of times during their MinecraftEdu activities it was astonishing how engaged the boys were; excited shouts of "let's make a furnace" or "we need more stone" indicated real enjoyment of the activities. In fact, one parent mentioned that her son was so excited about the project he couldn't wait to arrive on the day they were working in MinecraftEdu!

Year 6 Robotics and Coding

This year the Year 6 students were offered the opportunity to apply for an after school extension program. The program provided an exciting opportunity for the boys to learn lots about the fascinating world of robotics, offering them a wealth of information on everything to do with robots covering

artificial intelligence and coding.

The boys used the Edison Robot as an introduction to robotics and programming. In addition they experience the Grok learning competition where they were involved in the National Computer Science School (NCSS) Challenge (Beginners) learning the Python programming language.

It is amazing how quickly the boys picked up the coding side and understood the computational thinking involved. They were certainly engaged with the challenges; particularly the robot Sumo Wrestling Competition!

Computer Science 8

Students worked on both Raspberry Pi microcomputers and Arduino microcontrollers as well as learning programming through Scratch and Python. Many skills were developed here which will aid them in their ICT pathway going forward.

We are looking at expanding the Year 8 program even further in 2016 by bringing back Robotics into the curriculum and participating in a number of events and competitions through Digital Careers Australia.

3D modelling proves to be a valuable skill to have as the boys are exposed to more and more digital fabrication technologies like 3D printing and more affordable CNC equipment. Once again having these skills of design and 3D modelling our boys can easily transform from consumer to creator and this is where the intellectual digital technology 'smarts' are needed in an advancing economy.

CADCAM8

Taking an idea through to a final product using digital design files, a design process and digital fabrication equipment like 3D printers, vinyl cutters and small CNC routers is a real challenge. The linking of skills and understanding is vast and complex. The boys this year produced a variety of products from laptop vinyl stickers, carved wooden boxes to silicon moulds for making chocolate bars.

Game Making 9

The Power of 9 boys participated across two classes of game making using Gamemaker. The major focus and challenge for these boys was designing interactive games targeted at the youngest boys in the ELC. Designing to produce games is very different to consuming or playing games and this proved quite challenging for the boys. Games of a high standard were produced and many programming techniques were used in their making. Well done to all the boys involved.

The Year 10 Computing

This class took a more project based approach to learning and these students enjoyed the flexibility of this offering. They were fully engaged with the new learning management system Rory, and were able to tailor projects based on their interests. The entire group entered the Grok Learning Python Challenge with outstanding results. A strong multimedia focus exposed the boys to gaming and animation.

Senior Computer Science and Information Systems & Digital Technologies 11-12

The students in both groups produced extremely high standard of final term projects and a number of them are planning further university study in this field. Project based learning continues to allow our boys to use their skills of self-initiated inquiry and produce outstanding work based on their personal interest and possible career path.

Regular after school workshops via our SUPASPACE program where curiosity and creativity are the drivers proved popular all year for boys who wished to come in and expand their knowledge within the faculty. We see this area growing into the future as the absence of a set curriculum allows the boys to explore their own hunches and areas of interest.

Computer Graphics and Design 11-12, Housing and Design 11-12

The Pre-Tertiary boys continue to push the boundary with design process and innovation. The high end 3D visualisation of student directed design projects continues to amaze us. When supportive processes are in place and foundation work has been done the boys wanting to pursue further studies in Design are very well prepared. Outstanding work done by Joshua Summerfield Year 12 in both subject areas.

Well done to all boys and staff for an inspirational and productive year. As a faculty we provide so many opportunities for our boys and encourage further involvement. A farewell to Mr Nick Randall our Faculty Assistant (and Old Boy) for many years of outstanding service and welcome to Mr Mark Taute our new Faculty assistant.

ENGLISH AND MODERN LANGUAGES

Investigating language, identity and culture

This year several students in each of the pre-tertiary English Communications classes chose to investigate the Adam Goodes controversy for their projects on the power of language in contemporary Australian society. They researched and discussed issues relating to identity and culture, read a diversity of opinions and analysed the language, behavior, attitudes and values which emanated from that highly contested word "boo".

During this process students recognised the sport stadium as a microcosm for Australian society and the football match as a dynamic and sometimes volatile collision of ideas, identities and cultural practices. The evolution of the controversy while they were working on their projects reinforced competing conversations in our society and the need to integrate multiple perspectives when seeking to understand a complex issue.

The results of their investigations: an essay analysing language, a multimodal poster and a reflective statement demonstrated their capacity to develop an informed, reasoned response to an issue that clearly matters to Australians. Other controversies selected by students to critique how language is used in national conversations included gay marriage, the 'ice epidemic', changing attitudes to mental health, live export of animals, the rise of Reclaim Australia, domestic violence and the ways we celebrate Australia Day. Forming a considered opinion is a life skill and the students certainly took up the challenge afforded by the Communications Project.

English as an *additional* language (EAL)

As usual, our international EAL students at Hutchins have had a busy and intense year. Beside the small groups in the Early Learning Centre, we had two composite EAL classes. One had those international students learning English from Years 7-10; the other class combined Levels 2C and 3C. Both presented challenges, due to the varying levels of students and the fact that we had students joining us at different times of the year. To their credit, the students welcomed new arrivals and good progress was made in their understanding and spoken and written fluency. Our numbers have increased significantly over 2015.

The highlight of the year is usually our group excursion, in which all EAL students in the Middle and Senior Schools enjoy a day out in a new, exciting Tasmanian location. This year, the boys chose to visit the Hastings Caves and Thermal Springs. We were lucky with the weather, which was excellent. The boys enjoyed the amazing formations of the caves and the beautiful surrounding forest. Once we arrived at the springs, just about everyone bravely jumped in and had a good splash.

Thanks, once again, to those teachers who provided very valuable Intensive English support lessons: Ms Lynn Paddock in the ELC, and Mr Marcus Rossetto and Ms Anne Killalea for the Middle School and Senior School boys. They have really given the boys the extra boost that their English needs.

Chinese

2016 has witnessed the Junior and Middle School's Chinese programs continue to thrive with excellent academic and cultural learning occurring in all our classrooms. Through Chinese studies students have advanced their understanding of Chinese and Asian culture, as well as developing their linguistic skills. In class, the Mandarin language and Chinese culture are taught on a weekly basis through a variety of methods including, games, activities, songs and kinaesthetic movement. In addition, our students have been extended academically through lunchtime classes and Hanyu giao (Chinese Speaking Competition). All the boys engage and participate well through a solid foundation provided from the Australia Curriculum - Chinese.

In Term 1, we hosted a group of students and teachers from the Second High School attached to Beijing Normal University. During their ten-day stay in Tasmania, the Beijing students were billeted with families of Hutchins students of Chinese, visited local attractions and attended classes together with their Hutchins buddies. It was a great opportunity for students studying Chinese in Senior School to exchange language and culture with their Chinese peers. They are now looking forward to visiting Beijing and the sister school next April.

The Hutchins School has recently gained accreditation from the Confucius Institute Headquarter as Tasmania's first and only Chinese Testing Centre. The School is now authorised to deliver all major international Chinese proficiency tests, including the widely recognised HSK: Hànyu Shuipíng Kaoshì, translated as Chinese Proficiency Test, for nonnative speakers. This year, about 30 students from various schools in Hobart have sat their first International Chinese Test at Hutchins where their language competence is benchmarked and certified globally.

French

One of the main French highlights of the year is the annual Alliance Française Competition: this provides our students with an excellent opportunity to engage with Francophone culture. Four students in the Years 6-10 poetry sections achieved a range of prizes from first to third.

Middle and Senior School French students have been on various excursions: the focus is on helping them to engage with the connections between France and Tasmania, both from an historical and a contemporary point of view. We have taken students to the various historical monuments that commemorate the three main French expeditions to Van Diemen's Land and the Antarctic in the late 18th and early 19th centuries, which was of course a time of dramatic change in France itself. We also visited the largely unheralded commemorative sights acknowledging the French Canadian exiles and their struggle to achieve democratic representation. The contemporary aspect of these excursions involved purchasing a treat or two from the Jean-Pascal French Patisserie! The Year 10 students travelled to Woodbridge to visit Yves Ginat of honey producer 'Miellerie' fame: his knowledge of Tasmanian flora was fascinating, while his desire to pay tribute to Franco-Tasmanian history in the packaging of his produce was also insightful.

The Holy Grail, of course, involves a trip to France itself, and we are currently putting together a plan for 2018, so please do look out for further details if you are currently in Years 7-9.

During French this year; we visited several places of French cultural significance around Hobart. We visited Salamanca to learn about the significance of French explorers and their role in early Tasmania; the French Memorial Fountain located in the Botanical Gardens which was built in 1972 to celebrate the bicentenary of French exploration in Tasmania; the Cornelian Bay Cemetery which had a memorial commemorating the fallen sailors on the French Antarctic division led by Captain Dumont d`Urville in 1837-1840. The French Navy lays a wreath at the memorial when they are in Hobart, the most recent time being back in 2012. In Princes Park there is a monument which commemorates Canadian patriots exiled to Tasmania. These patriots were French-Canadians. The monument stands to honour those who were wrongly exiled. Despite all these locations, most people's favourite was the French bakery because of the amazing food.

MATHEMATICS

A fantastic year of results and achievements by a number of boys across the school.

Australian Mathematics Competition

This competition is run throughout all of Australia and around 40 other countries. The following students have done exceptionally well:

Prizes - to qualify for a prize, students must score in the top 0.3% of the cohort (1 in 300).

The Prudence award also goes to Harrison Evans (Year 10) who scored the most consecutive correct answers from question 1.

High Distinctions - to qualify for a High Distinction, students must score in the top 2%.

Ethan Medwin (Year 7), Izac Grantham (Year 7), Jackson Coad (Year 8), Koh and awareness in game situations. 2015 saw the introduction of the health component into our HPE lessons. Boys in Years 3 and 5, focussed on increasing their understanding of safety, mental health and wellbeing as well as the health benefits of physical activity. Students in Years 4 and 6 worked through units in food and nutrition, relationships, and alternatives to using drugs. These units were developed to coincide with the Bounce Back work being carried out in all Junior School classrooms.

The Year 7 students enjoyed participating in the Rock and Water program while also looking at nutrition and safety. Year 8s were introduced to strength and conditioning programs while Year 9s daily lessons were aimed at improving physical, mental and social wellbeing.

In Year 10 we re-introduced health units with a focus on positive health practices when dealing with relationships, sexuality, and drugs in society. As part of this program, a highlight was a

As part of The Hutchins School Strategic Plan, the Bring Your Own Technology (BYOT) program supporting our blended e-learning curriculum model in Years 7-12, the School continues to gather educational evidence of the benefits for students in maintaining control of their own personal devices to use seamlessly between home and school.

This evidence includes students' interest in taking responsibility for their own learning, enjoying creative content curation and more opportunity to demonstrate safe uses of digital technologies.

Students and staff have been learning to use *Rory* [http://rory.hutchins.tas.edu. au] our virtual learning environment, choose their free and preferred cloud storage, and to use their free version of Microsoft Office 365 and Outlook email. Minimum operational specifications on the students' laptop model of choice allow the development of ICT skills and capabilities, such as computational or coding skills, video and audio recording, desktop conferencing and collaboration, effective keyboarding input, image manipulation, music composition, web and graphic design functionality, programming or handwriting recognition, use of Asian language characters, and mind-mapping, prototyping, complex visual thinking, and 3D visualisation.

In the Early Learning Centre and the John Bednall Centre for Excellence, students have been using new class sets of Apple iPads in their classrooms. Teachers in the Power of 9 will continue to request a personalised device or a smart phone to take as a pocket device and camera on Challenges. The Hutchins School has two e-platforms called Overdrive and Wheelers for downloading e-texts, ebooks and audiobooks which are supported for use on any laptop or smart device.

The first phase of the *Brand Style Guide* [http://brand.hutchins.tas.edu. au] website was launched as another co-operative project for the IT, Library

The website containing writing guidelines and actual resources introduces our brand architecture, explains our brand vision and language as well as all the elements which comprise The Hutchins School's visual identity. These guidelines support all communications and publications activities. It provides a description of the core components of our brand, authors' quide to writing, a digital showcase of re-branded signage, publications and advertisements, and a repository of the templates, logos, imagery guidelines, typography and colour palettes. Creating a consistent voice for writing for and about the School, it is hoped that the writing guidelines will standardise the work for all the School's community of writers and proofreaders in their use of grammar, punctuation, acronyms, use of sentence case, forms of address and more. Future phases will include Rory templates and the extension of the Hutchins Central website with a Microsoft SharePoint instance for records management.

Opportunities range from being able to win prizes at science competitions (ICAS Science Competition, RACI Titration Competition) to travelling overseas to present findings from an investigation conducted at a student science conference. Involvement in these extra Science opportunities do not necessarily mean a lot of extra work - but rather a repackaging of work already conducted as part of your normal Science class. (e.g. UTas Science Investigation Awards, Tasmanian Science Talent Search, International Student Science Conference). This year has been a very good year for Hutchins students achieving success outside of the classroom

At the UTAS Science Investigation Awards students from Years 5–12 present findings from a science investigation they conducted with science industry judges. Several Hutchins students received awards and prizes for their investigations.

Junior Youth Physicsts' Tournament

The Junior Youth Physicists Tournament (JYPT) is a competition in which teams of Year 10 students investigate and present solutions to complex physics problems. The 2015 JYPT was held in Wellington, New Zealand, from the 16 – 19 October. The team from Hutchins consisted of Thomas Dunbabin, Harrison Evans, Luke West, Thomas Young, and James Tucker accompanied by Mr Peter Crofts. This year the competition included problems involving geysers, electromagnetic motors, chaotic motion, reverse sprinklers and propellers and facing eleven other teams from Australia and New Zealand. The tournament is a system of competition known as 'physics fights', in which one team presents their solution to a problem and a speaker from another team then prepares an opposition to this and the two team members then engage in a discussion

of the solution with each intending to demonstrate an understanding of the principles of physics and scientific inquiry. The jurors then award marks to both speakers on the basis of the presentation and the discussion.

Thomas Young received one of the highest scores for an opponent of the tournament for his opposition to the electromagnetic motor, and Thomas Dunbabin received the highest score of the tournament for his presentation on the physics of geysers. Hutchins made the final for the first time in six years of competing.

The final play-off was staged in front of all the teams, and ten jurors! The other school in the final was Onslow College from Wellington, three-time winner of the competition.

Luke West gave an impressive opposition to the Segner's wheel problem that was a spectacle for the audience. Concepts involved included angular momentum, net torque, pressure differentials and the statistical significance of some experimental results. Thomas Dunbabin presented his solution to the Geyser problem (factors affecting the time dependence of eruptions) and was able to justify his conclusions in the face of fierce opposition from Onslow College. Areas of physics tossed back and forwards in this 'fight' were hydrostatic pressure, heat Vs temperature, specific and latent heat, the ideal gas laws, and the Clausius-Clapeyron equation.

This was Hutchins' first time in a JYPT final and as such the first time we have won a final. This reflected the amount of time and effort put in by all of the team throughout the year, as well as in Wellington; free time was often spent revising presentations for the next day.

Congratulations go to the team for the fantastic result. A huge thanks also to Mr Crofts whose guidance throughout the year and help in Wellington allowed us to achieve what we did.

Science and Engineering Challenge

Twenty-seven Hutchins students from Years 9-10 competed in the 2015 Hobart heats of the Science and Engineering Challenge. Each group was faced with different challenges throughout the day, ranging from building an eco-habitat, constructing an earthquake proof tower, designing a suspension system for a moon rover, constructing a bionic hand, to networking cities for energy efficiency. The best performing Hutchins group at the heats were the "Moon Rover" group of James Tucker, Harrison Evans and Luke West who came first in their event. Overall Hutchins came in a very creditable 2nd at the end of the day and for the first time was selected for the Super State Challenge.

Hutchins came 5th at the State Challenge held a few weeks later in Launceston. Our best group at the Super Challenge was the "Grasping at Straws" team of Luke West, Harrison Evans, Declan Giltjes and Timothy McLachlan who won their challenge. A great effort by all the boys involved, gaining Hutchins their best ever result in the competition.

RACI Titration Competition

At the state level our best individual titrator were Lewis Urquhart Year 11 and Krishant Nand Year 12. Only one Hutchins team of Krishant Nand, Oliver Smith and Angus Lane, both Year 11, made it through to the National finals and received silver medals.

Brainbee 2015

The Brainbee is a national competition based on students' knowledge of neuroscience - Thomas Dunbabin, Robert Jiang, James Tucker and Luke West all qualified through the first round to take part in the Tasmanian State Finals held at the Menzies Centre in Hobart. The Hutchins team was awarded 1st place after a very tense afternoon of competition. James Tucker achieved 3rd place in the individual section. As well as individual prizes, the students won an Olympus microscope for the School. The students also toured the laboratories and were shown the cutting-edge research and brain imaging performed at the Menzies Centre. Congratulations to all of the boys involved!

11th International Student Science Conference in Taiwan.

Thomas Baddiley, Angus Szoke, Timothy Lindsay and Thomas Young (all Year 10) travelled to Taichung in Taiwan for the 11th International Student Science Conference. Thomas presented his work on the Effect of Indoor Plants on the Carbon Dioxide Levels in a Classroom and Angus presented his on the Antibacterial Effects of Essential Oils.

ICAS Science competition

The ICAS Science Test assesses students' science skills in areas such as interpreting data, drawing conclusions and problem-solving. The following students all received ICAS Medals for gaining the top score in their state: Year 7 - Riley Stevenson, Ethan Medwin, Izac Grantham; Year 10 - Thomas Young; Year 11 - Fergus Smith, Edward Johnstone; Year 12 - Lachlan Paul.

Oscar Campbell (Year 7), James Browne, Alexander Hall (both Year 9) achieved High Distinctions (top 1%).

Year 12 Physics Trip

This year Mr James Seddon organised the inaugural Year 12 Physics trip to Melbourne.

The class visited Schools of Physics at Melbourne University and RMIT, and also travelled to the CSIRO's Australian Synchrotron facility in order to gain a better understanding of Physics in industry and research. A visit to the Skydeck was also made to experience apparent weight in the high speed elevators.

In the later part of the year, our senior students watched a short film entitled *The 5 Elements of Adventure* about an international adventure guide who helps inspire people to carve out a balance in life.

Two of the five elements are 'out of the ordinary' and 'companionship' (I will leave it to you to discover the others). These two elements ring true for the Outdoor Education programs we offer here at Hutchins.

2015 saw 36 different outdoor trips and camps occur giving adventurous opportunity to approximately 650 students. What opportunity? An opportunity to step out of the ordinary, a familiar path they have walked thousands of times and experience something different, a challenge that asks them questions about themselves.

Outdoor Education challenges students in areas that aren't found on standarised tests. We offer experiences that question boys individual personal qualities and skills such as problem solving, tolerance, resilience, persistence, curiosity, self-awareness, leadership and resourcefulness. Boys find they can be firmly in charge of their own adventure.

It is a pleasure to continue to celebrate the learning successes of students in Outdoor Education. 2015 was a year in which record levels of snow fell. One highlight of the year was a three day circuit of Cradle Mountain on snow shoes, another visiting the Rodway Range and sleeping in snow caves. These trips were put together to challenge a group of senior students to step further out of the ordinary and out of their comfort zone. We look forward to continuing this with new and exciting adventures in 2016.

Many of the other camps descriptions will sound the same as previous years, for some these include a visit to Maria Island, abseiling at Freycinet and spotlight and camp cooking at Southport. I could go on with details about these but instead I ask students to continue to share stories with family and friends. Reflect on the fun, the challenges and the companionship shared with class mates.

We have continued to document some of our trips in photos and video. Mr Mark Oates continues to inspire a connection between filming and adventure and his movies for Outdoor Education and Power of 9 trips are a fantastic way to share out of the ordinary experiences. Outdoor Education staff are pleased to see many students documenting and celebrating their adventures in the outdoors in a similar way. Please seek out these short movies that will also tell a story far better than in words here.

Congratulations to the Years 3-4 students (and parents) who are at the beginning of their outdoor journey here at Hutchins and who had a fantastic series of camps recently at Southport. Also to the senior Outdoor Education classes and most recent adventurous, wilderness ambassadors who have braved elements and self-sufficiency to develop better life skills.

POWER OF 9



We very much see the Power of 9 challenge program as a rite of passage at Hutchins. It is a structured course in growing up. Leaving the boy behind and nurturing the fine young man inside. The activities and experiences are all structured around supporting this process and encouraging growth through challenge. Some of the experiences that help these young men find their place in the world include some unusual classroom settings, a variety of teachers, mentors and methods. Whether it is taking the helm of a tall ship, pledging to help the homeless, doing a stocktake of one's character strengths, talking to a 'lifer' at Risdon Prison, pondering the significance of life and death at the cemetery, contemplating life beyond school in 'The Real Game', cooking for yourself or leading others; the 'Challenge' term aims to take boys beyond the classroom and into the real world. This is a unique opportunity to grow as an adult. This year we have had some amazing experiences and learned some big lessons in life together. Below are some of our stories and memories from 2015.

Port Davey Challenge

"Most people mistake their own perspective, shaped by their subjective and limited perception, for the absolute reality of the external world.Recognizing the limitations of our senses and the subjectivity of our experiences is the only route to transcending them."

The Port Davey Wilderness expedition is a transformative experience for both teachers and boys. Transformative learning, is about developing an "ontological vocation" (Freire 1984), a theory of existence that views people who are constantly reflecting and acting on the transformation of their world. No more is this transformative learning more evident than in the acceptance of rain, the endurance of storm or the embracing of sun, surrounded by faces glowing with happiness, determination and achievement.

A key focus of the expedition is the nightly debriefing whereby everyone has a chance to express views, experiences or significant personal milestones with the whole group. In essence, it is a process of critical reflection and this raising of critical consciousness focuses on achieving an in-depth understanding of themselves and the world; it is an active process of growth. Here, in the wilderness, we're immersed in learning, immersed in growth together. This type of education changes the perspective of the students and the teachers; it enriches and fosters growth that can be felt and understood. The experience provides an environment whereby people are able to be redefined as capable, strong, independent, caring, resourceful, supportive and not simply smart or not. More than this, a community is created.

"I have a new perspective on my limits and feel like I should continue to push myself past my barriers. I've found it easier to help other people and help them get things done, and even if it just seems like they might just need a hand I'm more willing to help without being asked. After being given a chance to lead for a while, I feel like I could be a good leader, if given to chance to keep trying." Isaac

Global Challenge FIJI

Our 2015 Global Challenge group arrived to the hustle and bustle of Fiji's international airport in the early hours of the morning after an overnight flight from Melbourne. Here we met Tom, our guide from Destination Dreaming, as we squeezed into the back of two trucks and made our way to the beach for breakfast at the 'Bamboo Travellers'. As Tom introduced us to 'Fiji Time', we agreed to surrender our watches and spend the next two weeks moving with the rhythm of the islands, being relaxed and open to Fijian culture and new experiences.

The new experiences didn't take long to present themselves: a visit to the Nadi markets for fresh produce; searching the busy shopping precinct for somewhere to buy a rugby ball; and the dusty and bumpy ride to the highlands with the occasional stop for sugar cane straight from the fields and mandarins fresh from the trees.

After our late lunch stop at Sa Sa, we said farewell to the dusty highway and headed off on foot into the 'jungle'. What started out as a gentle stroll through a patchwork of cassava plantations with impressive highland vistas, evolved into an epic adventure as we descended deeper into the tropical valleys, crossing rivers in the dark guided only by the light of traditional bamboo fire torches carried Masi, Si, and the Fijian boys. It was a walk we will never forget!

We arrived late in the evening at Nasivikoso and then pushed onto Kinani which would be our home for the next week with Joe, Fonga and our Fijian family.

Here we were introduced to the traditional Fijian way of life in the highlands; we experienced a kava ceremony, learnt language, worked in the garden, learnt a *meke* (traditional dance), and did more than our fair share of feasting on amazing food. We spent lots if time down by the river, cooling off and enjoying games of volleyball and water rugby with the local kids.

Unfortunately, some of us were a bit too crook to go to church on Sunday morning, but those who made it along got to experience the amazing harmonies of the congregation singing hymns and praying together.

After church we packed up our gear and began our walk from Kinani to Vuna Yawa. Vuna Yawa means 'away from the source' in Fijian and consisted of a collection of traditional bures down by the river on the outskirts of Draiba village. We received a huge welcome! The Hutchins students of 2014 were the first visitors from outside Fiji to visit



Draiba, and we were the first to stay at Vuna Yawa. In our honour, a cow was slaughtered and the whole village came to celebrate.

In Draiba we worked with local village elders to explain and distribute the water filters which we had brought with us from Australia to help supply clean drinking water to the village. We also made lots of friends playing rugby, working on the farm, visiting Novosa Central College, exploring the river and Sawene Cave, and partying at a village *meke*!

It was hard to say farewell to our Fijian family. We had learnt so much and developed some strong friendships. A huge thanks to Mr Robbie 'Tuki' Tuck, Mr Sam 'Muz' Murray, The Number 1 Gappie – Jonas Vollmer, and Tom from Destination Dreaming.

Central Australia Challenge

"The Red Centre is the physical and metaphoric heart of Australia. It encompasses the World Heritage-listed Uluru and Kata Tjuta, Alice Springs, the ancient MacDonnell Ranges, and the wonders of Watarrka. The red rock monolith of Uluru and the mysterious shapes of Kata Tjuta rise above the surrounding sand dunes. These towering sentinels show a different aspect from every angle. The traditional custodians of this land, the Anangu, believe the Central Australian landscape was created at the beginning of time by their ancestors. Their descendants have been protecting these sacred lands for thousands of generations since."

This year we took two groups to Central Australia. We had two off-site campuses and each group spent one week of their expedition at the Yipirinya School and one week on 'safari'. Having the extra time to explore Central Australia worked well. We were able to spend some extra time at Uluru, Kata Tjuta, Watarrka and also explore the West MacDonnell Ranges and Hermannsburg.

The 'safari' was a major expedition in itself. This year we hired a large truckbus and the boys were responsible for setting up camp, cooking and cleanup each day. We were struck by the landscape, which was so different from the familiarity of Tasmania. We also were immersed in aboriginal history and the significance of the landmarks such as Kata Tjuta and Uluru. Understanding the term "Tjukurpa" and its relevance to us all was a big part of the safari. The arid beauty of Australia's Red Centre is intensified by this landscape's natural monuments and their spiritual power.

Yipirinya School is always a unique experience. The ongoing challenge of bringing two very different cultures together in a learning environment is evident every day. Our boys helped out in the classroom. They worked tirelessly to help the class run smoothly but gained the most through the relationships they formed with the students. Watching our boys interact with friendship, care and compassion was a highlight.

One of the most sobering aspect from our time in Alice Springs was witnessing the divide between many of the indigenous communities and mainstream Australia. This was in terms of health services, transportation, housing and education but also in terms of culture. We hope the experience will enable our students to speak up for equality and support our nation's rich indigenous history and culture before we lose it.

Island Challenge

In keeping with tradition, 2015 saw the birth of another brand new Island Challenge. The biggest part of the challenge for the participants was dealing with the unknown. Whilst parents were privy to the itinerary in the week preceding the expedition, the boys remained in the dark. Each day their adventure would unfold with challenges, activities and tasks. No two days were the same.

We decided upon a Bruny Island/Tasman Peninsula circuit. The two groups also saw many new activities and modes of transport in this year's expedition. The journey included a three day expedition in small sailing vessels. Without an engine, the boys had to quickly hone sailing and rowing skills. Finding a sheltered campsite and maintaining the vessel became integral of reaching the destination in Norfolk Bay. The boys also were given a chance to complete their own three day Capes experience on foot and mountain bike as they explored Tasman National Park between Cape Raoul and Pirates Bay, taking in the spectacular coastal cliffs, walks, waterfalls, dunes, caves and wilderness. A highlight of this leg was a giant coastal abseil followed by a cliff jump into the ocean in Fortescue Bay. Another highlight was the close encounters with seals and dolphins.

In the middle of the trip, after a fantastic day at Crescent Bay, the boys found Windeward Bound at anchor in Safety Cove and so began the next leg of their journey. Battling strong wind and high seas, they sailed across Storm Bay to Bruny Island. A solo challenge that included building your own shelter and spending a night alone was a fitting challenge, followed by kayaking, walking and a death-defying sea-level traverse.

We all had an amazing experience with two great groups of young men. The great scenery, challenging activities and spectacular scenery will remain with all those who took part in this unique challenge. A big thank you to our expedition staff: Mr Mark Oates, Mr Matt Eaton, Mr Nick Hancock and Mr Ben McArthur. We are very fortunate to have such good men as mentors and leaders. Their skills in the outdoors and commitment to the outcomes of the program were integral in making the expedition a success. We also owe a debt of gratitude to the 10th Hobart Scouts for their help with boats and to landowners for allowing us access to some premier campsites.

Libraries and learning – when learners learn to use a library, the doors to learning are always open!

Our three libraries - the Early Learning Centre Library, Stephens Library (Junior and Middle Schools), and Nettlefold Library (Senior School) – and our two main satellite resource collections of the John Bednall Centre for Excellence and the Power of 9 Marieville Campus serve a variety of purposes for the students and staff. The print and digital resources support the curriculum; print books, graphic novels, audiobooks and ebooks nurture recreational reading interests; and there are a host of activities throughout the year to promote reading, and other services such as videoconferencing to staff and students.

Targeting our Council of International Schools (CIS) accredited vision for an international education, celebrating cultural diversity, as well as the Australian Curriculum implementation, the annual Library Resources appeal fund assist in maintaining an attractive up-to-date print and digital collection.

Library lessons for Early Learning Centre and Junior School students introduce and advance students' understanding of information literacy, from differentiating between fiction and non-fiction, to finding information on and offline, to understanding the why and how of referencing. Once again we participated in the National Simultaneous Storytime, albeit a day late due to Learn-to-Swim events! This year we gathered in the Early Learning Centre multipurpose room to share a reading of The Brothers Quibble by Nick Bland. Mrs Kate Reid wore a crown and had golden locks, just like Spalding Quibble, and some of the Prep boys made much fancier crowns to the reading. The students loved this story about brothers learning how to get along.

From June to August, the Premier's Reading Challenge had boys aiming to read 10 books in 10 weeks. We had 159 students participate across Prep to Year 5, with some great efforts by boys to read above and beyond!

Books light up our world was the major event in Term 3. Early Learning Centre and Junior School classes read various books from the shortlist and discussed them in Library lessons, then we celebrated Book Week in style with Prep-Year 6 assembly with students and staff dressed up as characters from their favourite books. This year we had so many Junior School students participating that we nearly filled the stage! The Stephens Library was decorated with examples from staff and students of books that light up our world.

Term 3 also had some other excitement for the boys in Years 1-2, who had the pleasure of listening to Sally Rippin, the author of the wonderful Hey Jack! books, when we shared a visit with Fahan School students. Students enjoyed learning about Sally's childhood as sources of inspiration for her books and they were inspired to create their own stories. The students really enjoyed the visit and were enthralled by Sally reading aloud from some of her books. Since her visit the Hey Jack! books are almost never on the shelf!

Middle School students started September with a bang, listening to James Phelan, author of the amazingly popular Last Thirteen series. James was an amazing speaker, who was very tuned in to what makes an appealing adventure story for boys. He also told us how he uses details from real life in his stories, from descriptions of places he has been to uses the names and characteristics of friends and family. Years 7-8 boys have since been hunting the shelves for his books.

LIBRARIES AND LEARNING

Hosted by the library vendor SpringShare, our virtual library web platform called LibGuides is used for content curation and 'took off' this year. It is fast becoming a key resource supporting teaching and learning from school or home. LibGuides provide subject-specific resources; information on referencing and academic integrity through the Academic Integrity guide; tips for researching and writing your best possible assignment though the How Do I Research? guide; and information about new and great reading.

Senior School students participated in a month long reading initiative where students participated in reading-related activities during Mentor. Good books are recommended through the Great Reads LibGuide and on smart TV displays of these book covers in the Nettlefold Library.

This year the library ran optional, hands-on information sessions for staff on accessing and using the online library catalogue, setting up personal devices to borrow ebooks from our digital library collections, and using the Explain Everything[™] app to capture student learning. The teacher librarians ran whole-school staff sessions on social media policies and cyber-safety, understanding copyright and creative commons educational licensing and using Turnitin anti-plagiarism software.

Boating courses

Science

The class was on top of the water determining at biodiversity, under the water looking for invading species and surveying human impact on marine environments, both aquaculture and pollution. Their conservation plans are viewable on the Marine School website.

Community Programs

A wonderful insight into marine related careers was gained by Alex Grining, Robert Jiang, Nik Nikitaras and Hugo McCullum through the three-day Working On Water program.

Fifteen students, ably led by Ziah Cooper and Ryan Jones, paraded flags as part of the annual Mariner's Service at St Georges' Church. This event coincided with the centenary of the Mission to Seafarers. The Hutchins Junior School Choir led the music for the service.

For the first time, our Maritime students assisted on the first day of the Australian Wooden Boat Festival to dock the vast flotilla of craft that had taken part in the opening sail past. They gained valuable experience working with the huge variety of vessels on show.

Hutchins students were invited to be part of the Life Jacket Awareness campaign run by Marine and Safety Tasmania (MAST). Australian Standards tested personal flotation devices on swimmers in a pool. MAST wanted to know how various products would perform in real situations. The results can be viewed on the MAST website.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

For the 75 students from Years 10, 11 and 12 enrolled in six different Vocational Education and Training Courses at Hutchins, it has proven to be an exciting and rewarding year, highlighted by a new parallel award system.

Students were able to receive Excellence Awards for Academic Merit and Investment to their Vocational Studies at Speech Night in December.

The Maritime and Transport students received their Coxswain Certificates, boat licences and first aid, as well as developing their water safety and survival skills at sea. With the 12 hour sail being the boys' highlight, this experience gave the boys the opportunity to navigate and pilot one of the School's largest vessels. Hospitality has shown students how to acquire skills in Kitchen Operations, learning the importance of hygiene, preparing small dishes, and completing their Responsible Service of Alcohol. Many of the students were able to showcase their skills at school events, including the inaugural Hutchins Art Prize exhibition at Long Gallery. Fitness was a new addition to our Vocational Education program for 2015. Students completing this certificate will be able to work in industry as personal trainers. Jayson Seaman, a fitness student was one of the nine finalists at the Tasmanian

Training Awards

Music and Technical Productions allows students to work with industry equipment and perform to and entertain audiences. The students again showcase their talents through the running of Headmasters Assemblies and performing at school events. Engineering Pathways is the most skill-based of all the Vocational Education programs on offer at Hutchins. With a real diverse and talented group of students, outstanding projects and lifelong skills have been developed. VET Engineering Pathways was put in the spotlight when our very own Year 11 student Nicholas Bonnitcha was named as the Vocational Education and Training Student of the Year at the Tasmanian Training Awards in August.

Nicholas humbly thanked his family and The Hutchins School for his nomination and then dedicated his award to his engineer grandfather who he described as "someone who always believes in me, he is my mentor, confidant, motivator, teacher and idol". Nicholas describes himself as a self-driven and creative person. He loves to use his hands and wants to be able to someday share his ideas with the world. Through VET Engineering Pathways, Nicholas was able to attend work experience at BMW, which he said was one of the highlights. Nicholas has ambitions to become a mechanical engineer or fitter and turner, and also wants to work for the Australian Defence Force as a maritime submariner in the future. Nicholas will complete Year 12 in 2016 and take up his role as ambassador for the State Training Authority promoting and encouraging young people to engage in Vocational Education in schools. Nicholas also hopes to work towards a more active leadership role at Hutchins, mentoring and encouraging students who find it difficult to learn in traditional ways, encouraging and assisting them to believe in themselves. Nicholas completed the full VET Engineering Pathways II and Maritime Transport and Distribution II Certificates at Hutchins in 2015, and he will continue with further Vocational Courses in 2016.

EARLY LEARNING CENTRE AND JUNIOR SCHOOL

Achieving wellbeing has been the concern of philosophers since Aristotle and is in many respects the essence of human existence. It is what we strive for and always have.

When we talk about wellbeing we are talking about two things, how people feel and how they function in their lives. At Hutchins this aligns with our goal - to build good men; fostering wellbeing is to nurture the development of good men. Our wellbeing is influenced by the actions we take, and the way we think - our attitudes, sense of purpose and values. It is also influenced by our genes, experiences and environment.

One of the fundamentals for learning is that the individual recognises their uniqueness, their talents and their ability to contribute. To experience wellbeing and happiness we should look back on all our efforts with a sense of accomplishment - "I did as well as I possibly could".

To this end we offer our boys a huge variety of curricular and co-curricular experiences to encourage them and help them to understand that achievement is not just about academic success. Childhood can be vulnerable and requires a range of skills, strengths, and strategies to meet challenges. As well as those embedded in the wide range of subjects and experiences boys cover in the Early Learning Centre and Junior School, we explicitly teach social and emotional skills in a variety of programs and forums such as RAVE, Bounce Back, pastoral time, Bravehearts, the Growing Up program and Outdoor Education. Through these opportunities the boys are equipped to experience and negotiate the full range of emotions and are encouraged and supported to be open to whatever comes and are ready to learn from it.

Einstein once said "Not everything that matters can be measured and not everything that can be measured matters". Success is not just about test scores or report grades. We are looking at values such as courage, empathy, and integrity.

We are developing the whole child, cultivating the person - building good men. If we don't understand that, then we don't understand education.

We want our children to flourish, to live noble, courageous, and compassionate lives. These inner qualities are not always obvious or tangible. In many ways these qualities are like a stained glass window they illuminate from within.

Each of our boys has a unique design and a very different story to tell. Just like a stained glass window, our lives are intertwined and interdependent. Summer and winter sports

All boys in Years 3-6 participated in a summer sport (Terms 1 and 4) and winter sport (Terms 2 and 3). Summer Sport options included an introduction to sailing, rowing, bushwalking, tee ball, cricket, Brazilian Jui Jitsu, triathlon, touch football and tennis. All training for these sports occurred during Thursday and Friday Sport periods, with some of the sports also having an optional representative component.

Winter sports rosters for soccer, Australian Rules football, water polo, hockey, table tennis and basketball were well embraced and we saw record numbers of players and teams. Overall there were over 25 Early Learning Centre and Junior School teams participating, with some boys playing in up to five separate winter sports. Soccer was again tremendously popular with 175 boys from Years 2-6 registered to play in the Central Region Junior Soccer Association.

External competitions and activities

The Hutchins Junior School was again extremely well represented in external sporting competitions. This diverse range of characters from overseas has been complemented by 'gappies' from Germany and the USA.

2015 saw a new fashion item appear in the House: thanks to the initiative and organisational skills of this year's Burbury House Captain, the boarders all received track pants with the Burbury House crest on them. They arrived in



time for the cooler winter months and have been a resounding success.

Boarding activities have included trips to Zone 3, the cinema (to see the latest Bond film), Bonorong Wildlife Park, Oatlands and Ross, Government House, Sheffield Shield cricket at the Blundstone Arena and various social events with the boarders from St Michael's Collegiate & The Fahan School. Although there was disagreement among the adjudicating panel about the style of individual speakers, they were unanimous in their decision because of the clarity and consistency of the Old Boys' argument: text-book debating!

From the Captain of Debating

When we think of challenges, we probably think of outdoor education or sporting or academic tests at school. I believe that actually, one of the biggest challenges that one can face at school is getting up in front of an audience, especially your peers and speaking to them. Public speaking isn't something that's easy. It takes you outside of your comfort zone. I started debating in Year 5 when I was still in primary school and I loved it! I loved getting up in front of an audience and talking to them. Here we are, driving on a thirty degree morning through herds of traffic and Mum is crying. These are proper tears as well. If she were a school boy I'd tell her to toughen up but she isn't and I couldn't anyway. She always seems to act like a child whenever I'm with her, which is great because I feel smart all the time; something that reverses when Dad is around. He's not here now though; I said goodbye to him this morning, so there's nothing to worry about. I start laughing at my mother's crying and together we create this perfect clash of unpleasantness. I quickly turn up the music to add to our laugh-cry harmonies and as soon as Mum works out that the song is 'Together in Electric Dreams,' her cries turn into screams. Rowing

Strong performances, particularly in sweep rowing saw the Under 16 First VIII undefeated all season, taking out the Southern Head of the River, the Head of the River and the School Championships eight. A highlight at the Head of the River was the Second VIII posting the second fastest time, well clear of the rest of the field.

Other strong performances by the Under 16s included taking both divisions of the fours at the Head of the River, and the quad and four at the school championships.

The Open squad faced stiff competition from Scotch Oakburn College, but took out the Open Schoolboy Eights at Launceston & Henley, the Southern Head of the River and in a close-fought Head of the River, retained the Golden Fleece Cup.

The Open quad was undefeated all season, culminating in winning the Jack Jeffries Shield at the School Championships. Hutchins also took out the inaugural Schoolboys' Pairs event at the championships.

Rugby

It was a difficult year as a number of the junior clubs in the competition were still developing and so participation was down from previous years, particularly in the U16 age group. It was fantastic to see how far they had progressed when they played their final game of the season as they came very close to victory against a very talented opponent. This demonstrated commendable spirit and commitment from a young team made up mostly of Year 9 students. This experience has put them in good stead for a very successful year in 2016.

The First XV had the foundations for a very successful year with a strong group of players stepping up from a premiership win in the U16 competition in 2014. There was also a nucleus of players from the team that secured the U18 trophy also that year. However, a number of key players received serious injuries early in the season which initially curtailed the team's momentum. They experienced some defeats early in their campaign to retain the premiership, but this did not dampen their determination to continually improve and give no quarter in every game. Their stalwart commitment and determination were

rewarded by being placed in the finals playoffs. They played valiantly against a very physical side that enjoyed a home ground advantage in the preliminary final. However, the home team overcome our team's half time lead and we were beaten in the final quarter of the game. The First XV demonstrated exemplary spirit throughout the season and were outstanding role models for the younger members of our Hutchins team.

It has been a great year of rugby and we wish all the rugby school leavers our very best in their future endeavours and we sincerely thank them for their contribution to our team. Australian Schools Teams Racing Championships

The racing then returned to Tasmania for the state titles in March, with thre Hutchins boys taking part – Jock Calvert, Fergus Charles and Nicholas Smart. Jock took the win to claim the title for the third year and Fergus Charles came home in a close third, narrowly missing out on taking second – Fergus Charles did manage to get a race win however. Nicholas did an outstanding job in his first regatta and had some great races in trying conditions.

The last regatta of the season was held in Queensland and was the second and final selection regatta for the youth team. Jock and Angus Calvert as well as Fergus Charles contested Queensland youth week, and whichever brother came home in front would be the Australian representative. The conditions were tough and experience showed as Jock took another victory, and claimed his spot on the Australian Youth Team for the third year in a row. This will see him travel to Malaysia in December to compete against the world's best. Fergus had a great regatta in Queensland and got himself onto the podium in third place, while Angus struggled with the light conditions against smaller opponents and ended up in fourth.

To conclude, the windsurfers at Hutchins have excelled over the 2014/15 sailing season, and shown a high level of character and humility both in victory and defeat. The 2015/16 sailing season will be exciting and filled with more great racing, and there will be plenty of talented Hutchins boys in the mix.

International Cadet World Championships – Lake Garda 2015

Hutchins was well represented in the International Cadet with a number of students competing in the Australian Championship in Port Lincoln and the World Championship in Lake Garda, Italy. Strong results at the Nationals saw Toby Burnell and Charlie Goodfellow finish 9th, William Cooper 11th, Benjamin Boman 15th, and Sam Abel and Hugo Allison 2nd. Sailors, Sam Abel, Hugo Allison and William Cooper were selected to represent their country, travelling to Italy in July. Our boys had outstanding performances with Sam and Hugo becoming World Champions, bringing the trophy back to Hobart, 29 years after it was last won by a Tasmanian. We had around 26 boys competing and the Race Officer Greg Rowlings set a course that would be fun for all! After a shaky start, the fleet got away and Charles Connor in the Moth blitzed the field around the course. Jock Calvert on his RS-X Sailboard was not far behind with the Hugh Hickling and Max McLagan 29er rounding out the top three in line honours!
