Chairman of the Board

It is a great pleasure to provide this contribution, as it gives an opportunity to reflect on the past year and at the same time look to the future. 2017 is the year of the Rooster in the Chinese calendar and was predicted to be an 'enterprising and fruitful year, a year of results, achievements'. Of course, each year has its particular challenges and 2017 is no exception. On any reflection, The Hutchins School met both challenges and opportunities it has faced. Our year began when Dr Rob McEwan took up his appointment as the 19th Headmaster of The Hutchins School. I wish to acknowledge Dr McEwan's leadership - he has embedded our living motto 'what you do matters' in his stewardship of the School.

The Headmaster's Commissioning Service at St David's Cathedral was an important milestone for the School. The Headmaster's Commissioning, and the Anniversary Service later in the year provided direct and important reinforcement of the connection of Hutchins as an Anglican School. This occasion provides an opportunity to reinforce continuity within change, The Hutchins School was founded to commemorate the work of Archdeacon Hutchins and the School's current Guiding Statements provide a direct link to the aspirations of the School's founders.

BUILDING GOOD MEN

The Hutchins School prides itself on its commitment to 'building good men'. While this may be dismissed as a slogan and mere words on a page, it underpins the vision and values of the School. Building good men is education in its broad sense, where activities outside the classroom are as important as those on the formal timetable. I am referring here to the broad-based co-curricular program, the camps and excursions, the Power of 9 with its challenges as well as the building momentum in relation to wellbeing and initiatives that will continue to develop in coming years such as the Years 2-12 program, and Dr Arne Rubenstein's work with the School of the 'rites of passage'. Of course, the outcomes that develop through these activities do not just happen, they depend on the commitment and capacity of our staff, as well as great partnership with parents/carers and community. It is these elements that linger long after the work in the classroom has passed. To all staff, my thanks for all that you do for the boys at our school. Headmaster

In my first address to the Middle and Senior School boys in February of this year, I shared a story of a Junior School boy on his first day at Hutchins. The young boy was waiting at a bus stop, dressed smartly in his brand new uniform, his black blazer with magenta piping making it known to all he was a Hutchins boy. With the young boy's mum anxiously watching from a distance, making sure her son got on to the right bus and safely on his way, she observed two much taller, older boys, also wearing Hutchins blazers, approach the bus stop and immediately engage her son in conversation. As the bus approached, one of the older boys put his hand on her son's shoulder and said, 'you're with us' and they boarded the bus together. Hutchins is much more than a school, it is a community.

It was a similar warm welcome that I experienced this year when commencing my term as Headmaster of this great school. Now at the end of my first year, I look back over the past 12 months with some astonishment at the efforts and achievements of the boys and staff across the full breadth of experience and opportunity that exists at Hutchins. Academically, boys have excelled across all learning areas. The year began with news that the graduating class of 2016 had reaffirmed The Hutchins School as one of the highest achieving schools in Tasmania. Three boys achieved an ATAR above 99 and boys from Hutchins were listed 28 times for achieving the highest possible score allocated to a pre-tertiary subject. Equally outstanding results were achieved in the Vocational Education and Training courses with all 11 boys who completed a VET qualification moving into an apprenticeship. Overall, The Hutchins School had the highest percentage of students awarded the Tasmanian Certificate of Education from all schools in the State.

In academic competitions, The Hutchins School won the State title in the Year 8 and Year 10 da Vinci Decathlons before representing Tasmania in the national event in Sydney. In what was an outstanding year of achievement in Science, a team of Year 10 boys won the Silver Medal in the Junior Young Physicists' Tournament in Brisbane while another group of boys attended the International Student Science Conference in Hong Kong. Closer to home, Hutchins boys won a number of awards at the University of **Tasmania Science Investigations Awards** including Best Physical Sciences Project Years 7 and 8 and were runners-up in the **Environmental and Marine Science Years 7** and 8. In Business Studies, Year 9 students won the state ASX Schools Sharemarket Game, the second consecutive year Hutchins has won the State title, and boys in Year 10 won the group division of the CPA Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition from 170 entrants from Years 10–12. Hutchins boys also won the State Philosothon Competition and were national finalists in the Australian Space Design Competition. Equally impressive results were achieved in English, Mathematics, Geography, Chinese Speaking and Business Studies where significant numbers of boys across the Junior, Middle and Senior School's placed in the top 1% in Australia for their respective competitions.



Outside the classroom we enjoyed the first ever Middle School musical, *Bats*, a sell out over three nights, the very successful dramatic productions of *The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon* and *Stalag 17*, the outstanding Dance@Hutchins showcase involved over 80 boys from the Early Learning Centre through to the Senior School, a busy arts calendar that featured Jazz@Hutchins, The James Scott-Power Recital and a Music Ensemble Showcase concert. Who could forget the magical evening of art, performances, and installations that was the Magenta & Blacker Art Showcase?!

I trust that we all appreciate the boys' drive and commitment that led them to lift the State title in swimming, hockey, athletics, orienteering, cross country and for the fourth consecutive year the SATIS Head of the River title and Senior and Boys Aggregate Shields in rowing as well as winning the Tasmanian Schools Match Racing Championships in sailing. In dance, boys won the DanceLife Unite regionals in Hobart, placed 1st from 26 schools in the Musical Theatre section of the Brisbane Arts Eisteddfod and placed in the Hip Hop and Jazz sections from a highly competitive 47 schools.

The outstanding results across the full breadth of curricular and co-curricular activities speak for themselves. They bear evidence of effort over extended periods of time, of skill and attention to detail on the part of the teachers and coaches, of encouragement and support of parents/ carers and families, of aptitude and ability on the part of the boys, and of passion and diligence of both boys and teachers. There is however much work that is done at Hutchins which is not directly measured. I refer to the careful development of character and the personal qualities of each and every boy.

At the heart of everything we do at The Hutchins School is the development of character – to build good men.

The evidence is plentiful and is easily seen in the actions of our boys. Examples include Year 12 boys reading and playing games with the Year 2 boys throughout the year, boys across the School supporting younger boys through whole school House activities, community service initiatives that include support for Albie House (Freezin' for a Reason), Leukaemia Foundation (World's Greatest Shave), Cancer Council (Relay for Life), Anglicare, Bravehearts, two children sponsored in Watoto, Uganda and some staff contribute to a fund to pay the wages of a teacher in Cambodia.

A FOCUSED IMPROVEMENT AGENDA

Strategically, this year has been one of wide spread review, planning and implementation across all aspects of our operation. In teaching and learning, the whole school curriculum was mapped electronically, student Reports were redesigned to address the requirement of the Australian Curriculum and classrooms were renovated in the Senior School to reflect a student centred pedagogy. The School was thoroughly reviewed by the Non-Government Schools **Registration Board across 12** standards related to curriculum, facilities, compliance and operational viability and was granted five years registration. A pleasing outcome that serves as an endorsement of the effective operation and good governance of our school.

A Year 2 and 12 program was launched that strengthened the sense of community and belonging that exists at Hutchins. Changes were made to the School's communication strategy with the introduction of Parent Paperwork, streamlining parent/carer online access by removing multiple logins and the rebranding of publications.

A comprehensive asset management plan was developed that marks the way forward for targeted and staged facility improvement and maintenance that includes buildings, resources and grounds. In addition to the asset management plan, an architect was engaged this year to develop a site master plan that provides direction for capital works over the next 20 years. In the classroom, Early Learning Centre and Junior School staff participated in numeracy workshops led by Anita Chin, a leading mathematics curriculum expert, to design innovative learning experiences for boys and a wellbeing program was trialed in the Senior School that will be further developed and refined in 2018.

Much of the work completed in 2017 has been necessary to set the foundation and direction for future growth that will keep The Hutchins School at the forefront of boys' education in Australia. With the platform now set, we look to 2018 with a sense of anticipation for the opportunities that lie ahead. Some of the initiatives planned for 2018 include:

- The development of a comprehensive whole school teaching and learning framework that will include the explicit teaching of higher-order thinking skills, the design of learning tasks and environments conducive to optimal learning and development of qualities in the boys that will have Hutchins boys amongst the best prepared young men in Australia for a rapidly changing and highly connected world.
- The development of a Rite of Passage program for boys. This program is aimed at expanding the scope and strengthening the development of character in young men that currently features prominently in the Power of 9 program. In 2018, the first phase of the expansion will focus on initiatives tailored to boys in the Middle School that will include strengthening the parent/carer-school partnership.

- A review of community service initiatives with an aim to move service beyond fundraising to student engagement and service learning. This review is a key element in the expansion of character development in boys and will frame wellbeing initiatives within a context of giving – valuing others and their wellbeing and responding accordingly.
- Redesigning the learning experiences and pastoral support for boys in the Middle School to reflect what is known about this significant period of change in a boy's development. Greater crosscurriculum integration, creation of home room teachers and greater co-operative learning experiences will reflect an authentic middle school pedagogy that enhances student motivation, belonging, and encourages each boy to discover his aptitudes and interests. The restructure of the Middle School will culminate in Year 6 boys becoming the first year of Middle School in the years to come.
- An enhanced digital learning environment for boys from Kindergarten to Year 5 that will be highly controlled through the provision of iPads (Kindergarten to Year 2) and Chromebooks (Years 3–5).
- Refurbishment of classrooms across the School including a major refurbishment of Science laboratories in the Senior School to be completed over the summer break in readiness for the commencement of classes in 2018.

I thank all of our staff for their tireless efforts, their daily words of encouragement to the boys and their genuine care for the boys' wellbeing, learning and growth. It is our staff that makes Hutchins a truly great school. Finally, I congratulate Thomas Dunbabin, School Captain, William Smith, School Vice-Captain, the Prefects, House Captains and each of our Year 12s who have led and cared for our school and all who are in it.

As I come to the end of my first year at The Hutchins School, I thank the Board for the opportunity they have given me to lead this great school. In particular, I thank the Board Chairman, Professor Marcus Haward for the support and guidance he has offered me both personally and professionally.

I look forward to the opportunities that lie ahead in 2018.

During the mid-year break a friend who was on holiday in the USA took a photo of a quote by President Theodore Roosevelt that was featured on a wall at the Natural History Museum in New York City. My friend is a parent of two boys at Hutchins and this quote resonated with his view of what we at Hutchins strive to do for our boys:

'I want to see you game, boys, I want to see you brave and manly, and I also want to see you gentle and tender.

Be practical as well as generous in your ideals. Keep your eyes on the stars and keep your feet on the ground.

Courage, hard work, self-mastery, and intelligent effort are all essential to successful life.

Character, in the long run, is the decisive factor in the life of an individual and of nations alike.' I also like this quote and feel it sums up nicely what we value here at Hutchins in striving to build good men and our focus on developing character.

Our new Headmaster, Dr Rob McEwan, started the year off by outlining for staff his focus on knowing each boy, and on teaching and learning; he followed this up later in the year with outlining a vision for embedding critical thinking skills into a P-12 teaching and learning framework. I know staff are genuinely excited about working collaboratively to develop this framework and to extend and integrate the already excellent work being done in each sub-school so that each Hutchins boy will be equipped with an arsenal of thinking skills, and will be delivered with a common language as he moves from the ELC through to the Senior School. This focus will add significant momentum to the work we had commenced last year in developing a schoolwide pedagogical framework and further reinforces our commitment to helping each boy to be the best learner he can be - learners who can manage their own learning; learners who are critical and creative thinkers; learners who are able to work collaboratively together and communicate effectively.

This year at Hutchins has provided many highlights for me: teaching a wonderful group of Year 11 and 12 students (including students from St Michael's Collegiate);



working closely with the Maths teaching staff; leading the Chess Club and seeing so many enthusiastic students, especially from the Junior School, join the club and participate in tournaments with great success; watching our Hutchins Dance Troupe at the Dance Showcase; seeing our firsts hockey team again win their premiership in such a convincing and sportsmanlike manner; attending The James Scott-Power Recital, a combined Hutchins and St Michael's Collegiate concert - this was a wonderful event showcasing the depth and breadth of musical talent at our two great schools. Another highlight was Hutchins hosting the annual Bishop's Training Day - this statewide Anglican diocese training event, with a theme of 'Flourish', had over 300 people attend. These are but a few of the many rich experiences that have peppered our 2017 calendar and I look forward to many more in 2018.

In 2018 we will look to facilitate more crosscurricular learning opportunities for our boys as well as further developing a 'thinking curriculum' throughout the School. Other tasks we will commence in 2018 include: an ongoing review of curriculum offerings to ensure our curriculum

remains innovative and provides opportunities for developing 21st century skills; maximising opportunities for the student voice to be heard in determining the direction of learning within the classroom; and incorporating more inquirybased learning opportunities; build systems to interrogate school data sets and apply learning analytics to promote more effective differentiation and tracking of individual student performance; and continue our appraisal of our student support structures to enhance the academic care and wellbeing of our students.

This year has been a year of many great successes and has also presented some challenging times for our school – through it all it has been the strength of our community that has shone. through and I am grateful to be part of a school that is united and supportive of each individual member. I know that our Class of 2017 will leave us with memories to cherish and I look forward to watching them succeed in the world as gentlemen of honour.

Teaching and Learning

The expectations on teaching and learning in schools today is increasingly demanding. So much is expected of teachers to deliver a curriculum that meets a future that education has yet to define and society and industry have yet to build. Our boys require cognitive skills to develop how they process information, reason, remember



and relate to each other; they are expected to think in complex and nuanced ways as well as keeping an eye on the big picture and an open ended career pathway. They also require the non-cognitive, or soft skills that relate to patterns of thought, emotions and behaviour; the attributes that build character, that make them good Hutchins men.

So what is it that future employers, tertiary institutions and society in general need from Year 12 graduates today? Educational and industry experts tell us that students need the ability to solve complex problems in real time, they need to be able to think and work creatively in both digital and non-digital environments to develop unique and useful solutions. They need to think analytically, to compare, contrast, evaluate, create and apply solutions and collaborate seamlessly in both physical and virtual spaces, with real and virtual partners globally.

How do we measure this type of thinking, what does it look like in the curriculum and the classroom and how is it assessed? These are the questions facing teachers and schools today. This year we have made some inroads into addressing these questions. We have recently formed a new research group, the Teaching and Learning Framework Group, to identify a framework that will enable us to develop those cognitive and non-cognitive skills our boys are required to master. We aim to take a futurist approach and be creative and visionary in our research so that we can encourage and develop multiple thinking skills and ensure best practice in our classrooms.

We have also begun the roll out of Chromebooks into the Junior School to enable the younger boys to access a school-based digital world. This has been very successful and the boys are very eager to use technology in the classroom because in not only reflects their lives, but provides an engaging learning platform.

2017 was also a year to introduce a new way of reporting at Hutchins. Learning outcomes reflective of the strands of the Australian Curriculum were included in a newly designed Report aimed at providing more information about the boys' knowledge, skills and progression within subjects.

We have also seen a more vigorous uptake of Rory as a Learning Management Platform which will continue into 2018. Rory will increasingly become the means of real time feedback during 2018 and beyond; a method of feedback that is aimed at improving the boys' learning and academic outcomes. One of the recent academic highlights of 2017 was the newly revised Year 12 Graduating with Distinction and High Distinction program. Year 12 students were invited to enrol in the program which is both academic and service based. Along with a compulsory service hour component, boys were required to choose an ethical or moral issue relevant to today's society and using a field or branch of ethics, religion or philosophy as a reference point, research and present a paper and mini 'Ted Talk' on their chosen field. Topics included domestic violence, genetic engineering, stem cell research, drug law reform, xenotransplantation, food wastage, and euthanasia. The work presented by the students was exceptional. They each demonstrated that they had become critical, creative and ethical thinkers who are able to go into the world with the cognitive and non-cognitive skills that will ensure they live with dignity and integrity in a globalised world.

While the ever increasing expectations on our education systems can be a daunting prospect for teachers and parents/carers alike, we are constantly reminded that our boys never fail us and continually make us proud with their exceptional achievements, their depth of character and their service to the community. They are indeed good Hutchins men.

Staff professional learning

The Hutchins School continues to work closely with the International Boys' School Coalition (IBSC) in many areas.

This year in particular, the IBSC has partnered with CIRCLE, the Centre for Innovation, Research, Creativity and Leadership in Education, an educational agency based in Australia to conduct research into Character Education in boys' schools. Character education is an important learning experience that we seek to provide for our boys. Broadly defined, character education refers to student engagement with core moral values and virtues, and to the development of character traits or strengths that promote well-being, purpose and flourishing. Hutchins is one of 48 prominent boys' schools around the world involved in this research project which will bring many benefits to our school, as well as to this larger network of boys' schools of which we are a member. Over the span of the 18 month project, we will be involved in a number of research exercises on character education, culminating in an intensive report just over a year from now. It is ambitious research, and we are very excited to be a project school and look forward to the report in 2018.

This year staff members, Ms Cath Hogan and Mr James McLeod, presented their Action Research projects at the International Boys' Schools Coalition (IBSC) annual conference in Baltimore, USA at the end of Term 2. The Hutchins School is a founding member of IBSC, and our work over recent years through our Action Research process is well recognised, nationally and internationally. The annual conference was held at The Boys' Latin School of Maryland, with nearly 600 delegates from across the world, with the unique feature in that each delegate champions boys' education.

Each year IBSC select, with the support of their respective school, Action Researchers from boys' schools across the world who are passionate about improving their pedagogical practice through evidence based research that has an impact on the teaching and learning of boys. Over two days, prior to the conference, colleagues, Ms Hogan and Mr McLeod, were immersed in their Action Research processes, refining their presentations, the topic collaboration and the power of learning groups. The theme of this research looked at what skills we need to deliberately teach our boys to enable them to participate meaningfully and successfully in collaborative thinking and learning groups. These skills might include learning to listen to others; involving all members of the group, not just the leader or the more vocal students; valuing all ideas and contributions; developing confidence around risk-taking and making mistakes; vigorous questioning of ideas; learning how to accept criticism; and learning how to give constructive feedback. In addition, the research looked at providing opportunities for meaningful group learning: exploring meaningful topics with real-world connections, and setting aside enough time to think and respond and develop ideas.

From the culmination of 18 months of work, Ms Hogan and Mr McLeod presented their Action Research at the 23nd annual IBSC conference. Ms Hogan presented research on How might learning about personality traits assist grade 6 gifted boys to be productive members of a collaborative learning group? Whilst Mr McLeod presented Can building trust during collaborative dramatic study of Shakespeare enhance engagement for year 9 English students? Both colleagues have generated, gathered, and analysed data on their introduced action in order to evaluate the effectiveness in regard to the development of boys as collaborative learners.

Headmaster Seminar Series

WEBBER LECTURE

The 2017 Webber Lecture was given by Lieutenant General (retired) David Morrison AO on 22 May 2017. The focus of the lecture was the power of words and of storytelling. Morrison shared his personal accounts, addressing issues of military culture, what worked, what didn't and more importantly, the reasons why, which he believes, has applicability across many organisations. FROM THE Archives

Digitisation of the Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection rolls on, with individual items being selectively added onsite to our online availability. By the end of this year all regular Hutchins publications should be available online for public reference. Photographs and documents continue to be scanned and uploaded intermittently to augment the thousands already available to the School community, with discrete photograph collections to be placed on our public website for wider availability.

An inaugural Old Boy Collector exhibition was held this year, with a display of artworks owned and generously lent by John Brettingham-Moore ('45). A massive combined effort involving Development Office staff. Art Curator and Archivist resulted in an impressive show and a first-rate opening night with Roger McNeice OAM ('62) as honoured guest. We also held our first Staff Collector/Maker exhibition in the museum, with a display of guilts designed and made by our worldrenowned quilter, Mrs Sally Westcott.

School and family history enquiries continued to come in from external sources, with the bulk of enquiries originating either in-house or from within the School community.



Donations came from everywhere, including some treasures from the grandson of highly-esteemed former Principal of Queens College and Deputy Headmaster of Hutchins, Arthur Augustus Stephens. Photographs were located, developed and framed; trophies required cleaning, packing and occasional repairs; Old Boys had their histories examined for school records and obituaries; slideshows were prepared for the History Wall, work experience students hosted in the archives and articles written for school publications.

Honour boards and trophies continue to be regularly updated, with four new honour boards created for the Neil Thomas Sailing Scholarship, Captains of Sailing, Young Alumni and the ANZ Prize. Following the discovery that externally-produced boards have a significant cost associated with them, we were able to source new honour boards from within the School, thus saving a considerable amount.

<u>New vision:</u> <u>the Hutchins</u> <u>Australian</u> <u>Contemporary</u> <u>Art Prize</u>

After almost 20 years of running a nationally acclaimed art prize for works on paper, the Hutchins Art Committee resolved to reimagine the Hutchins Art Prize in February 2017. The result was a bold and vibrant new vision. This was conveyed by a name change to the Hutchins Australian Contemporary Art Prize. First prize was set at \$20,000, with several new prizes being introduced including a Hutchins staff choice in the amount of \$1,000. The entry criteria were extensively revised to encourage artists working across traditional and contemporary art forms. The intention was to provide a flexible and open forum for artists to present and express their ideas.

To signify this change in direction, a rebrand was undertaken and a stylish logo was designed by Sarah Owen Design. An exciting period of development followed, resulting in a discreet website for the new-look art prize, which was launched in early October 2017. To find out more visit www.artprize.hutchins.tas.edu.au.

Forty finalists will be selected by three expert judges to exhibit their work at the stunning waterfront location of Brooke Street Pier 9–27 June 2018. The winners will be announced by the Governor of Tasmania at a glittering Awards Evening planned for 8 June at the venue. Dark MOFO will be running concurrently and it is intended to build upon the cultural tourism opportunities inspired by the festival. An active public program and tours will be hosted to connect with a wider audience and explore ideas generated by the artists' work.

The Hutchins Australian Contemporary Art Prize 2018 has the support of some wonderful and iconic Tasmanian businesses. Brooke Street Pier, Artery, Fullers Bookshop, Wrest Point Casino, Simmons Wolfhagen, Red Arrow and Monotone Printers have all made generous contributions.

I am grateful for the commitment to a shared vision and ongoing operational and funding support provided by The Hutchins Foundation Art Committee and The Hutchins School. The School is unique in the delivery of a high-quality art prize product within a national context. It is gratifying to work in a progressive school culture committed to the provision and extension of opportunities for students to experience diverse forms of art.

WHAT IS CHARACTER?

The word character is a Greek word for a mark engraved. Character is what we are; the mark which is stamped on us by our own endeavours and the world around us and it is this which will survive: our indelible print on the world.

Philosophers have wrestled for centuries over how character is best described. One way of looking at it is through three main clusters of character strengths:

- Strengths of Heart the 'interpersonal' or 'helping' strengths. They help you relate in positive ways to other people: gratitude, purpose, and social and emotional intelligence.
- Strengths of Mind the 'intellectual' or 'thinking' strengths. They enable a fertile and independent life of the mind: curiosity, self-control and zest.
- Strengths of Will the intrapersonal' or 'doing' strengths. They help you achieve your goals: grit, growth mindset, optimism and also self-control (Duckworth, 2017).

CHARACTER TAUGHT

'We must remember that intelligence is not enough. Intelligence plus character that is the true goal of education.' - Martin Luther King Junior

Character is not just taught in schools; it is taught through the family and community as well. We work together to help students understand what is ethically important in situations so that they develop the capacity to make the right decisions autonomously. We know that character is shaped from the time we are born, by where we grow up, how we are raised, our spiritual beliefs, the examples our families and teachers provide, as well as the education we receive. Our character may be dramatically altered by a life changing event, but ultimately it is up to us, our attitude and how we respond.

At Hutchins we help give the boys the language, the tools and place to develop their character. This is done explicitly through RAVE, Bounce Back and class pastoral time, but it is modelled implicitly in the daily interactions in the classroom and playground.

CHARACTER HABITS

'Character may be manifested in the great moments but it is made in the small moments.'

- Winston Churchill

It is essential to embed good character so that it becomes a habit, while also staying open to learning and improving. Children need to learn very early that it is the choices they make that mould their character. Character is formed by the choices they make on a daily basis especially when they think no-one is looking.

Our positive behaviour approach and restorative justice practices help to ensure that boys learn to take responsibility for their actions and learn from them – reflecting, repairing and reconnecting with others.



CHARACTER COUNTS

'Men of Character are the conscience of the society to which they belong.' - Ralph Waldo Emerson

Without people of good character there would be no justice, no regard for others: there would be anarchy, savagery, greed and destruction on a huge scale. We can see this right now as tragic events unfold across the world – how people and the Earth suffer when people of poor character seize control. Schools should enable students to become good citizens, to not only be good but to do good. We are all, parents/carers and teachers, preparing the boys for the test of life rather than simply a life of tests.

The character and integrity of a teacher are fundamental and are just as important as teaching skills. I thank our ELC and Junior School teachers, all of whom lead with moral integrity and vision, to influence the boys to do more, dream more and become more; and that begins with the ability to do so themselves.

As teachers and parents/carers we are working towards the same goal – developing and preparing the boys to nurture and master their own strengths, to recognise and appreciate those of others, and to live lives marked by integrity, courage and honour: the definitions of great character.

Technology in the ELC and Junior School

Our students are living in a world of rapid technological change. We are surrounded - at home, at school, at play and at work - by technology and media that have the potential to support and enhance learning and relationships. Every boy who is enrolled in the ELC and Junior School has been born in the digital age. Dr Chip Donoghue, a leading US academic and expert on technology in the early years of education, notes that, as teachers and parents, "we need a positive disposition... the knowledge, skills and experiences that will help children in the digital age". He also cautions that technology should be used carefully. "I want to see teachers who are very thoughtful about it and figure out when it belongs and when it doesn't" (Donoghue, 2017).

Throughout the ELC and Junior School, we try to keep both pieces of advice at the forefront of the decisions we make about the use of technology in the classroom - to achieve its most effective integration in the teaching and learning process. Teachers across all year levels, from Pre-Kindergarten to Year 6, are using technology to enhance learning experiences so as to derive the best outcomes for the boys. They recognise at every stage that technology presents many options and make professional choices as to whether a digital tool, a more traditional approach or a blending of the two will produce the richest outcome for the boys.

Some quick snapshots reveal some of the myriad ways that technology is being used across the ELC and Junior School.

In Year 1, boys used the Book Creator app on the iPads to write and illustrate stories about the adventures of an Australian animal in the ELC playground. With their teachers' help, each story was given a QR code. During reading activities, the boys can scan the code for a particular story and then read it on the iPad.

In Year 4, the journey of the First Fleet and the establishment of the first settlement at Port Jackson are key components of the History curriculum. The boys have used Minecraft to build their own settlement, reflecting the conditions and challenges that beset the first settlers as they sought to set up a working colony in this new land.



Tobias Morgan and Lucas Akl shared their excitement as they explored 'The Gallows' project. They described being able to approach their study of the early settlers in this way as 'work... but fun work' and that the need for teamwork was a really important part of the learning

In Year 6, Bring Your Own Technology sees the boys working with technology as a routine part of their learning. ICT capabilities as well as digital technology outcomes underpin the learning. Boys use technology for research and collation of information; to create products that reflect their learning – games, presentations, books, e-portfolios; to explore coding; to access online educational programs to support classroom learning; to upload work for teacher and parent feedback; to access feedback and refine their work – all of this possible through Rory, 24/7!



Toby Jones explained the process for his Immigrant Story in Year 6 History – from researching his chosen immigrant, to drafting their story, refining the draft to a final copy through online feedback from his teacher via Rory, and sharing the finished product and his grade with his parents, also through Rory

The teachers of the ELC and Junior School also use technology for many aspects of their daily routine. They are ever conscious that technology is always evolving and expanding - not only in the way it is used in education but in the ways our students will use it in their lives at and beyond school. In response to this and the implementation of the Technologies curriculum of the Australian Curriculum, all K–6 classroom teaching staff are undertaking the University of Adelaide's CSER (Computer Science Education Research Group) MOOC (Massively Open Online Course), Digital Technologies – Foundations to 6. In year level teams, the teachers are working with an online community of teachers across Australia to explore how digital technology can be effectively integrated into the classroom, modelling as well their commitment to lifelong learning.

The Centre for Excellence continues to support the needs of boys at both ends of the learning continuum. Early Learning Centre and Junior School boys bounce into the Centre each week for literacy support, numeracy help, individual reading programs and extension and enrichment activities.

The Gifted and Talented program remains focused on ensuring young minds are challenged with statistics, data analysis, conclusions and inference making. The boys are asked to present detailed and critical responses. Code breaking continues to be a winner with the boys, requiring them to understand and apply a range of ciphers and codes. Boys also have the opportunity to design their own research project, focusing on inquiry and developing a deeper, more detailed understanding of a topic or area of interest. Using the Design Thinking framework, the Years 5 and 6 boys looked at real world Hobart issues, designing and manufacturing a prototype, for the Hobart City Council.

The Learning Support boys work hard to consolidate literacy and numeracy basics so as to ensure accuracy and fluency in both. Literacy intervention offers explicit and systematic instruction on the five key elements of early reading programs: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary development and text comprehension. Numeracy Support is targeted intervention aimed at ensuring a solid foundation upon which to build their future maths knowledge and skills. We love seeing the joy on the faces of the boys who can see themselves becoming more

proficient readers and mathematicians. Another year in the fun, busy, productive life of the Centre.

<u>English & Modern</u> Languages

JOURNEYS IN MIDDLE SCHOOL ENGLISH AND MODERN LANGUAGES

In Year 7, students began their personal journeys by writing autobiographies. *Surfing Mr Petrovic* by Colin Bowles, tells the story of Tao, a young boy who comes to accept difference and understand that standing up for that can be powerful. The film, *Red Dog* had the boys laughing and crying as they joined Red Dog and his master on a journey of love and loss. The pinnacle for the students was donning harnesses and climbing walls at Rock It after reading Roland Smith's novel, *Peak*, which follows the journey of a teenage boy as he aims to conquer Mount Everest.

"Red Dog finds a place in everyone's heart. The movie contains a poignant twist and from this a real understanding of mateship develops, touching the town. The men learn to value themselves and those around them." – Lachlan Rogers (Year 7)

In Year 8, the focus has been on the journey we take through challenging times, including bullying over a lack of understanding and intolerance of who we are, what we look like, and what we believe in. Being accepted for who you are is not an easy path for a young football-playing, Indian girl in the film, *Bend it Like Beckham*. Work on our national identity and the experiences of asylum seekers enabled students to consider the progress that has been made in Australia and the physical and emotional journeys others might make to leave their country.

"Hope fuels you, guides you, and makes you realise that in the future there is a chance, a chance to be happy. This is what makes me stand up tall with a straight back and walk, one foot after the other." – Mark Elkerton (Year 8)

"Australia is about joining a distinct national community. With that comes responsibilities and privileges and the opportunity to participate in the Australian way of life. Australia is a lucky country because it absorbs people from all nations and gives them equal opportunity." – Aryan Dubey (Year 8)

Year 7 Chinese began by studying the family and learning how to say colours, their preferences and what they wear at school. The boys have enjoyed using Quizlet's interactive activities and games to consolidate their learning.

In Year 8 Chinese, boys started by discussing nationalities and where they live, followed by telling the time, asking age and birthdays and finally talking about members of their families. They have embraced the website, *Language Perfect* which offers competitions to help practise vocabulary and structures in all four skill areas. The Year 8 History classes were also making connections with the world they live in today and influences from the past when they studied the Viking legacy on Tasmania and how Viking names are linked to many familiar names in the State. Students made recruiting videos for the Roman army in their study on Ancient Rome and Year 7 students also attended the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Black Tuesday bushfires. Many Middle School students participated in the Australian Geography competition and congratulations must go to Year 8 students Benjamin Horsham, Jack Carr, Angus Christie, Evan Beach Arnold, Oliver Bird and Callum Parssey who received a High Distinction.

The inaugural year of Philosophy in Year 8 has been a resounding success. We have covered a great deal of intellectual ground, including, but not limited to, Descartes' Meditations, Baruch Spinoza and his Deus Siva Natura, Arguments for the Existence of God with Paley and Thomas Aquinas. We have also investigated the existentialism of John Paul Sartre and his Myth of Sisyphus. The goal of our study has led us not to answer, but to ask more questions. When asked about their thoughts on the subject, students said:

Philosophy is to me a very unique subject. I would definitely say Philosophy has made me more aware of the history of religion and culture around me. – George Odgers

Information & Communications Technology (ICT)

In the Middle School, ICT is integrated throughout the curriculum as a general capability where students learn to use ICT effectively and ethically to access, create and communicate information and ideas. In Mathematics, for example, students interpret data through the use of spreadsheets.

As well as this, Year 8 students choose from a number of related electives. Two of these, Robotics and Control Systems, and Computer Science, are offered through the Design, Production and Digital Technologies Faculty. Both these electives are aligned to the Australian Curriculum learning area, Technologies – Digital Technologies.

Digital Technologies have transformed our world and fundamentally altered our lives. In view of this and through studying one or both of the two electives on offer, students have been using new technologies such as micro control systems and small board computers to deepen their understanding of how the modern world functions. Learning how to code is essential to successfully operating these devices and all the learning activities undertaken are practically based. Authentic and applied learning experiences improve problem solving skills for both individual and groups within the classroom.

Students are also encouraged to explore trends and issues which will impact society in the near future. Developments such as autonomous vehicles or self-driving transport systems, the Internet of Things, machine learning or artificial intelligence and augmented or virtual reality systems are discussed. Importantly, students are expected to critically analyse and debate the technologies which over time have sparked controversy and caused speculation.

The emphasis in both the Year 8 electives is on computational thinking – a practice of problem-solving and of thought processes which allows complex solutions to be derived using computing systems. Students can demonstrate this through a style of thinking through one of the many visual programming applications available. Here they are building the foundational knowledge required to successfully participate in Senior School digital technologies subjects.

Boys in the Middle School are encouraged to be involved in Music in Year 7 as a core subject, then in Year 8 as an elective. The course in Year 7 has two strands – instrumental and musicianship.

In instrumental every boy has the opportunity to learn to play an instrument in a group situation. They can choose from violin, viola, cello, flute, clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, french horn, guitar and percussion. Thursdays in the Music Faculty are busy, loud and very exciting!

The musicianship class is aligned with the Australian National Curriculum and builds on previous knowledge – extending the boys' understanding of music through listening, composing and performing. Music technology is introduced in Year 7, primarily as a tool for composition.

In Year 8, two different courses are offered – one with an emphasis on playing in an ensemble, the other on further development of aural skills, knowledge of music theory and composition. Boys are encouraged to continue learning an instrument and to become involved in the co-curricular music program.

Studying Music enriches the cognitive, motor, social and personal skills of the learner. It provides a pathway for lifelong learning and engagement.

Outdoor Education

SCIENCE WEEK

The Hutchins Middle School celebrated National Science Week with a full week of activities, starting with an address by Dr Stas Shabala (Lecturer in Physics, extragalactic astrophysicist, and black hole expert).

Dr Shabala spoke to the Years 7 and 8 students on the importance of understanding how science works, and how it is fundamental to improving and developing the technologies we enjoy and that improve our lives. Dr Shabala also discussed some of the big unanswered questions in physics, questions he hopes that some of the current Middle School students will be able to answer in years to come. He also explained how his research on black holes enables him to measure the distance between Hobart and Chile to within 1cm.

This was followed by the Science Film Festival on the Tuesday. On Thursday all Years 7 and 8 students walked over to the Chemistry Lecture Theatre at UTAS to watch a presentation by Jeremy Just on 'The Science of the Invisible'. Jeremy is a Young Tassie Scientist, a PhD student in chemistry, a science communicator, and a much sought after presenter during National Science Week. There was liquid nitrogen, frozen bananas, air cannons, and plenty of explosions, through which the students learned some amazing facts about stuff they cannot normally see.

The week of celebrations ended with the Hutchins/Collegiate Science Fair. Year 7 boys travelled to Collegiate and the Year 8 girls from Collegiate travelled to Hutchins. The Year 8 students faced several challenges during the morning. They had to write a code to send symbols via light signals, make a catapult to hit a target, solve the Circle of Pong challenge, and participate in a science relay.

AUSTRALIA

My name is Dalir. On the day of my eleventh birthday, my family was killed. They were bombed whilst out trying to buy me something. It seems ironic that my name means brave: that is a feeling I don't have much of anymore. I am a refugee. Universally, a refugee is someone who has been persecuted in their country because of religion, race, nationality, political opinion or membership of social groups.

On the border of Iran and Pakistan are things that deserve to be seen only in hell: women and children beaten, anyone not believing in Allah shot and killed. These are things that I had to put up with every single day, eventually driving me crazy.

Late one moonless night I crossed the border. I had known for a short time that to survive I needed to escape. My goal was Australia but there were things I had to do to get there first. During that day, I packed my scant possessions into a backpack: water, food, a few clothes, some money I scrounged from the apartment and a passport. This was the night I had to get out. I waited out the day, fearful of the soldiers marching past. There were numerous stories of potential escapees caught before they left, beaten and thrown into jail to rot. I had to escape.

The sun finally departed the sky and the night was dark. I crept outside my tiny apartment and began the thirty kilometre walk to the border. On the way, I saw things that I wish I had never seen. I couldn't help; I had to get away quickly. Finally, I got to the border. This was the hardest part; I had to sneak past the guards and get into Pakistan undetected. I crept up to the fence, looking for a way to get in. That was it! There was a hole just big enough for my eleven-year-old body to fit through. My shirt was wet and muddy and I squeezed through. I was out! I crept a hundred metres away from the gate before I ran. I ran for hours until I finally came to civilization, in the way of a refugee camp.

After I arrived at the camp I walked to the UNHCR tent where I was told that I would have normally had to wait two weeks but because I was by myself, I could move immediately. Finally, something went my way. I walked to the tent I was given and rested for only a couple of hours.

The boat was terrible. I was only on it for three days but they were the three worst days of my life. I was sick so many times. I was in constant fear of the Australian navy boats, the flash of light always at the front of my mind. If I was found, then it would be sent to Indonesia and my dreams would be dashed. I would be forever stuck in the cycle of needing to escape but never getting far enough.

Land was in sight: Australia, the haven I had dreamt of for a lifetime, was on the horizon! That was when it all went so terribly wrong. Just as I thought I was safe, I had it torn away from me. There was a navy boat; of course, just as I had a way out, it was taken from me. The Australians were there ready to take us. Babies cried, mothers with no comfort to give them; men jumped overboard, trying desperately to get away. Me, I had nothing else. I was resigned to my fate. If this is what they wanted, then I would let them have me. A man grabbed me round the arm, dragged me up onto the ship and shoved me over with the others.

The crew turned the boat around away from Australia towards Indonesia. The stories I had heard of Australia spoke of a country free of conflict, famine and corruption. Somewhere to raise a family, to get a life of meaning. If Australia was a free country, where people had the right to go outside without fear, then all that was behind me: a chance at life forever gone. This was my life now. On my way to Indonesia, I doubted I would survive the next year. The crew were rough and they had no thoughts for us. We were fed barely enough: meagre crumbs compared to their meals.

Land was sighted. When I woke from a fitful sleep, I was surprised to see that it was an island we were heading for. It was one small island, barely one hundred kilometres wide. It was a detention centre on Christmas Island and that was where I was to stay.

I had no hope left. People don't get out of this place quickly: there are people who have lived here for years. They are people like me, never leaving, stuck forever on a tiny island in the middle of nowhere. Every day was pain. I had no family. I had no-one.

Curriculum

2017 has been a year of opportunities. The year has provided us with an opportunity to scrutinise our curriculums **Ithe Australian Curriculum** for K–10 and TASC for Years 11 and 12) as a result of the **Tasmanian School Registration** Board accreditation and TASC annual auditing. <u>Design,</u> <u>Production</u> <u>& Digital</u> <u>Technologies</u>

Throughout this year we have drawn closer to finalising our teaching and learning framework and alignment to the Design and **Digital Technologies National** Curriculum. This includes the development of effective ongoing feedback for boys and parents/carers, the inclusion of ePortfolios for the boys, and the application of Rory our learning management system to give 24/7 access to the curriculum. Our teaching and learning framework has been brought in line with contemporary pedagogies and endeavors to address the requirements of a truly modern education. We welcome family members at any time to talk with staff and view our facilities while their sons participate in a Design and Digital Technologies education.





The integration of software design tools and clean technologies like laser cutter/ engravers and 3D printers broadens the scope for boys exploring design based challenges. CADD systems and other graphic tools together with ePortfolios bring new skills and understandings to the boys and how they communicate their learning. Student managed devices through the BYOT program are supported with specialist studios and other digital technology hardware. Tinkering and curiosity are at the forefront with the development of our SUPASPACE, enabling us to bring robotics, automation, control technology and micro computing together with clean technologies to engage our

<u>English &</u> <u>Modern</u> Languages

ENGLISH: WHAT YOU READ MATTERS

Stories give us access to ethical dilemmas faced by characters we care about. Below are some of the ways senior English students have been challenged to think ethically:

Hamlet: "Up sword, and know thou a more horrid hent/ When he is drunk asleep, or in his rage."

When Hamlet presumes to decide where in the afterlife Claudius will go, he elevates himself above God; and Shakespeare challenges Elizabethans' passive acceptance of Hamlet's right to revenge - Isaac Traill (Year 11)

The Shawshank Redemption: *"Some birds are not meant to be caged."*

Freedom is a right; but society has no issues with constructing cages for those deemed lesser through arbitrary rules – Jack Gartlan (Year 11)

Eaten Fish – cartoons from Manus Island: "His cartoons will someday be recognised as important, world-class chronicles of the worst human behaviour since the World War II concentration camps."

Eaten Fish's cartoons shed a light on a darkness which should not occur in a first world country like Australia, showing a blatant human rights violation against people who are treated as nothing more than a number – Hamish Vermey (Year 11)

The Kite Runner: "There is a way to be good again."

During that time of pain and suffering, Amir felt "happy" and "healed", as if he is repaying Hassan for all the violence and horror Hassan had suffered on his behalf. When Sohrab tries to kill himself, Amir realizes that his own nearly fatal injuries were insignificant compared to the suffering of Hassan and Sohrab. Ultimately, Amir realizes that the only way to heal them is to forgive himself – Frank Jiao (Year 10) 'Ninety years Ago': "There on the beach – on that desolate beach/ Dawn filters through as they land."

We should feel a certain solemn respect for our war efforts in Gallipoli. Anything else risks glorifying war or distorting our perspectives of it – Thomas Jetson (Year 9)

CHINESE

Many Senior School students have gone the extra mile in their Chinese learning by taking up academic extension opportunities. Students from Years 9-12 had the opportunity to participate in the Tasmanian Chinese Speech Competition. In Year 9, Zachary Palser received 1st place and William Mather received 2nd place. In Year 10, Rhys Evans received 1st place. In Years 11 and 12, Thomas Kesseling (Year 12) and Hamish Allan (Year 11) received equal 2nd place. In addition, four students passed their HSK International Chinese certification tests, a globally recognised benchmark that can be used towards future studies and career pathways. Thomas Baddiley (Year 12) achieved an amazing Level 4 certification that is equivalent to the language level required for university entry in China with government scholarships. Four students from the pretertiary class successfully participated in the UTAS College Connection Program where they completed first year university units in Chinese.

FRENCH

Dominic Hughes-Churchett (Year 11) competed in the Alliance Française competition and won 2nd place for Years 11 and 12 conversation.

Aided by the support and hard work of a number of interested parents/carers, considerable progress has been made towards a Hutchins tour of France, which is now scheduled to take place in 2019. This is likely to take the form of a combined French and History tour. The challenge of sufficient numbers of students committing to be part of the tour means that we encourage all students currently in Years 6–10 to discuss the opportunity at home.

LANGUAGE IS CENTRAL

Senior Orator, James Tucker (Year 12), eloquently persuaded his audience about the value of language learning in his House debate on the importance of English. His argument is equally relevant to the learning of all languages:

Language lets us communicate with friends and family. The emotional nature of language, the ability for it to facilitate empathy and understanding, is the basis for human relationships. Socialising and communication with other people is by nature the way we have evolved to be prosperous and happy. Humans simply cannot thrive without language, and English satisfies this evolutionary requirement.

Mr McLeod's Action Research

The results of my Action Research demonstrated an ethical dimension to collaborative learning and indicated that: collaboration fostered an appreciation of Shakespeare, a positive environment promoted productive collaboration, and fairness and participation led to trust. This in turn built confidence and the boys developed a perception of their own development.

"[trust] can't be asked for and received, it has to be built. If it's strong there's a bit of leeway, yeah. They can let you down and that's still fine 'cause that's human I guess. You have to be able to forgive people."

In English Writing this year we applied my findings to the workshopping of each other's work. In this subject boys not only strive to improve their own writing, but they have a responsibility to help others with their writing. The class was truly collaborative. The care that the boys took with each other's work demonstrated the enormous trust that had been established within the group. Throughout the year there were examples of trust, friendship, generosity, curiosity, creativity, initiative, inquisitiveness, endeavour and hard work.

<u>Humanities</u>

With such a diverse range of subjects the Humanities Faculty in the Senior School offers students a wide range of learning experiences with many opportunities to engage and succeed in subjects ranging from History to Business, Economics, Legal Studies, Personal Investing, Geography and Psychology as examples.

Our aim at Hutchins is to allow every student to be informed global citizens and through our History curriculum, which is a core Australian curriculum subject in the Senior School, the students are making connections with events and changes today with those from the past. The rapid exponential growth of technology, where this generation have known nothing else as they live in this highly developed digital age can



be traced back to the Industrial Revolution which students study in Year 9. From studying this topic, they become aware how the Industrial Revolution set in motion the mass movement of people across the globe, from slaves, to convicts and free settlers and migrants. Their own ancestry and beginnings in Australia are contrasted with the First Australians and the impact European settlement had on them.

Year 10 students have been learning about the major conflicts in the 20th century and as the world has watched nervously the geo political standoff between Kim Jon-ung and US President Donald Trump's administration, the Year 10 History classes were learning about another period of brinkmanship between nations; the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962 during the Cold War. In the media, Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull was quoted as saying Australia would invoke the ANZUS Treaty and the students knew what that was and its significance to Australia today. Race riots in Charlottesville in the United States and our own indigenous issues in Australia were given context when we studied the Civil Rights movement in our Rights and Freedoms unit and learned how the achievement for full rights and recognition have not been completely resolved and problems and issues still exist today. For any nation and society to make progress they must first be able to understand the past. This is why the study of History is a vital component of the curriculum at Hutchins.

109 students from Years 7–12 participated in the Australian Geography competition and nine received a High Distinction. Special congratulations must go to Thomas Jetson (Year 9) who was in the top 1% Australia wide.

Each year Business Studies 3 (Years 11–12) and Business Studies Foundation (Year 10) students participate in the CPA Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition. This involves the students creating their own business concept and preparing a detailed business plan.



In 2017, The Hutchins School was well represented with two Individual State Finalists and five Group State Finalists. In addition, we were thrilled when Year 10 students Alexander Smith and Alex Stephens were the State winners with their innovative business idea Pay Clerk, involving a car sharing service app that provides members and users with a platform by which rental agreements can be facilitated and secure payment between users and members made. The Business Studies students took part in the Australian Business Studies Competition with Patrick Betts (Year 11), James Britton (Year 11), and Lewis Stephens (Year 12) being awarded a Distinction for their efforts.

Personal Investing is an elective in Year 9 and as part of their Personal Investing course, Year 9 students participate in the ASX Schools Sharemarket Game where they invest a simulated \$50,000 in the share market over a 10-week period. The boys had great success with the syndicate of Riley Ashlin and Axel Moore achieving the highest return and being awarded the State Winners. The boys also enjoyed learning about investment options, scams, safe ATM use, credit card options, how to budget, and philanthropy.

Being next door to the University of Tasmania has allowed students to easily engage with workshops and seminars at UTAS. The Economics 3 students participated in the annual UTAS Economics challenge which provided current information from the Reserve Bank of Australia on the state of the economy as well as a number of innovative workshops. The Legal Studies 3 students attended the annual UTAS Lawfest consisting of a number of mini seminars on current legal issues. The students earlier in the year also received a tour of the Supreme Court and a Q&A session with Justice Wood, providing a practical application to their course work.

All of these experiences in the Humanities Faculty have been of great benefit to the students, enhancing their learning and making connections with and understanding the real world beyond the Hutchins campus.

Mathematics

Tasmanian Mathematics Relays

<u>Music</u>

Many boys in the Senior School choose Music as one of their electives. In Year 9, the course is intense – six periods per week for a semester. This course is aligned with the Australian National Curriculum. The students explore music as an art form through listening, composing and performing. Students draw on music from a range of cultures, times and places – from earliest known music to music of contemporary society.

Boys with skills on an instrument focus on performing in small ensembles and begin to explore the art of improvisation. Music technology is integrated into this course, making use of the excellent facilities in the Hutchins audio studio. Students experiment with composition using notation tools and improve their aural skills using computer software, which enables every student to progress at their own rate. Audio Design – introduction to recording and the manipulation of sound is also part of this course.

In Year 10, Music follows the TASC Level 2 course. The boys study the elements of music with increasing depth and complexity, and learn to apply this knowledge into all aspects of the course – performing, composing, arranging and recording. With an emphasis on performance, boys are encouraged to continue private tuition on their chosen instrument. At the end of Year 10, students can play music with a level of technical proficiency and demonstrate musicianship in their playing. Boys choosing to major in composition are further extended to explore different genres of music.

In Years 11 and 12, there are several course options. This year Hutchins has had two streams of pre-tertiary music - Music 3C, the TASC course, and Foundation Practical Study (FCP), a course administered and examined by the University of Tasmania. In Music 3C, there is a focus on music literacy including knowledge of theory and aural skills. Students also develop a broader understanding of the characteristics of different musical styles and genres, and learn to apply this knowledge to their own performances and compositions. The course this year has included students playing a diverse range of instruments – classical cello, jazz piano and rock drumming being some examples.



The FCP course has a focus on performance, and all students undertaking this course have undertaken private study on their chosen instrument for many years. This course also has a folio requirement, which develops the students critical thinking skills, their aural skills, and their knowledge of the many genres of music and their place in society as a performer. At the end of this course, all students present a public recital in the UTAS Conservatorium Recital Hall. In 2017 Hutchins students presented recitals in jazz piano, classical piano, cello, violin and music theatre (voice). It was indeed a splendid day of concerts.

Congratulations to all boys who undertook study in elective Music this year and a big thank you to the passionate and creative Music Faculty staff for their enthusiasm and encouragement of the next generation of music makers.

<u>Outdoor</u> Education

This year we acknowledged the 70th anniversary of Outdoor Education at Hutchins and the fact that we have enjoyed Southport camps for over 35 years. Virtus (and pre-1991 The Hutchins School Magazine) has always been a place of celebrating the achievements of the Outdoor Education program and is evidenced in articles spanning from 1947 to present day.

For example:

- **1947** Celebrated the establishment of the Chauncy Vale site and Outdoor Education at Hutchins
- 1957 The outdoor adventures were aided by involvement in the Scouts
- 1967 Mentioned the activities of a Bushwalking Club
- **1977** Detailed the expansion of the Bushwalking Club with trips to Gunners Quoin, Hartz Mountain and Mount Anne
- 1987 The School had celebrated several early pioneering trips to Southport. These were the result of an amazing gift (1981) to the School, the Stephen Hay Memorial Park site.
- **1987** Year 10 camp to Southport in April was described as a "memorable time... Where the 4 days can be horrible, wet, boring... the weather was fairly stagnate." The activities were "wide ranging" and you could wind surf, canoe, visit the caves, abseil and walk Hartz Mountain.
- **1997** An Adventure Club was well established and lead by Mr Andrew Stewart



Onto 2017, which was another year of camping, cooking, walking, paddling, climbing, riding, snow shoeing, exploring, talking and reflecting. The senior groups comprised both Outdoor Leadership (TASC 3) and Year 10 Outdoor Education (TASC 2) students. These senior secondary courses aim to build on the Middle School and Power of 9 experiences, and provide opportunities for students to take responsibility for participating in more challenging learning experiences and to further develop transferrable leadership and communication skills.

Highlights included walking in winter through the Walls of Jerusalem and Mount Field, clear days on Mount Anne and packrafting the Collingwood and Picton Rivers. Many of the locations and activities reported on across the years remain in our present program. 70 years of tradition and culture demonstrates how Hutchins values and celebrates the role that outdoor and adventure learning plays in an inspirational education.

To the 2017 leavers, take time to reflect on your adventure to date, those shared with friends in amazing places doing exciting things. Being outside is a simple solution to many of our problems. The effect of sunshine, trees, water and air are four of the best medicines. Shared experiences immersed in nature can make up some of our fondest memories. A year in Outdoor Education is enriched by the memories of the groups we have been a part of. Good luck in continuing to enjoy creating memories with friends immersed in adventure.

Power of 9

A RITE OF PASSAGE

This year has been a time of reflection and renewal for our Power of 9 program. A significant aim of our Power of 9 program is to transform our boys into young men. This process is fraught and contingent on a number of variables. By designing a contemporary rite of passage process into our challenge term, we hope to enable our boys to take some strides into the adult world, but for it to work it requires much more than a challenging bushwalk and some comfortable couches.

Firstly, it requires that boys and families are ready to share the journey. By ready, I mean that the boys are at the age and stage where they are starting to feel ready for a shift. Sometimes the boys are well and truly ready but it is just as significant that families are also ready to let go of the young boy they have grown so well. A shift in self-identity for the young man will only occur if the community acknowledges the shift. Some encouragement for parents to allow their boys to be more independent, take on responsibilities and to treat them as adult members of the household. This year we have placed an increasing emphasis on working with families to work in partnership to support their boys take on more responsibility.

We also require the right mentors that can build positive relationships, encourage the boys to step outside the familiar and take on some serious challenges. We are fortunate to have some fantastic mentors and role models within Power of 9 and the Outdoor Education Faculty. Their genuine care for the boys, passion for the work and skills in the outdoors allow us to facilitate change. We have built on our curriculum using the principles of positive psychology and the use of reflective journals. We also use story-telling and structured debrief sessions to maximise the depth of learning. These valuable tools also allow the boys to think deeply, critically and positively about their experiences.

Another variable is our ability to create an environment conducive for growth. Having the Marieville Esplanade Campus allows us a certain separation from the familiar and allows us to create a safe and open environment for the boys to start to explore, discover and develop. The design of the Challenges encourages the boys to step outside their comfort zones and to feel vulnerable. It is in this space that they open up to growth and positive change.

The Challenge component is key to creating the space for change. Where traditional communities once asked their young men to face extreme pain, hardship or near death experiences as a rite of passage, we focus on physical, emotional and social challenges. This year we have expanded our expeditions to include the Tiwi Islands. This location had a depth of culture, community and a unique physical environment that allowed our students the perfect space to learn, grow and discover. Within these Challenges, we ask boys to leave the boy behind and take on a new identity as a young man in training. This transition is reinforced with a community and family celebration of the journey at the end of each program.

This year we have clocked up over 800 young men who have been part of the Power of 9 rite of passage. We are continually looking for ways to improve our outcomes. We are hoping that our experiences in Year 9 can also inform other significant transition points in the School.

13TH INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SCIENCE CONFERENCE (ISSC

The 2017 International Student Science Conference (ISSC) was held in Hong Kong. The conference brought together budding scientists from seven countries: Italy, China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, India, Kazakhstan and Australia.

The Hutchins delegation was Alex Stephens, George Scott, Struen Vanderplas, and Sudhaunshu Hardikar (all Year 10), along with William Mather and Alexander Kuzis (both Year 9). Dr Michaela Guest and Mr Peter Crofts accompanied the group.

With the theme of 'Transforming the Future Today', the conference presentations were a fascinating mix of solutions to everyday problems and growing global challenges. The student delegates also shared their own scientific research whilst building new global friendships.

William Mather and Alex Kuzis, who presented research on 'Do Stormwater Drains Affect the Amount of Micro Plastics in Mussels', delivered The Hutchins School presentation to the conference.

The other students presented their research at a poster session. George Scott's paper was on 'The Effect of Microwave Energy on the Bacteria on Fruit'; Struen Vanderplas presented his project 'The Effect of Time on the Concentration of Vitamin C in Orange Juice'; and Alex Stephens presented his paper about 'Electromagnetic Pulses'.





JUNIOR YOUNG PHYSICI

During the holidays Malcolm Ward, Sudhaunshu Hardikar, Brendan Heatley-Hart, Raiden Lemon and Miles McTaggert (all Year 10) attended the Junior Young Physicists' Tournament (JYPT) in Brisbane along with Mr Peter Crofts, Head of Science. The format of the competition is similar to a debate, one team presents a report of findings from an experimental investigation they have conducted, and then the opponents critique the report in a discussion with the presenter. The Hutchins students made the Grand Final, but were unable to defeat Onslow College from Wellington, NZ.

SCIENCE INVESTIGATION AWARD PRIZE WINNERS

This year 14 Years 9 and 10 students entered investigations into the UTAS Science Awards and the Tasmanian Science Talent Search. Of these, four Hutchins investigations received prizes.

- Alex Stephens: EMP Protection: Testing the Effectiveness of Conductive Metals as Faraday Cages – Honourable Mention – Year 10 – UTAS SIA.
- Thomas Reed (Year 10): Extraction, Characterisation and Anti-Cancer Activity in Natural Compounds – Merit Award (Intermediate Div) – TSTS.



SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING

Students from Year 10 competed in the 2017 Science and Engineering Southern Challenge. This year the activities included construction of a large catapult, sending coded messages, and designing a bionic hand and a Mars rover.

RACI TITRATION COMPETITION

Rhys Evans, Cameron Urquhart, and William Jackson (all Year 10) won through to the National Finals by coming 3rd in the Tasmanian Titration Competition. At the National Finals, the team achieved a silver medal.

BRAINBEE 2017

Nicholas Powell, Alex Stephens, Malcolm Ward and Struen Vanderplas (all Year 10). Struen made it through to the last round (final five) of the individual competition and the team overall came 3rd. The boys attended some lectures on the state of current research into Alzheimer's and participated in a number of demonstrations of some neuroscience research methods and/or sensory deceptions (e.g. phantom hand).

YEAR 12 PHYSICS TOUR

Mr James Seddon and Ms Belinda Tyrrell (Fahan School) led a group on the Physics Tour to Melbourne. The three day tour included visits to RMIT and Melbourne University as well as Australia's Particle Accelerator, the CSIRO's Synchrotron. The tour included practical demonstrations of several of the concepts taught as part of the Year 12 Physics course, as well as course advice from post-graduate students at each of the universities.

THE ROAD TO SUCCESS...

The Hutchins School Careers Faculty has been working with both industry and educational professionals to create as many opportunities as possible for students to explore career pathways.

During 2017 we have seen a number of boys complete vocational courses, university applications, university visits, ADF experiences, police engagement and scholarship success. Alongside these opportunities, the students have also been able to take part in work placement which included over 150 work placement opportunities for the Year 10 students during their leadership and moving forward week at the end of Term 4.



Whilst we encourage our students to take advantage of all these opportunities, it is very rewarding to be able to share the successful outcomes of the students who have been able to secure pathway opportunities and maintain their studies at Hutchins. One such student, Zane Foster (Year 10) who has been attending The Hutchins School since early learning years and who has come through the Centre for Excellence has been completing a work placement to gain further experience within the horticultural area once a week.

Through this opportunity, Zane has now secured a school based traineeship at the New Town Station Nursery for Years 11 and 12. This will mean he will be working as an employee and attending school to complete his TCEA. Zane will be completing a Certificate I in Horticulture and also completing his English and Mathematics subjects, and will also dabble in cookery all whilst working one day a week and studying at Hutchins as a full time student.

<u>The Duke of</u> <u>Edinburgh's</u> International Award

The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is both a long term and regular commitment. It involves learning a skill, improving your physical wellbeing, volunteering in your community and experiencing a team adventure in a new environment. As such, it requires dedication and persistence with your level of achievement being recognised at either a Bronze, Silver or Gold level.

The Award is extremely well recognised world-wide with over 140 countries delivering the youth development program that is designed to empower young people with essential life skills, increase their employability and foster creativity and innovation. At The Hutchins School, The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is open to all Years 9–12 students and is managed by the Outdoor Education Faculty.

Whilst a significant number of young people across the country undertake the Bronze Award, involving a minimum of a six month commitment, a much smaller number take on the Silver level of the Award (12 months) and only a very few attempt to complete the Gold level which involves an 18 month commitment. For Gold Awardees, in addition to regularly participating in activities involving service, physical recreation and skill, and undertaking a self-led Adventurous Journey, there is also the requirement to participate in a Residential Project.

Hutchins would like to congratulate Timothy Lindsay (Year 12) on achieving his Gold Award this year. This is a significant achievement and is recognised as such through an Award Ceremony at Government House. Mr Roger McNamara, Head of Senior School, attended to witness the presentation of the Gold Award by Her Excellency Professor the Honourable Kate Warner AC, Governor of Tasmania.

SAILING

The Hutchins School Sailing Academy has had another successful year. The Academy has been able to grow the number of boys taking up the variety of sailing opportunities offered. The Academy has competed in the traditional programs of teams racing and match racing along with introducing boys to sailing through the Tackers learn to sail. It has also further extended programs into keel boats and the SB20 class.

There were many team and individual successes throughout the year with school teams travelling to compete in State and national events in the teams racing and match racing competitions. Hutchins dominated the State match racing. Three Hutchins teams contested the Tasmanian Schools Match Racing States. Match racing is a very tactical form of sailing, most commonly seen in the America's Cup format. It is sailed one on one, with the winner being the first one across the finish line. Skills used in match racing are very alike the skills used in team sailing. The teams were led by skippers: George Scott (Year 10), Sam Abel (Year 12) and Samuel King (Year 11) with Samuel King and his crew of Charles Zeeman (Year 9), Joshua Ragg (Year 11) and Howard Tapping (Year 8) taking out the event. They went on to come second in the national event in Brisbane.

Hutchins sailors competed at State, national and international levels in a variety of classes including the Laser, International Cadet and 29er. Highlights included William Cooper (Year 10) and Hugo Allison (Year 6) winning the Australian International Cadet National Championship in Adelaide.

Samuel King placed 8th in the Laser Radial nationals, 2nd in the Australian Youth Championships, then went on to represent Australia at the World Laser Radial Championships in Holland finishing 14th overall out of 270 competitors.

There was a strong contingent of Hutchins sailors representing Australia in the Cadet class in both Argentina in January and Holland in August. They included William Cooper, Hugo Allison, Charlie Goodfellow, Charles Zeeman, William Zeeman (Year 7), Jacob McConaghy (Year 9) and Charles Boman (Year 5). Jacob McConaghy won the best U16 helm in Holland and Charlie Goodfellow the best U15 helm at both events.

FROM THE Head of House

This year Thorold House established a new award called the Stag Award. The idea behind this award is to recognise the commitment that students make to the House program. Over the year, using a scoring system, we were able to determine which students were most involved in the full House program. The top students were recognised in our final assembly with a 'Green Stag Award' and the highest scoring student, Benjamin McTaggart (Year 11), was awarded the first 'Golden Stag Award'. It was a great way to celebrate the efforts of those students who not only run, jump, swim, sing, dance and talk in the inter-House competitions, but also to acknowledge those who help out with House lunches, fundraising, and attend events such as House nights.

Towards the end of the year we surveyed Thorold students to ascertain what it was they valued most highly about being in Thorold House. The results were very interesting because, while the students highly value the busy program: 'the BBQs were awesome' and 'Let's have more events in Stag shield', many of them noted that they also appreciated 'being accepted into the House,' enabling them to 'feel confident around older students'. The sense of inclusion and the chance to build relationships while 'hanging out with the mentor' is summed up by this Year 10 student who wrote, 'Thorold House is so unified, not just in how many

BBQs we have but in our assemblies, chapels and mentor time.

The mentor groups are involved throughout the year in running a variety of House Assemblies which have informed and entertained. For example, Isaac Traill (Year 11) spoke to the House about his recent overseas trip where he volunteered his time and skills to help in the education of the local people, Tom Taglieri (Year 11) spoke about competitive mountain biking and motor-cross, Angus Szoke (Year 12) spoke about representative cricket and Isaac Traill also told us about his involvement in the sport of Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu.

This year there has been an increased focus on learning about wellbeing within the Houses. During pastoral time, Year 9 boys learnt about anti-bullying strategies and mindfulness activities. They also were able to develop teamwork and cohesion through participation in group activities and team play. A highlight of the year was the inaugural annual Gaelic Football game between two very evenly-matched Year 9 teams captained by Noah Sargent and Giorgio Albertini, respectively. The first game was a draw and a rematch was required to get a result.

It is with pleasure that I share with you a sample of the outstanding academic achievements of our Year 12 students in 2017.

The exceptional results are a testament to the boys' efforts and discipline to academic studies throughout the year. For some boys, their commitment to academic study placed them amongst the very highest achieving students in Tasmania, while for many others, their hard work culminated in achievements beyond their own expectations.
