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Chairman of the Board

Another exciting, productive and at times exhausting school year is now behind us. Through the astute leadership of Dr Rob McEwan and outstanding fiscal management strategies of Chief Operating Officer, Mr Jason Reeves and their teams, The Hutchins School is in as strong a position as it ever has been.

As a Board we are most pleased with the direction the School is headed and the sound financial platform that has been developed.

As we approach our 175th anniversary year in just over 12 months' time our future is bright and exciting. It is a great time to be involved at Hutchins.

I would like to publicly acknowledge the tireless efforts of our Board Members – Mr Charlie Cottier, Professor Marcus Haward, Mrs Rebecca Fergusson ('90), The Very Reverend Richard Humphrey, Mrs Noelene Wilson, Mr Andrew Walker ('82) and Mr Michael Cooper ('86). These people volunteer their time and skill to benefit the School and we are richer for that significant contribution, sacrifice and commitment. The support that each and every member of our Board provides to me is very much appreciated.

Specifically, I would like to thank Mr Charlie Cottier and Mrs Noelene Wilson who retire from our Board this year having served nine and six years respectively. Their contributions as Chairs of the Property and Development Committee and the Policy and Planning Committee have resulted in Hutchins being continually revitalised from an infrastructure perspective and taking a lead in policy best practice. Both these areas evolve at a pace that requires considerable oversight and direction.

Through the Board's dedication and collaboration with the School Executive team we have been able to retire the School's Strategic Plan a year ahead of time. We have already commenced the planning phase of our next Strategic Plan which will be both consolidating and ambitious.

Last year we announced the introduction of Year 6 into the Middle School and accompanying building developments to facilitate this.

After being ready to begin construction, an opportunity arose earlier this year to purchase two adjoining properties to the School. The decision was made to purchase those properties – 32 Nelson Road and 14 David Avenue – and delay that construction. It also gave us the opportunity to re-design the building including its orientation and size.



Our ambition is that Year 6 will join the new Middle School with completion of the new buildings for the start of 2021.

I understand this delay did cause some reorganisation of plans but I hope you agree that this opportunity to acquire property next to the School was a generational opportunity that we couldn't let pass.

The Headmaster and I have met with the Vice Chancellor of the University of Tasmania and his Chief Operating Officer to discuss what opportunities may be available for Hutchins when the University relocates to the Hobart CBD. The University is currently undertaking a master planning exercise for the Sandy Bay campus and we will continue the dialogue with them once that exercise has concluded and there is more certainty around their plans. Clearly the area adjoining the War Memorial Oval is of great interest to us.

I would like to thank Dr McEwan and the whole staff of The Hutchins School for their continued commitment to the quality education of our boys. It is most evident to me and many others that our staff's care and commitment to the boys and their education is at the very highest level.

On behalf of the Board, I take this opportunity to once again thank each and every one of you for the outstanding commitment you have to The Hutchins School.

Of particular note, I would like to recognise Mrs Jenny Manthey on her 21 years of service to Hutchins and Mr Roger McNamara on his 22 years and wish them both all the best with their endeavours, together with other staff leaving Hutchins this year. Over the past 18 months the School has, together with The Hutchins Foundation, invested resources into the Advancement Office. One of the first major projects was the Giving Day which occurred in June this year.

Amazingly, our community contributed approximately \$227,000 in a 24 hour period. I would like to thank all of those generous donors together with our Director of Advancement, Mr John Groom ('86) who co-ordinated this initiative. Those funds will provide scholarship opportunities for those in our community who may not otherwise be able to attend Hutchins. To all our other donors over the year, thank you on behalf of the Board. It truly makes a difference.

To President, Mr Ian Johnston, and the Board of The Hutchins Foundation – thank you for your stewardship of fundraising and contribution to the future sustainability of The Hutchins School. That contribution has been and continues to be significant. I would like to make special mention of late Board member and Past President Mrs Jenny Inglis. Jenny loved Hutchins and committed so much to our school. She will be greatly missed by us all but never forgotten.

To the Year 12 leavers – you have been a credit to your school and families and have epitomised our mission of building good men of character who act with kindness, integrity, compassion, humility and courage and on behalf of the Board I congratulate you on your journey at Hutchins.

I attended the ELC and Junior School Speech Night in which the theme was journeys. You have certainly taken full advantage of your journey through the School and although you have reached the finish line it is not the end destination.



Your connection with the School will continue as a member of the Hutchins School Old Boys' Association and I encourage you to stay in touch with the School and most importantly with your mates from school. Take advantage of the reunion functions we offer all around the world wherever you may be.

Headmaster

In a world where competition, achievement and self-promotion feature prominently in education, the workplace and life generally, the need to develop integrity, humility and character is greater than ever before.

Our boys are growing up at a time when people advertise their lives, much like a brand, where photos are carefully selected to portray a favourable version of ourselves. A 'look at me' mentality abounds and social media has become a platform for popularity and instant 'fame'. The number of followers on Twitter or 'friends' on Facebook is used to validate some people's sense of popularity or importance. Selfies, Facebook and Instagram, to name just a few, are driving a culture of selfconfidence, self-promotion, and selfcentredness. Not self-respect.

As a community we need to be vigilant in the promotion of our deeply held values of kindness, compassion, courage, humility and integrity. We must work hard to counter these powerful and widespread social influences and attitudes around selfcentredness to promote values in our boys of being 'other people centred'. This is particularly important during adolescence when not only is it normal to focus on self as we form our sense of identity, place and belonging, but equally this is a time when wellbeing or perceptions of self are determined by how we compare ourselves with others. To compare our real and private selves with the curated, embellished and false public versions of others is harmful. This false comparison produces feelings of inferiority and anxiety.

If we want to feel good – do well for others. If we want to feel valued, value others. What is needed is a conviction to serve. When we serve, we give to others our time, skills, attention and resources. We create connections with others that shifts our focus from ourselves to someone else, while at the same time promote feelings of self-worth. The key is to give selflessly not expecting anything in return.

To serve the community lies within The Hutchins School vision statement and must always remain at the heart of what we do. Service in the Junior School is promoted strongly through the homework challenge that all boys are asked to participate in. This year these included cleaning, gardening and painting public spaces, assisting the elderly, walking animals, recycling, collecting and donating items to those in need. One of the service initiatives includes Year 1 boys making Christmas decorations and selling them to raise money that the boys then spend on buying Christmas presents for other children through the Kmart Giving Tree.

Under the leadership of the Year 12, boys in the Middle and Senior School committed to supporting The Smith Family, a children's charity helping disadvantaged Australian children create better futures for themselves that involved both reading to children over the phone and raising \$19,384 for the organisation. A gesture that overwhelmed Lesley Mackay, General Manager Tasmania of the organisation when she received the donation at an assembly early this term. Boys also raised \$15,000 for the Leukaemia Foundation and spoke out about important social causes including respect for women, homelessness and environmental sustainability to name just a few examples.



2019 saw our Character Development Program expand to include our first ever Year 10 two-week Residential Program. Boys who elected to enrol, undertook a positive social impact project for the broader Tasmanian community. This saw the boys focus on the homeless amongst our Hobart community, with one outcome being the ongoing regular involvement of boys serving food at The Salvation Army citadel on Sunday evenings throughout the year. I look forward to seeing this initiative expand in 2020.

With a clear focus on helping others, George Scott in Year 12, led a new initiative this year to provide support for those amongst us who face mental health challenges. Having identified from a student survey in 2018 that boys were much more likely to tell a friend than an adult when experiencing mental health challenges, a group of Year 12 boys initiated mental health first aid training that saw over 50 senior boys participate. Student Mental Health Contact Officers were introduced and supported by Mr Matt Magnus, the Senior School Counsellor.

The Tasmanian LIFE Awards acknowledged this groundbreaking initiative when it awarded the School the Outstanding Contribution to Suicide Prevention by young people award. This peer support program was also identified as the most popular strategy amongst mental health professionals that they would like to see adopted by schools and organisations across Tasmania at a recent Tasmanian Youth Mental Health Forum. While the acknowledgement by others is affirming and deserved, this initiative is firmly focussed on helping others. I have no doubt that the boys' greatest accomplishments are likely never to be known, for it is the help that was quietly given to boys in great need that will make the most difference in someone's life and this will be their greatest achievement. As the boys have shown us, to give only requires our heart and our will.

In keeping with the School's vision to serve others, this year saw the introduction of a 24 Hour Giving Day, the first of its kind in Tasmania. Under the leadership of Mr John Groom ('86), Director of Advancement and Mrs Clarissa McCoid, Philanthropy Advisor, the Hutchins community came together to raise funds for a need-based scholarship. The generosity of our school community saw over \$227,000 raised in just one day. This significant contribution enables the School to provide two scholarships for deserving boys who would otherwise not be able to benefit from the enormous opportunities available at Hutchins. I am delighted that we are welcoming the first scholarship recipient, Christian Senga and his family into the Hutchins community for the commencement of the 2020 school year.

<u>Academic</u> achievement

The year began with news of our graduating Year 12 cohort achieving the highest academic results for the School since the introduction of ATARs in 2006.

Year 12 boys completed 32 certificates for Vocational Education and Training (VET) and we had a 100% TCE graduation rate compared to the State average of 58% and 78% across Independent Schools. The boys achieved a median ATAR of 89.75, meaning almost every second boy achieved an ATAR above 90, seven of those boys achieved an ATAR above 99 and for the second consecutive year, a Hutchins boy placed first in the State with an ATAR of 99.95. By any measure, the academic achievement of our graduating cohort was outstanding and allowed boys to pursue their chosen post-school pathway.

Outstanding academic achievement was of course not limited to our Year 12 cohort. A small sample of highlights include The Hutchins School winning the Year 9 and 10 division of the International da Vinci Decathlon, an academic competition that involved some of the best teams from around the world gathering in Venice, Italy to compete across 10 disciplines. For the first time in the competition's history, the national individual and team winners of the Business Educators Australasia Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition came, from not only the same State, but remarkably from the same Business Studies class right here at Hutchins.

Boys achievements in mathematics continue to be remarkable, with 23 boys accelerated in mathematics across different year levels with the results showing at the national level. William Rumley in Year 7 achieved a score in the top 0.01% nationally in the Australian Mathematics Competition Trust (one in 10000) and Harry Sillifant (Year 10), Warren Huang (Year 6) and Arjun Yellap (Year 7) placed in the top 0.3% in the Australian Maths Trust Competition. Seth Homfray (Year 9) completed two, third year university mathematics courses where he achieved high distinction in both and placed second in the class amongst adult mathematicians.

In team events, Hutchins placed first in the State in the Year 7/8; Year 9/10; and Year 11/12 divisions of the maths relay event making Hutchins the highest achieving school in mathematics in the State.

This year we hosted the 15th International Student Science Conference over the October break, welcoming students from Italy, China, Sydney, Hong Kong and Taiwan, sent a Physics team to the Junior Young Physicists' Tournament in New Zealand, placing 5th and Raiden Lemon and Sudhaunshu Hardikar won the Best Research Investigation of the Year at the 2019 Tasmanian Science Talent Search Awards. Raiden Lemon in Year 12 was also one of only five students selected nationally to represent Australia at the International Youth Physicists' Tournament in Poland where Mr Peter Crofts, Head of Science, was the teacher in charge of the Australian team.

In English Benjamin Davie (Year 10), Izac Grantham (Year 11) and Malcolm Ward (Year 12) achieved the highest score possible on the University of New South Wales' International Competitions and Assessments for English and a number of boys placed in the top three for the Alliance Française competition and the Chinese Speaking and Performance Competition.

Our comprehensive co-curricular program continues to offer extraordinary opportunities for the boys in almost any pursuit they can imagine. You only have to look at the fortnightly Communiqué newsletter or the School Facebook page to realise the breadth of opportunity and level of activity the boys are involved in as a normal part of their Hutchins experience. <u>Continual</u> improvement

As a school that embraces continual renewal and remains restless in the pursuit of improvement, feedback is highly valued. It is for this reason the School commissioned an independent, confidential survey of all aspects of a Hutchins experience from parents, carers, staff and boys.

The findings reveal very high levels of parent satisfaction with the full range of experiences with the quality of teaching and learning, focus on student wellbeing and balanced educational experiences identified as the three highest factors in choosing a school. The graph below shows the order of importance of the top 11 factors for our parents in choosing a school for their son, together with the level of parent satisfaction for each.

While this feedback is encouraging and affirms many of our efforts, we are deeply committed to an improvement agenda. The Hutchins School Board and Executive began examining the feedback in detail in November. The discussions generated great optimism, a shared commitment and determination for our school to provide an inspirational education where each boy strives to achieve his personal best and is willing to serve his community. A similar analysis involving staff will occur early in the new year that will continue and refine the preliminary analysis to inform the next phase of the School's continued development. The Chair of the School Board, Mr Gene Phair, and I look forward to sharing the future strategic direction with our school community in 2020.

Teaching and Learning

FAITH AND THE CURRICULUM

Globalisation, in its economic, technological and cultural manifestations, has a significant impact on education. This is particularly the case in terms of religious exposure, student diversity, cultural and linguistic differences and world view. Schools are diverse communities with a variety of religions either ascribed to or practiced amongst students and staff. This diversity and difference directly impact on the expectations of teachers in the classroom and the curriculum they deliver.



Hutchins, as with all other Anglican schools in Australia, is increasingly called to consider how we demonstrate Christian values within the curriculum, within co-curricular programs and within the culture of the School. Adopting a Christian lens to our curriculum content has implications particularly with the diversity of classroom experience and knowledge of the students:

"...teachers must always ascertain the current knowledge of the students in order to take them further, but then it is about considering what knowledge and skills is of most worth to such a varied cohort of students." (Spencer, 2005)

Respecting and valuing various religious and faith perspectives is increasingly challenging for faith based schools. This year, The Hutchins School hosted the Anglican Schools Australia annual conference and a group of senior staff from Hutchins joined colleagues from our fellow Anglican schools in Tasmania to consider the way in which we determine the learning experience for students and how this could be distinctly Christian in our schools. In terms of curriculum development, we were asked to reflect on how to provide a curriculum that encourages students to deepen their Christian faith and commitment to Anglican values. This calls on us to consider how we, as educators can help students understand their responsibility to use moral and ethical judgements in their actions and relationships. This also requires educators to understand how pedagogy can reflect Christian values and consider the bigger questions of humanity such as; What is the purpose of this? Why am I learning this? What is it to be a human being?

For the Hutchins community these questions are critical in our development in a globalised environment because they ask us to look to the past and reflect on the values and virtues upon which our school was founded. Further they demand our attention in active reflection as we question how they should be embodied in a modern context. These discussions and developments around how school culture and curriculum should reflect these values has the potential to build a richer staff and a student body whose academic and spiritual growth is firmly embedded in those founding values of our school.

The Right Reverend Dr Richard Condie, Bishop of Tasmania, in his Presidential Address 2019, encouraged the Anglican schools of Tasmania to be more intentional about our engagement with Christian teaching and values at all levels of school life, so we truly aspire to "a life lived in response to Jesus Christ..."

As we continue to build and grow as a globalised community at Hutchins, we will continue to respond to this diversity with open minds and hearts guided by our rich past and a commitment to The Hutchins School values.

The ongoing role of chaplains, indeed mission, of an Anglican school is to hold out for our community a comprehensive view of what it means to be truly human, in relationship with God and the world. One of the great privileges of my life has been having the opportunity to work with new and emerging schools developing their identity and culture as they continue on their journey as centres of learning.

When I first arrived at Hutchins, the School already had an identity and culture, and this had grown from its foundational story. From this story emerges our vision and mission statements and these are translated into action through the education and development of the boys of The Hutchins School.

Our commencement service was a powerful step into our story with St Michael's Collegiate School. Led by our Diocesan Bishop, The Right Reverend Dr Richard Condie, he dared us to think and dream on a larger scale. The Bishop encouraged us to see the possibility of transformation in every aspect of our work in school, and in the life of our community. He then visited with us for a Professional Development morning to ask us to imagine what this would look like in action.

This year also saw the transformation of the Chapel of St Thomas. A movement to make the chapel more accessible to all staff saw the connection of WiFi and screens. A new organ has also been constructed after extensive flood damage to the organ bay last year. Thank you to the generous community at All Saints Anglican Church, Hobart who donated their temporary organ, as well as a permanent replacement to the School to continue our tradition of choral music. Our 173rd Anniversary service was an opportunity to examine who we are as a community and where we are heading. The speaker at our Anniversary Service was Reverend Alistair Bain, who encouraged us to look at Jesus and see the things that make a person truly great. He challenged us to think of those attributes that each person in the Hutchins community could aspire to through their actions.

On the same week as our anniversary, we had over 280 visitors from around the nation and beyond who are associated with Anglican schooling. The Anglican Schools Australia Conference 2019 is held in Hobart once every seven years. An amazing line up of speakers and workshops were available. The highlight of the conference for me by far was the participation of our students. The choirs were outstanding and showed the huge depth of talent we have here on our small piece of the country. There were also students who assisted in welcoming and directing many of our visitors. The Primate of Australia, The Most Reverend Dr Philip Freier was also here and commented on how the worship services were greatly enhanced by the presence and participation of our students. A very special thank you to the Music Faculty and Maintenance Team for enabling this to be such a success. At the cathedral Eucharist we were privileged to have all three Anglican schools in Tasmania sing together.

This year we have seen 11 boys seeking to confirm their faith through confirmation at The Hutchins School. As always, a special thank you to Reverend Mark Holland for his sharing the ministry at the School, as well as to the staff and parents/carers whose continued support and prayer are always greatly valued.



Community Service

Community service this year has seen a growing number of areas being supported by our school community. In the Senior School, we have sought to have the four Houses each adopt an organisation to pursue, as well as plenty of opportunities to work across the Houses. The Prefect of Community Service Rhys Evans (Year 12) has continued to do an outstanding job encouraging the boys to become involved.

We have continued to cement our ties with many organisations for both fundraising and community service. These have included The Smith Family peer to peer program, the Operation Christmas Child appeal, the Anglicare Food Drive as well as The Salvation Army. Our Year 8 Integrated Program has seen an addition with our students attending The Salvation Army Citadel to assist in packing support bags for the homeless, being led through a day of assisting and the looking at the cause of homelessness. This has also opened up an opportunity once a term for boys to volunteer to assist with the Sunday evening meal at the Citadel feeding many of Hobart's most vulnerable people.

Boarding

The annual bookend activities 'Giant Jenga' and 'Dash' alongside the weekly Tutor Group activities (life-size Tic Tac Toe, Racing Origami, D. Green extravaganza, and Mario Kart) have seen the battle for the Burbury House cup go all the way with Macquarie being victorious under the leadership of Yu Yeung (Marco) Chung. Headmaster Seminar Series

Webber Lecture

Professor Rufus Black

The Webber Lecture is an annual address given by a leading presenter whose topic is always one of ethics. The Webber Lecture is named in honour of The Reverend Michael Webber, former Dean of Hobart.

On Wednesday 19 June 2019, we held our annual Webber Lecture. This year's speaker, Professor Rufus Black, Vice-Chancellor and President at the University of Tasmania, delivered an inspiring, thought provoking address. He challenged those in attendance to consider an alternative ethical paradigm where place shapes our identity and our way of thinking.

The ideas presented resonated strongly with all in attendance, from our own city of Hobart and its heritage buildings, our beautiful landscape and natural environment though to our personal place of birth, where we live and go to school. Our understanding of the world and ourselves starts with an understanding of place – where we are shapes who we are, even what we are obligated to do.



Dr Judith Locke

Dr Judith Locke from Confident and Capable, was our guest speaker over two nights as part of our Headmaster Seminar Series.

Judith addressed our staff, Junior, Middle and Senior School parents and carers about 'Helping your child or teen become confident and capable in their schooling'. In her work as a clinical psychologist and researcher, Judith sees a disturbing link between high-effort parenting and poor outcomes for children. She believes parents/carers make their children's lives too easy by doing too much for them and giving too much to them. This type of parenting produces 'the bonsai child', an apparently perfect child raised in a protected environment and nurtured on attention to their every need. Dependent on constant care, the bonsai child can remain confined by their ideal conditions, incapable of coping in the real world.

The sessions were very well received, and parents and carers took away some great strategies to assist their child's development. A key takeaway of Judith's was 'Parents: Step back so they step up!'

Our sincere thanks must go to the ever-willing team of volunteers – Ted Pitman, David Brammall, Lance Morrisby, David Bloomfield and Ian McQueen – for their regular, generous and uncomplaining contribution to the management of the historically significant Collection which forms the core of the School Archive.

Junior School centenary

During the year we celebrated the centenary of the Hutchins Junior School, which opened onsite at Macquarie Street on 4 March 1919. Franklin House School in upper Davey Street had served as an unofficial preparatory school for Hutchins since its inception in 1906, becoming formally affiliated with Hutchins following the resignation of its headmaster, J A McElroy, in 1917.

The purchase of Dr Gibson's property adjacent to the original Hutchins schoolhouse at 167 (later 181) Macquarie Street enabled the Board of Management to convert the existing buildings into a junior department housing a large classroom, cloakroom and bathroom, with a second classroom and junior boarding house situated in the residential block, providing accommodation for at least 75 boys. Later in the year one end of the large single classroom was converted into a Kindergarten/Prep room for younger boys, under the control of Miss Mary Todd.



Former Franklin House teacher, W F Tennant, was appointed Headmaster of the new Junior School, with his wife taking charge of the Junior School boarders. By the end of 1919 there were 47 pupils on the junior roll, which had jumped to 64 by the middle of the following year.

A new Sub-Primary block was the first building to open at the Sandy Bay site in 1946. A section of this building remains as part of the current Art block.

Eleven years later the new Junior School opened at Sandy Bay, on 6 April 1957.

Curatorial program

<u>The Hutchins</u> Foundation Art <u>Collection</u>

The Hutchins Foundation Art Collection comprises over 100 professional works of art of significant historical, cultural and educational value. The focus of the curatorial program in 2019 was upon care of this rich and exceptional resource.

The scope of the art collection is impressive, encompassing historical and contemporary artworks, representing a wide range of mediums and genres. Included in the collection are paintings, drawings, photography, prints, digital and new media work, artist books and sculptures. There is a prevalence of high-quality works on paper by Australian artists due to acquisitions arising from the Hutchins Australian Contemporary Art Prize exhibition finalists and first prize winners. These include eminent practitioners such as Gosia Wlodarczak, Jacqui Stockdale, Rod Stennard, Fiona Cabassi, Glen Clarke, Kerry Gregan, Ian Friend, Megan Keating, Marco Luccio, Helen Wright, Rew Hanks, Milan Milojevic and Anne Mestitz.





The Hutchins Foundation Art Collection is also representative of those who have taught, studied or had affiliations with the School. It includes artworks that have been commissioned for various parts of the School or been acquired or gifted by benefactors, current students and alumni. An example is the life-sized bronze sculpture 'Masquerade' by distinguished artist Stephen Walker OA (1927-2014), originally commissioned in 1992 for the Performing Arts Centre and relocated adjacent to the Auditorium in July. Walker's oeuvre includes the 'Tidal Pools' at Long Beach and the well-known 'Bernacchi Tribute' on the Hobart waterfront.

The earliest artwork in The Hutchins Foundation Art Collection dates from 1846 and is a watercolour image of the Greig brothers on their first day at Hutchins. Painted by renown convict artist (and surgeon!) C H Theodore Costantini (b. 1803) it was donated in 1946. The artwork is fragile so remains in the School Archives.

The greater part of the art collection dates from 1980 and includes celebrated Australian artists such as Paul Boam, Richard Bacon, Christopher Hodges and Joan Ross, with recent purchases including Lucia Usmiani, Anne Morrison, Michael Vale and Tim Coad. The majority of acquisitions are due to the consistent support of The Hutchins Foundation, ensuring a valuable trove of visual art is available for teaching and learning.

A strategic policy document for The Hutchins Foundation Art Collection is nearing completion at time of writing. I look forward to continuing the mission statement of 'Collecting, caring for and preserving, studying and making accessible, a vibrant and inspiring collection of visual art for the School.'

Written in response to Joseph Conrad's Heart of Darkness

The manager, all the while telling me this story, stressed the kind and gentle nature of Fresleven. Apparently he had brought assistance to those in the river who were too mangled and burnt to swim. It is up to our speculation if he did those men a favour; but regardless, it is certainly an honourable deed, is it not? I imagine many men of that boat would have not have been able to attempt a similar feat; they were too busy wading with the weight of their fortune. The manager judged it important at the time trained by Fresleven. He had survived the incident and remained one of the last crew still to be working for the Company. The poor devil was probably still scarred by the calamities of the past. For those who survived the wreck, melancholy must have lingered in the air like an inescapable miasma. They exist in congregation with the shore, but no doubt attracted by the wounds of the men. Poor souls, they knew disease was in the air all around them, buzzing like a deathly souvenir.

Outside School Hours Care

Working in Outside School Hours Care gives you a great deal of time to reflect upon the nature of play. The importance of play-based education in early childhood is well-established and is discussed in everything from the reverent tones of serious journal articles to the often-used Comic Sans MS of certain child care publications. As a result, the value of learning through play can sometimes be obscured behind the nature of play itself (being minimally structured and often openended) or the representation of it in our media. Far from being diminished by that, however, in Outside School Hours Care, that foundation of learning through play presents itself as a powerful, transformative opportunity for growth.



You might see this idea represented in our youngest children removing their socks and feeling the sand between their toes in the playground, taking in the texture and grit, enjoying the sensory experience of being barefoot; or in our eldest children learning the strategy and methodology behind the perfect game of Monopoly. It manifests itself in the three-year-old toasting her first marshmallow by the fire after a walk to Russell Falls, a welcome reward after braving the inevitable drizzle that falls to the forest floor: in the horizontal leap of the 10-year-old trying to see if he can jump from one height to another at Inflatable World; or even in the six-year-old making her very first hama bead, fingers moving slowly and carefully to place each bead in its rightful place.

At its heart, this is what Outside School Hours Care is all about. We provide experiences and scaffold children's learning that encourage them to learn not only what they are capable of, but also who they are, and who it is that they want to be. Framing concepts of selfdetermination and identity in the nature of play seems disarmingly simple; and in many ways it is. However, this is the beauty of childhood, and the value of play-based learning: the children that we share, yours and ours, are capable, intelligent, brave explorers learning about the world around them in the best way they know how – joyfully. So, as you look at the images on this page, and see the faces of our children, understand all that we have accomplished together, learning through play.

<u>Deep thinking,</u> <u>deep learning</u>

Our boys are on an educational journey, where we aim to develop their skills as deep thinkers and deep learners. Deep thinking means delving beneath the obvious, and striving to find rich, authentic answers. It is the ability to question, and to reflect.

Deep thinking and deep learning require four key elements: curiosity, creative play, rigour and collaboration. Today, when almost everything is available at the touch of a fingertip, in an age of so much information and misinformation, these four elements are vital. We need children to slow down, to take time, to mull things over.

CURIOSITY

Curiosity is the lighting of the flame of learning. It stimulates the mind, awakening interest and motivation. Curious students not only ask questions, but also seek out answers. At Hutchins, we foster curiosity and encourage a spirit of enquiry. We strive to make our classrooms places of wonder. Rather than just learning about the water cycle, for example, the question is posed 'how likely is it that we drink the same water as the dinosaurs?' That very question opens up a new, deeper way of thinking about something we may otherwise take for granted.

CREATIVE PLAY

Creative play awakens the imagination and assists children to understand the fundamentals of relationships and fairness. We cannot teach creativity, but we can create an environment where it can flourish. In our risk averse society, play which allows children to test themselves and extend boundaries is even more important. Play which keeps curiosity alive can lead to monumental discoveries. Just a few minutes in the ELC playground provides so many examples, such as the ingenuity of the boys as they devise ways to cross the swamp full of lurking monsters that the sandpit has become. Explorers, inventors, engineers and rescue workers are born!

RIGOUR

Rigour is made up of effort, focus, perseverance, resilience, the ability to apply structure, the capacity to reflect and, most importantly, the mindset to be willing to make mistakes and learn from them. Deep learning builds upon the facts that students have been taught – the more they know, the deeper their understanding will be and their capacity to be able to place meaning on new information, to make connections, to explore how things fit together, will grow.



Rigour sees boys walk away from their weakly fizzing volcano experiment with their heads down – not despondent that 'it didn't work' but consumed with plans to find out 'what will happen if...?' – to try again.

COLLABORATION

Collaboration marks successful thinking – thinking can be wonderfully social. Many of our ideas are in response to what someone else has thought – we think in active response to the world and in constant relation to others. Puzzling over the drinking habits of dinosaurs; fording the sandpit swap; building a better volcano – all thinking and learning is most productive and enjoyable when shared with others, each thinker contributing to, building on and appreciating the work of others.

Deep thinking is the mark of the lifelong learner – the goal for all our boys.

Curriculum

Digital portfolios in the ELC and Junior School

A significant objective for teachers in the ELC and Junior School over the past two and a half years has been to transition successfully from hard copy portfolios capturing the boys' learning journeys across a year, to digital portfolios which would fulfil the same end but value add in the process. To value add meant identifying a platform that is age and stage appropriate for younger students which would complement the development of the boys' digital technology skills and would provide ongoing feedback for boys and parents/carers across the year. After much investigation, research and consideration of the experiences of other schools' implementation of online feedback in their early/ primary years, and advice regarding issues of privacy and online security, the decision to implement Seesaw - in the ELC initially - was made at the beginning of 2019.

Amongst a wide range of competitive platforms, claiming to fill the required brief, Seesaw was identified as the most appropriate for our needs – and practice has confirmed the wisdom of that decision. Seesaw:

- provides ease of upload for teachers and students;
- provides ease of access by parents/ carers;
- is compatible/links with the Australian Curriculum;
- is a vehicle for formative feedback; and
- is a secure and private space.

In practice we have carefully focused our use of Seesaw – which has many facets if a school chooses to implement them. At Hutchins we use Seesaw as a digital portfolio. Its purpose is to deliver formative assessment, real time updates to parents/carers about their child's academic progress and to enhance the delivery of the digital technologies curriculum. Seesaw enables students to document what they are learning at school. It makes it easy for students and teachers to review progress over time and demonstrate growth. It helps capture the learning process and not just the product.



Our focus is on the growth journey for the individual student. Differentiation of tasks and learning which reflects the needs of individuals are captured, shared and celebrated.

There is a Seesaw website (app.seesaw. me), a class app and a family app. The class app allows each student and his teachers to post to his digital portfolio. Teachers can view student work and write individual comments. The family app allows parents/ carers to access and comment on the content of their child's digital portfolio, on a regular basis, with notifications given when new items have been posted.

The digital portfolio has made the students' learning, achievement and formative advice given by teachers a part of the daily experience of families. Feedback from parents and carers in the ELC has been overwhelmingly positive with the value of such timely insights into the boys' work being much appreciated.

The outcome of this trial year has been the decision to continue the implementation of Seesaw as the platform for the boys' online portfolio into Years 3, 4 and 5 in 2020.

<u>Music</u>

Junior School classroom music offers every boy from Pre-Kindergarten to Year 6 access to singing, movement, playing instruments and building their musical literacy.

Activities include a Year 2 choir, tuned percussion Years 2-6, recorder playing Years 3 and 4, and an introduction to string playing (violin and cello) in Year 3. In Year 4, the instrumental program is expanded to include woodwind, brass, percussion and strings. Weekly instruction with specialist instrumental teachers, combined with ensemble lessons, enables students to acquire ensemble skills. Students are provided with opportunities for learning that encompasses Orff and Kodaly teaching methodologies. This includes access to high quality musical repertoire, creative performance opportunities and deep learning.

'When you listen to music, multiple areas of your brain become engaged and active. But when you actually play an instrument, that activity becomes more like a full-body brain workout.' - Dr Anita Collins.

Co-curricular music operates as an extension of what the boys learn in classroom music and offers the opportunity to take up private lessons as well as being a member of an ensemble. Individual lessons are offered on a range of woodwind, brass and string instruments as well as voice, piano, guitar, bass and drums. Large music ensembles include Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 Pride Choirs, Junior Concert Band, Tutti Strings and Junior Orchestra. Music Camp is a fun activity undertaken by these ensembles.

2019 was a year of major change for Junior School Art. We moved into our new home, in the old staff room after months of careful planning. We are now lucky enough to have a purpose-built space, specifically designed to meet the needs of our younger boys. Beautiful surroundings, a new printing press and a space to relax, read and discuss, all make for a functional and inspiring space.

This investment in facilities is in line with the continuing value Hutchins places on the arts as an integral component of students' learning. As we look to the future and the rapid development of technology, it becomes increasingly apparent that the skills we develop in the Art room are those that futurists forecast as being valuable in the uncertain world of work that our students will face.

Dr Jordy Nguyen, at the recent National Future Schools conference, gave his top picks for skills needed in the future.

- 1. Creativity. Imagination. Adaptability.
- 2. Problem solving and critical thinking.
- 3. Interdisciplinary knowledge and experience.
- 4. Communication. Connection. Collaboration. Empathy.
- 5. Know thyself.

It occurred to me that all of the personal abilities listed above are the core business of the Junior School Art room. We are not just making great things to look at, we are learning to think, express our ideas, value the viewpoints of others and work together.

<u>Centre for</u> Excellence

Another busy and exciting year has seen the Centre for Excellence experience record numbers across the Early Learning Centre and Junior School. Mrs Judy Smith continues to champion the learning of our smallest boys in the ELC with the MiniLit Reading program showing great results across the board. Henry Eddington (Year 2) observed, 'I have learned a lot about how to write numbers and letters the right way. I am practicing every day, I have improved a lot.'

In Junior School Learning Support, Mrs Pip Hale, Mrs Alice Harris and Mrs Philippa Calvert, along with many of our wonderful Teaching Assistants, have continued to implement the Macquarie Literacy Program (MacqLit), directed at children in Year 3 and above. The small group, direct instruction program has been yielding excellent results. Importantly, the boys love learning, as Raphael Patiniotis (Year 3) commented, 'In the Centre I found out that learning is actually fun.' The Year 5 boys have been learning how to write narratives with the purpose of engaging the reader in an imaginative experience. The boys published their work using the assistive technology tool WordQ. 'The activities are fun because they are different and I learn more,' Luke Waterson (Year 3) observed when asked about learning in the Centre.

In Gifted and Talented classes, boys have been using round robin approaches to generate ideas about the HASS themes they are working on in class. Learning to apply brainstorming ideas in a concrete manner whilst showing some ingenuity, we have been creating 'Multipurpose Tool Belts'.

'We made a belt for a specific job using brainstorming techniques' - Samuel Smith (Year 5)

As a culminating activity for all of our creative thinking and brainstorming work this term, we used a 'working backwards' technique and were inspired to sketch out our own Rube Goldberg machines. Combining logistics and mental logic with fantasy and imagination; we came up with some original and complex chains!

'Oh, definitely, definitely, I especially loved drawing our Rube Goldberg machine!' - Zachary Knight

In Years 1 and 2 we have been learning all about Edward de Bono's *Six Thinking Hats*.

The Year 4s have been discovering the differences between an explorer and a conqueror, their motivations and ambitions. They discovered some interesting facts:

<u>Library</u>

2019 has been a year of selfreflection in the libraries. The Library Team worked together to consider how best to serve our students and wider school community, and undertook some special projects in the Stephens and Early Learning Centre Libraries.

We designed improved signage for the libraries to help students find the things they are looking for quickly and easily. This included researching guidelines for the best font and design techniques to support students with specific literacy difficulties. Both libraries underwent a comprehensive review of resources, resulting in the removal of old, unwanted books to make room for fresh, new and exciting resources to support the curriculum and engage student interest. In the Stephens Library we also created separate graphic novel collections in answer to the growing demand from Junior and Middle School students.

On the educational side, the library calendar is always full of action: National Simultaneous Storytime in May, Premier's Reading Challenge throughout Term 2, Book Week in Term 3, and author visits sprinkled here and there. In Term 1 our favourite wordsmith Sarah Brennan was back with the last in her Chinese Calendar Tales series, The Tale of Ping Pong Pig. Noted Australian author Aleesah Darlinson visited in April and ran writing workshops with Year 2 and Year 6G. The students thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and were eager to share the results of their creativity. Also in Term 2 was National Simultaneous Storytime, and our Headmaster, Dr Rob McEwan did an amazing job narrating this year's story, Alpacas with Maracas by Matt Cosgrove.

The Book Week theme in Term 3 was 'Reading is my secret power'. Junior School students created reading superheroes, wrote secret codes about their favourite books, and designed secret reading lairs in their Library lessons. The Stephens Library was certainly a super reading place this year!

Add to all these our promotion of user access to the online library catalogue, increased promotion and use of our ebook and audio book collections, and the libraries have been very busy places this year!

<u>Years 5/6</u> Debating



Debating proved a popular activity among the Years 5 and 6 boys in Term 2, with 16 boys taking up the opportunity to develop their ability to argue. Boys who had begun

their involvement in Year 5 returned as Year 6 participants to help upskill the new Year 5 boys. All showed an enormous increase in skills and confidence across the term.

Once again, the boys wrestled with the challenge of developing logical and convincing arguments in support of a premise they did not always agree with. They learned that writing a good speech is not enough – that working together as a team to develop strong arguments is the key to success. The debating afternoons alternated between preparation sessions and the inter-school debates. Preparation sessions used brainstorming to develop both sides of the topic, with the boys building up arguments for the negative and the affirmative sides before finding out which side they would actually speak for. They began to learn about the structure and protocols of debating including: the value of research to support statements; to plan for rebuttals; to listen closely, speak clearly; and present oneself well.

The boys worked as four teams and had the opportunity to debate against each other on occasion which made for some very enjoyable sessions. Each team had some wins and some losses, with all boys learning the value of respecting one's opponents. We wish the Year 6 boys good luck with debating in Middle School, and look forward to this year's Year 5 debaters leading the way for Junior School debating in 2020.

Design, Production & Digital Technologies

DESIGN TECHNOLOGIES

For Middle School boys the joy of making objects with their own hands brings a perspective to learning which is rich with experience and personal accomplishment.

Design education is one of only a few opportunities our boys get to have a large degree of ownership and responsibility with their learning. Working with materials, tools and equipment to solve design briefs draws on every skill and understanding the boys have from across many of their subjects. Project management and problem solving with tangible items exposes our boys to a process they have ownership of. Consequences are resolved and for many boys capacities are met and ones potential is realised.

The design and make tasks are underpinned with an effort to develop strong skills and a pride in craftsmanship and appreciation for accomplishing outcomes that build over a period of time.

With a larger input from today's clean technologies like laser cutter/engravers and 3D printers creativity is only limited by each individual's application.

Staff continually work at developing curriculum projects that reinforce the boys learning from across the curriculum and yet provide opportunity to be creative with materials and equipment. Skill development and understanding builds a foundation for further work in Design Technologies.

Our elective program offers our Year 8 boys opportunities to pursue areas of interest with Design in Wood, Robotics & Automation, Metal Engineering, CAD CAM,Computer Graphics & Housing and Design and Computer Science

In a progressively digitalised and automated world, it is crucial that students become innovative creators of digital solutions, effective users of digital systems and critical consumers of information conveyed by digital systems.

In view of this; Year 7 through studying the subject Digital Technologies, continue to progress their computational thinking skills (a practice of problem solving and of thought processes which allows complex solutions to be derived using computing systems) a core focus, where key concepts are consolidated through coding in a Block Based programming language, culminating in the development of an app, game or animation. Authentic and applied learning experiences improve problem solving skills for both individual and groups within the classroom. Further, students experience a range of digital systems such as, a micro controller to deepen their understanding on hardware, software and networks.

The emphasis in Year 8 is on problem solving and computational thinking. Students can demonstrate this through an Object Orientated Programming language as they gain an understanding of Python. In addition, they learn how to create and share content on web pages, how to structure and style pages using HTML and CSS. They gain an insight into the importance of data in solving problems, highlighting how computers can help in this process. They explore different systems used to represent information in a computer and the challenges and trade-offs posed by using them. Specifically, learning how collections of data are used to solve problems, and how computers help to automate the steps of this process.

All students are encouraged to explore trends and issues which will impact society in the near future. Developments such as self-driving transport systems, the Internet of Things, machine learning, artificial intelligence, augmented and virtual reality systems are studied. Importantly, students are expected to critically analyse and debate the technologies which over time have sparked controversy and caused speculation.

<u>English & Modern</u> Languages

ENGLISH

The joy of immersing ourselves in texts does not stop with understanding the idea(s) that the creator is sharing with us. Once we have understood how a text is constructed and crafted and how ideas are represented we can then use our imagination to craft our own version of those ideas.

In Year 7 this year we studied a novel called *Trash* by Andy Mulligan. This novel had a range of effects on us. We saw that boys of the same age as us were faced with immediate issues such as hunger and disease on a daily basis in a community that exists around a dumpsite. The text opened up ideas of poverty and corruption and examined the causes and effects of these.

We also talked about the idea of walking in someone else's shoes, which led to some empathetic writing based on a sensory approach. What would one of these young people taste, smell, hear and touch and how did that impact on their feelings and actions? First, we seek to understand from the literature we are exposed to and then we seek to create or imagine from the impact it has had on us.

In Year 8 we read a novel called *Don't Call Me Ishmael* by Gerard Michael Bauer that included an examination of bullying and intimidation and how different people cope with that environment. The novel also deals with friendship and loyalty when facing the odds and these topics produced some empathetic writing. The novel included practical jokes that were meant to cause harm and our boys were asked to respond creatively by reporting one incident in the school magazine.

Students in Year 8 also explored the idea of an Australian identity: how it has developed and changed and what it may look like in the future. As part of this unit, the boys considered stereotypes of Australia and questioned whether they include the many cultures now living in our country. They analysed the series Go Back To Where You Came From that experimentally exposes participants to the journey of asylum seekers and life for refugees in Australia. The students responded with maturity and provided their own interpretations through creative pieces aimed at putting themselves in the shoes of someone seeking asylum here.

The Poetry and Prose afternoon is always a celebration of impactful language and enthralling stories. Omer Atif won the Year 7 poetry section with a personality fuelled rendition of "I Love my Job" by Dr Suess. Andreas Tsiakis' compelling performance of an extract from Stumbling on Happiness: How Human Beings Think about the Future by Daniel Gilbert won the Year 8 Prose section. The overall winner was Taj Parsons, Year 8, whose recitation of "Australian Air" by Solli Raphael captivated the audience.

<u>Humanities &</u> Social Sciences

HISTORY

The study of History is an integral part of Middle School learning at Hutchins. A detailed introduction to the processes of historical inquiry, reasoning and research skills characterised much of 2019. Students were asked to consider the way in which historians identify, gather and categorise evidence and draw valid and reliable conclusions from it. Considering topics as diverse as pre-history, ancient history and the diversity of the medieval world in Europe and Asia, students expanded not only their knowledge, but equally importantly, their understanding of the process by which humankind, has, through a continuous process of relationship building, conflict and resolution have given rise to societies characterised by creativity, aspiration, enterprise and imagination.

GEOGRAPHY

Throughout the year, Year 7 students have considered the importance of water in our world, contested issues of place and livability as well as the relationship between Indigenous and Non-Indigenous connections to Country. In Year 8 Geography students investigated important Geographical ideas through units including 'Concepts in Geography', 'Landforms and Landscapes', 'Coastal Processes' and 'Changing Nations'. On this journey, students have discovered key concepts as well as learning about contemporary issues that face our youth both here and abroad. Robust in-class discussions generated some lateral thinking and gave our boys an awareness of urban and rural environments. Our Changing Nations unit identified key issues that developing nations are facing and ways in which we can make our environment sustainable for future generations.

PHILOSOPHY

The emphasis on asking and understanding the critical thought processes in answering the perennial 'big questions' of existence, God and the meaning of life, amongst others, characterised the study of Philosophy in the Middle School in 2019.

Philosophical questions, because they are usually foundational and abstract in nature, deeply extend our students to think carefully and rationally, to question assumptions, biases and stereotypes and to understand and follow the rules of logic. It is for this reason, as well as the intrinsic importance of questions such as 'What does it mean to live a good life?' and: 'Is there a difference between my mind and my body?', that makes the study of philosophy both endlessly fascinating and challenging. In 2019 our Year 8 students have demonstrated that no important philosophical question should go unanswered.

SENIOR SCHOOL Years 9–12



We are very proud of our Senior School and the potential opportunities it offers our students for growth, self-development and challenge. The aim in the Senior School is on sharing the journey that enables a young man to maximise his own potential to develop into a good man.

Head of Senior School

The Senior School was led this year by two exceptional young men, Oliver Burrows-Cheng as School Captain and Alexander Hogan-Jones as School Vice-Captain. I have thoroughly enjoyed working with them over the year, their sense of responsibility to each of their roles has been outstanding as has been their support of both one another, the broader leadership and Year 12 group.

I congratulate them on their sense of fun, integrity, willingness to encourage others to do their best and to be their best, and most importantly to exhibit that same sentiment in all that they do. Oliver was a celebrity throughout the entire school (but especially in the ELC and Junior School) and highlighted to all students from K-12 the importance of genuine relationships and connections, and their role in building a stronger community.

Further leadership within the Senior School was provided by the Captain group of Malcolm Ward (Stephens), Billy Blackett (School), Thomas Reeves (Buckland), Martyn Szoke (Thorold) and Yejia (Teddy) Liu (Burbury House) and then again by another 19 Prefects, 24 SRC members (led by Alex Stephens) and numerous boys taking on leadership roles within Houses, sports or across the School more broadly. Leadership is not just about the few out the front, it is more about what we all do and how we all behave and respond each and every day, and in this respect Year 12 students are the most visible through the culmination of their schooling experiences and the subsequent expectations placed upon them. This year, the weekly Prefect meeting morphed into a Year 12 Leadership Meeting with an open invitation extended to all Year 12 students.

It was wonderful to see a small group of boys outside the Prefect group attend on a weekly basis and actively contribute to the discussion and execution of many events. I hope the idea and mindset that all Year 12 students are leaders within the School continues to gain traction and more of the cohort begin attending and contributing their voice.

I have said before that our student leaders exemplify diversity and do not succumb to the notion of a mould. An incredibly important element to leadership is understanding that your role is often about making things better for other people and demonstrating a preparedness to do the right thing for the benefit of other students and the broader community. This year's leaders have taken our community service learning to new levels; we have involved ourselves with work for disadvantaged youths through a commitment to youth camps; we have made massive inroads into changing our school culture around sustainability through the work of the inaugural Student Sustainability Committee; and our commitment to the mental health and overall wellbeing of our students has seen over 100 students involved in Mental Health Youth First Aid, some of these students recognised as Youth Mental Health First Aid Officers, and Statewide recognition for our work in this area through the Tasmanian LIFE Awards.

This year the Senior School has supported The Smith Family through their 'Freezin' for a reason' efforts at Sandy Bay Beach, the Grand Final Breakfast, the inaugural Year 12 Swimathon and numerous other events. I am proud to say that this year the Senior School was able to present a cheque for \$17,500 to The Smith Family at the last Headmaster's Assembly for 2019.

This magazine serves as a wonderful reminder of the breadth of opportunities that are available in the Senior School.



Each of these activities serves to provide our students with avenues to explore, experience and excel and you will see this as you read through the different opportunities available at different year levels. It is important at this point to highlight the dedication and skill set of our staff, parents, carers and members of the broader Hutchins community who freely offer their time and skills to enable us to offer such a diverse set of experiences which both challenge and nurture each of our boys.

The year in review would not be complete without the Cock House Cup. The full complement of competitions involved Swimming, Cross Country, Athletics, Summer and Winter Sports Days, Drama, Music, Debating and Chess; and at the conclusion to all of these competitions School House were able to claim a convincing victory over Buckland in 2nd place, Stephens House in 3rd and Thorold in 4th. Curriculum

Improving outcomes through data analytics

We have been working on many innovations this year around curriculum development across the School. Our use of online feedback and assessment in Years 6–12 has been a significant development which allows us to track student engagement and progress. This is critical to improve learning because ongoing monitoring of progress enables teachers to determine what interventions are required at particular points in time.

This information is not only drawn from academic tracking but also attendance and behaviour. This allows us to identify issues and act. It helps us provide the support and guidance our boys need when it matters most.

Under the leadership of our Dean of Studies and Learning Analytics, Mr James Seddon, the School has developed a software system that allows us to draw information around the academic performance, engagement and attendance of the boys so that we can develop a more holistic view of each student. This data can be used to help determine individualised programs for students and give them the opportunity to achieve better results at their own pace. They can use offline and online resources, which we call blended learning, and our internal data indicates this is improving performance and participation in specific senior level subjects.

To the left are examples of some of the information that can be drawn from the vast amount of data we can collect on a daily basis.

Sharing this information with students along their learning journey is a powerful way to help them take control of their learning. It is the formative tasks, the daily observations and recordings of how our boys are travelling that is most powerful in helping them improve their learning and our teaching. With parents/carers now able to access this progress through Rory allows families to work together to help build and share in their son's achievements on a regular basis. We look forward to developing our collection and use of this data as we move forward in 2020.

Careers & Vocational Education & Training (VET)

Are young Australians ready for a world yet to be imagined?

This is the attention grabbing headline that CICA (Career Industry Council Australia) has used to promote its upcoming national series of forums #knowtheanswer? The promotional information goes on to say...

To be successful in the future world of work, young people will need skills and capabilities to navigate this new world. They will require a portfolio of skills and capabilities to make well informed career decisions throughout life.

During 2019 boys from Hutchins have been provided opportunities to explore possible futures beyond Hutchins through engaging with a wide variety of pathway providers from Universities, Vocational Education and Training (VET), apprenticeship and employment sectors and have started to develop an understanding of the "skills and capabilities to navigate this new world".

VET courses aligned to industry including, engineering, hospitality, real estate and maritime have been undertaken by a significant number of boys with several students undertaking School Based Traineeships across a variety of qualifications, including horticulture (Zane Foster), information technology (Tom McEwan) and Building and Construction (Finn McLagan). There are also several boys completing VET Retail Certificates, gaining a qualification, TCE points and valuable employability skills. I would like to highlight Rhys Evans who successfully completed a Certificate III in Property Services and was nominated as a State finalist at this year's State Training Awards as encapsulating the ability for Hutchins boys to develop a "portfolio of skills and capabilities" whilst at Hutchins. Whilst Rhys has successfully completed the VET qualification, he is actively pursuing a tertiary medical pathway.

Hutchins students have also been provided with numerous opportunities to explore careers requiring university pathways with opportunities for boys to engage with universities including Lincoln (NZ), Bond, ANU, and UTAS. As part of these interactions various scholarships are discussed and represent exciting opportunities that should not be overlooked! On this note, I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and congratulate both Oliver Burrows-Cheng and Mackenzie Evans on their recent scholarship offers from Bond University and wish them every success in their future studies.

Looking ahead into 2020 I would urge each student to access as many of the opportunities provided to interact with future pathways providers, to hear first hand of the skills and capabilities required, opportunities for scholarships and gain information to make informed career decisions.

The Centre for Excellence continues to grow and support boys through Academic Support, Academic Extension programs and individual pathways. The boys have been 'kicking goals' in both their achievements and in competitions. The da Vinci Decathlon was a big part of the year in Senior School with Hutchins hosting the State final in April. Hutchins fielded three Year 9/10 teams with our results being 4th, 6th and 13th place. We went to Nationals at Knox in June and placed 3rd in Maths and Codebreaking.

The International da Vinci Decathlon is held every two years in Italy and this year, Hutchins was fortunate to be invited for the first time. Competing against teams from Australia, Scotland and India, the competition is a diverse and academically challenging event that is designed to challenge students in the 10 disciplines of English, Mathematics, Science, Ideation, Engineering, Creative Producers, Art and Poetry, Codebreaking, General Knowledge and Spelling. The Hutchins teams of Benjamin Boman, Mark Elkerton, Ben Tassell, Harry Sillifant, James King, Seth Homfray, Leo Wang, Jasper Osgerby, Benjamin Horsham, Benjamin Davie, Max Baldock, Andrew Gregg, Jake Wilkinson, Jack Carr, Hugh Saxby and Thomas Jetson jetted off to Rome on 21 September with Ms Cath Hogan and Mrs Giovanna Padas. The exciting highlights included tours of the Vatican, Colosseum, Trevi Fountain and Spanish Steps in Rome; Pompeii, Sienna and the Leaning Tower in Pisa; Venice and the Leonardo da Vinci inventions museum; the secret passages of the Palazzo Vecchio and the Academia Museum in Florence and of course the competition itself on the final days of the trip.

Hutchins won the competition overall, which was an outstanding achievement. Congratulations to all the boys but especially the team of Benjamin Horsham, Benjamin Davie, Max Baldock, Andrew Gregg, Jake Wilkinson, Jack Carr, Hugh Saxby and Thomas Jetson who are the current titleholders of the Year 9/10 International da Vinci event.

Design thinking and practical skills development delivered through project based learning for us keeps our programs authentic and current and with the students exercising ownership and a creative response.



Starting early in the Junior School with digital technologies experience our boys get to explore learning based around robotics and coding. Working within a problem-solving framework the computational thinking and machine learning logic encourages the boys to think about their world in different ways.

Moving through the School, our Middle School boys continue a journey of design make and appraise, looking into the value of recording portfolios and journals to build records of their learning. Reflective practice is encouraged to further learning from constructing understanding based on success and failure. Student engagement is important with boys driving decision making and managing tasks that run over extended periods of time.

Senior boys can elect both a tertiary and non-tertiary selection of subjects. Digital technologies like Information Systems and Computer Science are fantastic pathways to the biggest employment sector we will see this century. Every aspect from cyber security through to artificial intelligence and automation is currently forecast to be the employment sector most of our boys will eventually work in. We support this pathway with an ever-increasing capacity from Junior through to Senior Schools.

Craft and the pleasure of making things with your hands is heralded in places across the curriculum and no less with us. Mastering skills and understanding of materials is significant in the development of young minds and most rewarding in young man's world of work and leisure. Designing and making is truly good for one's soul. Object Design, which runs out of the University of Tasmania, again brings pathways and ample challenges to our boys pursuing the design sector for future careers and employment.

We keep current and respond the best we can to demands from a national curriculum and the world of work. New age skills and those 'soft skills' which are so eagerly sought these days are embedded across our many programs.

<u>English &</u> Modern Languages

Year 10 students studied Australian author, James Roy's award winning collection of short stories, *Town*, this year. Roy's 13 interconnected stories provided rich material for examining identity, gender roles and relationships to place. The boys responded with maturity and critiqued the concept of reputation.

'The stories show how reputation can be extremely unfair and harmful; and even if opinions are commonly shared, it does not mean that they are true.'

'Reputation is a powerful concept in *Town*, despite it being a shallow or inaccurate way of viewing someone. There are different facets of reputation and each has its own power, from weaponry to armour.' – Benjamin Davie

As part of the action research undertaken in Mrs Giovanna Padas' class, students generated their own dense questions and responded in a format of their choice. Cycles of peer feedback and self-assessment further developed boys' agency.

In what ways does reputation fall away in small group compared to larger group interactions?

'In large groups...reputation is difficult to manage...[it] either keeps people up or it holds them down and is often very difficult to change. But, as shown by the characters' experiences in *Town*, reputation means little when in small groups...just being honest can be enough to change someone's perspective and be a step towards improving your reputation.'- Jake Maumill

Mrs Giovanna Padas English Teacher In ICAS English, Malcolm Ward (Year 12) and Izac Grantham (Year 11) both received a Distinction and a Medal; and Benjamin Davie, (Year 10) achieved a High Distinction and a Medal. Distinctions were also achieved by Mark Elkerton (Year 10), Benjamin Horsham (Year 10), Luca Nunn (Year 9) and Jasper Osgerby (Year 9).

Topics in Speech and Performance this year ranged from the cultural, "Spoilers and story" to the political, "Hong Kong in the future". Benjamin Horsham (Year 10) won the Intermediate section for his speech on the highly relevant issue of "Integrity in Journalism" and Sudhaunshu Hardikar (Year 12) won the Senior section with a philosophical examination of "Humility and Confidence".

The quality of student writing was evident in a larger than usual number of entrants in the Hutchins Poetry and Prose Writing Competitions. In the Intermediate section, the judges found "Holocaust Memoir" by Mark Elkerton (Year 10) to be "very moving" and congratulated him on finding a balance between historical information and a creative personal voice. Mark also won the Intermediate section for Poetry for "Careless and free", which was admired by the judges in particular for its structure. In the Senior Prose section, the judges thought Lewis Traill's winning story, "Come Apart", "read effortlessly" and included "genuine pathos". Daniel Mackintosh and Louis Miller courageously took on the challenge of composing additions in the poetic style of Shakespeare to Richard III and King Lear respectively and were judged as being at an "astonishingly high standard".

EAL/D

In our EAL/D classes, through laughter and a shared sense of purpose, we have become a community of learners. CHINESE

There are more than 50 local students studying Chinese as a second language and around 10 international students studying Chinese as a background language. Meaningful cultural and language exchanges have taken place between classes and the boarding house over the year. Our enthusiastic linguists have benefited from peer learning between local and international students, Chinese cultural celebrations, and our popular visiting assistant teacher, Jerry Zhao from China. Rhys Evans (Year 12) achieved 3rd place and Mark Elkerton (Year 10) achieved an Honourable Mention in the Chinese Speech Competition, and a number of boys will receive their HSK certifications in December. Learning went beyond the classroom when a delegation from the Xi'an Foreign Language School visited us in February. Some 2019 leavers who started Chinese in Year 7 are now aspiring to continue their Chinese studies at tertiary level and/or take a gap year in China.

Health & Physical Education

<u>Humanities &</u> Social Sciences

In its 2018 report *Education 2030 – The Future* of *Education and Skills*, The Organisation for Economic and Cultural Development found that there has never been a more urgent need for learners to understand and respond to change; economic, environmental and social. In the Humanities and Social Sciences at Hutchins we create and sustain vital and dynamic learning environments so that our students' preconceptions are challenged, and where they take individual and collective responsibility in recognising and reconciling historical and contemporary tensions and dilemmas.

In our History classrooms this year students developed a rich understating of how historical knowledge is fundamental to understanding ourselves; where we have come from and what influences, movements and developments have shaped the world we live in today. Students across the year levels consider and reflect on topics as rich and broad as the birth of Democracy in Ancient Greece and its influences in contemporary society. Industrial Revolution, the European settlement of Australia and its ongoing impact on our First Nations. Importantly students explored a number of the defining turning points in modern history such as the Holocaust as well as the Civil Rights movement both in the United States and Australia. The study of history provides our students with the opportunity to develop transferable skills of critical and creative thinking, such as the ability to explore questions, imagine possibilities and construct arguments.

In Philosophy our students engage with many different schools of thought and philosophical inquires. This year in Year 8 Philosophy there was a strong focus on the concept of Utilitarianism. Students were guided in their thinking in appreciating their responsibility to be 'other regarding' and to put the 'greatest good for the greatest number' ahead of their own preferences.



In Geography students are given opportunity to further develop not only geographic knowledge but also inquiry methods. Through this approach, learners come to a greater understanding of the world and the diversity of its environments, cultures and economies. By applying the key concepts of geography, including space, place, interconnection, change, environment, sustainability and scale, in conjunction with the inquiry process and its accompanying skills, learners become geographical thinkers helping them to see the world in a unique and powerful way.

While more vocationally based, students undertaking the study of Business, Economics, Accounting and Legal Studies have explored and examined topics as rich and diverse as Human Resource Management, Australia's relationship with our major trading partners and the recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in our National Constitution. Rounding off our offerings is the study of society, and our evolving role and relationships within it, in the study of Sociology.

In closing, when we think about global shifts in technology, innovation and the global environment and economy, studies in the Humanities and Social Sciences are needed more than ever to provide student balance and perspective. Further, their role in strengthening our students international view and in developing their critical thinking skills as well as to reinforce individual and collective ethical responsibilities and values, all fall within the responsibility of the Humanities and Social Sciences Faculty. It is a responsibility which we, as a staff, take seriously as we ensure that our students are best prepared for the future.

National Winners – Business Educators Australasia Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition 2019

As a part of their course work, Business Studies 3 students undertake a Feasibility Study of a business idea of their own. Students are required to incorporate the following aspects into their business plan: business name, prime function, location, legal structure, staffing requirements, marketing plan, pricing, financial plan (which includes set up/start-up costs, how they are to be funded, a sales forecast and a 12-month cash budget) as well as the future prospects of their enterprise.

Plans were entered in the Business Educators Australasia Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition in two divisions: Division 1 is for individual entries and Division 2 is for group entries. Six of our students were short-listed as state finalists Abby Calvert from Fahan School, Lily Fisher, Heather Russell and Alexandra Wilbur from St Michael's Collegiate and Hugo Hemmings and Ethan Medwin from Hutchins. Of those, three were successful as state winners, Lily Fisher, Hugo Hemmings and Ethan Medwin. Subsequent to being state winners, Lily was successful as the National Division 1 winner and Hugo and Ethan became the National Division 2 winners. A remarkable and unique achievement for the students and Hutchins and our co-operative schools.

State and National Winner – Division 1

Lily Fisher (Year 11) from St Michael's Collegiate School developed a plan for Freycinet Bike Hire, a bike rental service for tourists and locals at Tasmania's most popular holiday destination. It is an untapped market on the Peninsula which will encourage tourists to explore the coastline via multiuse bike paths, off-road tracks and the town's streets.

State and National Winner – Division 2

Hugo Hemmings and Ethan Medwin (Year 11) developed a plan for Burr Parking, a carpark sharing app which will allow people to rent out their carparks to generate income from their unused asset. It will help provide a solution to the parking problem that Hobart is facing by creating more parking space out of car parks that already exist.

Information & Communications Technology (ICT)

2019 has been a huge year for our ICT Department. We started the year by moving into our shiny new open plan office. This office space opens out into the main staff room and provides a great hub for collaboration between ICT staff and teaching staff.

This year we have deployed over 100 Chromebooks, 90 iPads, scores of apps, installed 30 75inch screens, setup new backup infrastructure, built a new parent app, moved our entire server room and infrastructure, installed a new notice board system, installed a new phone system, and deployed a new data analytics system for teaching staff.

We are very proud of the Hutchins App that we developed over Term 1 and are currently sitting on 1450 downloads. The app allows you to see your son's timetable and results, notify the School of absentees, access finance, update your details and much more. If you haven't downloaded the app, download it now!

For any IT assistance you require, the Helpdesk is always open to enquiries from parents and carers. You can call us through Reception or email us at helpesk@hutchins.tas.edu.au. The Helpdesk techies are like coiled springs waiting to leap into action. This year the Helpdesk has averaged 206 closed tickets per month and resolved a total of 2725 tickets for the year with an average response time of 40 hours.

The IT team has also facilitated two cooking competitions for support staff in the school holidays. It is important that we emerge from the bright glow of our computer screens and enjoy some fun events with our fellow staff. Both competitions were a huge success with all those attending enjoying amazing dishes from a Slow Cooker Competition and a \$10 Dish competition which was kindly funded by the Staff Wellbeing kitty.

We would also like to congratulate our trainee Mr William Allen, for not only completing his Certificate IV in ICT, but being nominated as a Tasmanian Trainee of the Year finalist. Mr Allen has now joined Hutchins as a full time employee in the role of IT Application Support Analyst.

What plans do we have for 2020? We have a big new staff laptop deployment, Chromebooks are moving into Year 7, the app will be further developed, and we are upgrading the entire school network including a shiny new WiFi system. These are exciting and busy times for the IT team.

<u>Music</u>

This year Classroom Music in the Senior School has been one of growth and development.

Our courses begin with the Year 9 program which takes our musicians further in their exploration of music theory, small ensemble performance and composition accessing a range of music software options. The Year 10 course builds on prior knowledge and leads into a choice of pathways for our senior music students. TASC Music 2 and 3 are challenging courses which requires a significant level of music literacy, aural skills, performance and/or composition craft and music analysis skills. Students are required to present an externally assessed performance recital or composition folio at the end of this course. This year our candidates have presented programs on violin, contemporary voice, drum kit and a composition folio. We also offered FCP and UCP courses which are administered and examined by the University of Tasmania. The FCP course is focussed on performance or composition and requires students to submit a folio of work which includes concert critiques, analysis assignments and reflective journals.

Students work with professional teachers in their area of study and their final recitals, which are a culmination of a year's work are held at the Conservatorium of Music Recital Hall. This course produces some outstanding performance work and we look forward to seeing where our students from this year's cohort choose to follow their musical studies next year at the tertiary level. This year the UCP course was an exciting addition to our options for students. This course is built around music technology and was able to proceed due to a recent upgrade of the Hutchins Audio Hub, which includes a completely refurbished radio station and podcast centre, upgraded recording studio and music technology suite which facilitates the UCP course. Students have completed modules which include Midi song production, live recording techniques and creating audio for visual clips. We look forward to the continuing development of music courses in the Senior School and congratulate all of our senior music students on their achievements and musical development throughout the year.

Outdoor Education

Finding balance in life can be hard, especially with a busy school, sport and social life. Exposure to nature, the quiet and basic needs can be a medicine. Outdoor Education has adventure at its core, but also has the slow nature of life in cooking a communal dinner and setting up a tent for a good night's sleep.

The activities we offer in Outdoor Education caters to many passions and provides students with access to experiences that aim to support a spirit of adventure, fun and personal growth. With 45 students enrolled across our senior Outdoor Education courses, this year proved once again to be a busy time far out in Tasmanian wilderness.

Year 10 Outdoor Education class time was used to prepare for adventures and covered areas such as risk and safety, minimal impact practices, trip planning and nutrition, first aid and navigation. Students faced their first challenge of the year with a newly created sea level traverse and navigation challenge on Bruny Island. This involved bursting around to the eastern side of the island in the RIB and swimming to shore. Year 11 and 12 Outdoor Leadership students again faced the Collingwood River in packrafts, experiencing and celebrating the iconic Franklin River, sleeping beside its ever-present flow, tempting us further downstream.

In Term 2, students opted to complete challenging winter walks into Pine Valley, a rock-climbing trip to a newly developed site and a ride on the trails at Derby.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SCIENCE CONFERENCE - ISSC HOBART 2019

The 15th ISSC, hosted by The Hutchins School in the first week of the Term 3 holidays, saw over 60 students from Italy, China, Sydney, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Hobart take part in a week of science enrichment. The theme for this year's conference 'Human Impacts on the environment: science informing prevention and mitigation' was explored through student research presentations, expert guest speakers and excursions to places around Hobart of scientific, environmental or cultural significance.

Hutchins students who presented at the conference were Year 10 students Hamish McDougall (The Effect of Fire on Soils) and Aidan Sanderson, Byron Seward, and Dashan Forrest (Optimising the Output of a Wind Turbine).

The conference was a great opportunity for Hutchins boys and other young scientists, from different countries and cultures, to meet and to form friendships, and in the process experience some of the things that makes Tasmania distinctive: our science, our natural environment, and our culture.

INTERNATIONAL YOUNG PHYSICISTS' TOURNAMENT – POLAND 2019

Raiden Lemon (Year 12), was selected in the Australian IYPT for the second year in a row. The Australian team consisted of three students from John Monash Science School in Melbourne, one student from Brisbane Girls Grammar School, and Raiden Lemon from Hutchins - who was the team captain. Thirty four countries were competing in the six day 'Physics World Cup' in Warsaw in July. Australia was able to win two rounds out of the five, i.e. their total points for report, opposition, and review within the room was highest – which is a great effort. Raiden investigated the spectrum of sounds heard when filling up a bottle, Newton's Cradle and the undertone sound that occurs when an object vibrates at lower frequency than the driving frequency. After five rounds of physics fights Australia came in at 22nd spot, ahead of the UK and just behind the USA, Belarus and Russia. The IYPT was a fantastic opportunity for

Raiden to represent his country, experience • academic scrutiny across cultures, and to meet and make friends with other like-minded students from around the world.

The 10th JYPT was held in Wellington, New Zealand. The Hutchins team consisted of Year 10 students Bolong (Tim) Shen, Angus Christie, and Oliver Clennett, along with Year 9 students Oliver Hugo and Luca Nunn. The Team Leader was Mr James Seddon. The fight sees competitors present their findings and then defend their understanding of concepts and experimental method when opposed by another team. The JYPT is an extended investigation for our top students. At the tournament they competed well, along the way learning about the Bernoulli Principle, the Coanda Effect, the ideal gas laws and many other physics concepts.

ATHLETICS

The Hutchins Athletics Team had a number of remarkable performances throughout the season. The Southern SATIS carnival in mid-September was the first opportunity for 40 boys from the Senior School to showcase their hard work. The boys performed brilliantly on the day, achieving numerous personal bests and claiming the Boys Aggregate Trophy. In a close encounter with Guildford Young College, the Open boys recorded some notable wins. Oliver Burrows-Cheng (Year 12) dominated the sprints/hurdles winning the 100m, 200m and 110m hurdles, also winning their respective events were Robert Elkerton (Year 12) the 3000m, Raiden Lemon (Year 12) the discus and Taine Sookee (Year 11) the high jump. Further wins included Oliver Elrick (Year 10) in the U16 100m Hurdles as one of his impressive seven events, and Timothy Mitchell (Year 9) in the U15 high jump.

A week later, the team travelled north to compete at the State SATIS event. In what started as a very favourable day of athletics, there were some dominant performances from the boys before the weather took a turn for the worse, with heavy winds and rainfall leading to the cancellation of the event. Robert Elkerton opened the day winning the Open boys 3000m. Further strong performances came from Oliver Burrows-Cheng in the Open 100 and 200, Torin Jones (Year 12) in the Open 400m and 800m, and Timothy Mitchell in the U15 high jump. Hutchins also entered teams in the Intermediate and Senior divisions of the Nitro Schools Challenge with the senior team of Jagga Pybus, Oliver Burrows-Cheng, Torin Jones, Raiden Lemon and Robert Elkerton invited to attend the National Schools Nitro Final in Perth, Western Australia. At the National Final the team finished in 4th place at the end of 10 events with outstanding performances from Raiden in the Shot Put (2nd); Raiden, Torin, Oliver and Jagga in the Swedish Relay (2nd) and Torin and Robert in the 2 x 2 x 400m (2nd).

This event was an excellent opportunity for the boys to represent Hutchins for the final time, concluding many years of competing together around the country in the Nitro Finals and its predecessor the Knockout Finals.

I would like to thank everyone involved in Hutchins Athletics this year – the students, staff and parents for their support. After being defeated in their first two matches the U14s came together as a cohort and went on to win all of their remaining games. The U16 side saw much success throughout their season winning many of their hard fought matches. Unfortunately the U18s were without competition for the 2019 season.

Hutchins boys made up a large portion of the 2019 Tasmanian sides with representation across all age groups. Special congratulations to Nicholas Allardice and Torin Jones (both Year 12) who were selected as a part of the combined states and Barbarian Cavaliers sides competing in the Division 1 championship in Sydney.

It has been yet another fulfilling and rewarding year for all members of Stephens House. The year has passed us by so quickly, but upon reflection, we have been able to engage in such a variety of activities that have enabled us to grow both individually and as a community.

Over the past few years, we have developed a very close relationship with both Mitch McPherson and James Rice from Speak Up! Stay ChatTY. As a House, we were proud to see that what started as a desire to spread the message of looking out for and supporting our mates, has grown to a school-wide awareness and further work by staff and prefects to include the training and appointment of Mental Health Contact Officers. Celebrating our 2019 leavers

It is with pleasure that I share with you a sample of the outstanding academic achievements of our Year 12 students in 2019. The exceptional results are a testament to the boys' efforts and discipline to academic studies throughout the year. For some boys, their commitment to academic study placed them amongst the very highest achieving students in Tasmania, while for many others, their hard work culminated in achievements beyond their own expectations.

In summary, five boys achieved an ATAR above 99 and 27 boys achieved the highest score possible in at least one pre-tertiary subject. The median ATAR was 84.6 and 19.35% of our boys achieved an ATAR above 95. In addition, the Vocational Education and Training (VET) program at Hutchins continues to provide a breadth of opportunity that enables boys to tailor their educational pathway to pursue personal career and learning goals. Boys completed gualifications in horticulture, real estate, construction, retail, engineering, tourism, hospitality, fitness and maritime. Additionally, boys completed school-based traineeships in areas such as information technology, construction, retail and horticulture, combining VET qualifications with employment, TCE attainment and ATAR pathways. 53% of our Year 12 boys completed at least one VET unit and nine boys completed certificates in Vocational Education and Training in addition to their TCE studies, including three Level III qualifications.

I thank all staff who have inspired and supported each boy along his own learning journey. This summary of results is the culmination of at least 12 years of education. I also thank the staff at both our sister school, St Michael's Collegiate, and Fahan School for their support and delivery of a number of Year 11 and 12 classes as part of the co-operating schools' agreement. It is important to note that the Year 12 academic achievements included in this summary reflect only one part of the comprehensive educational experience available to boys.

The contribution and leadership made by our graduating Year 12 cohort in 2019 alone has been significant across all aspects of the School with highlights being their support of The Smith Family, a children's charity helping disadvantaged Australian children that involved both reading to children over the phone and raising \$19,384 for the organisation.
