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# Chair of the Board

I want to take this opportunity to summarise the School's master plan. In 2020 the Board engaged GHD Woodhead and North Projects to undertake a major study into the facilities at the School with a view to providing a master plan with a 30-year horizon. The rationale for that was that decisions about upgrading existing facilities or the construction of new facilities should be made with a view to what the School will look like in the future and what it will need in the future, not necessarily just what it might need now. This particularly concerned the extent of works that may be need to be undertaken. Works that may seem suitable for current needs may not be suitable 5 or 10 years' time.

The resultant comprehensive master plan was adopted by the Board in mid-2021. It identified three major projects, and many more additional projects.

Major Project 1 was identified as a new auditorium/sports and reception area with linkages to the Senior School. This project became the N J Edwards Hub. This is by far the largest building project ever undertaken by the School and is now rapidly rising above the ground. In mid-December it is expected that Fairbrother will undertake the biggest suspended slab concrete pour it has ever done. Once that is done, we can expect to see the structure rising quickly and the roof should be on by April. Then there will 12 months of fitting out before a highly anticipated opening in March 2026.

The existing Palfreyman Gymnasium was completed in 1974, 50 years ago. It is certainly time to provide our students with a safer, spectator friendly environment with appropriate separate changing rooms and which is able to be configured for performances and assemblies, with teaching areas and a magnificent reception space.

Major Project 2 was identified as an underpass and connection between the Middle and Junior Schools with the N J Edwards Hub. It is expected that before the end of December 2024, the School will lodge with Hobart City Council a development application for a 5.5 metre wide tunnel under Nelson Road. This will connect the N J Edwards Hub to the Middle School. The existing underpass is 1.5 metres wide. It has a set of steps leading down to it that in winter can be very slippery, and it requires students to walk along the footpaths of Nelson Road for access.

The new tunnel will have full flat access and will be on the same level as the lift in the Edwards Hub. It will enable the movement of large numbers of students safely, efficiently and quickly from one part of the campus to another. This will involve substantial works, including the closure of Nelson Road for some weeks.



The design is complete, and discussions have been held with the Hobart City Council general manager and his planning staff. It is hoped that approvals will enable work to be commenced over the summer holidays next year and ideally be complete at the same time as the N J Edwards Hub is opened.

Major Project 3 is described as a pool/ carpark. A suitable area for a pool has been identified, and this remains on the future works list.

Additional projects identified in the Master Plan included:

- Redevelopment of the Early Learning Centre lower level and play spaces. That was completed last year resulting in the magnificent ELC campus we now have.
- Relocation of the School Uniform Store and relocation of the School Maintenance department to the old service station area. That is almost complete now.
- Reimagining and landscaping of War Memorial Ovel verge to improve social spaces. Part of this has been done with a new play area created thanks to the Parents' Association.
- Upgrading the Nelson Road streetscape as development is done. That is partly done following completion of the Chris Rae Building and will continue as the N J Edwards Hub is completed. This also includes consideration of a bus layby on Nelson Road to improve traffic movement at busy times. The Board is considering this particular issue now.

Other additional projects which the Board will be considering over the next year are:

- Repurposing of the Palfreyman Gymnasium. This is a substantial building and has a very large interior space which has numerous possible uses, and it provides a major opportunity for clever re-purposing for a number of uses.
- Redevelopment of the Technology and Art facilities, some of which are long past their best. Part of the Art department is located in the oldest building on the campus built in 1946.
- Expansion and redevelopment of the Music department including a performance studio.
- Importantly, resurfacing of the War Memorial Oval including complete replacement of the drainage system to make the oval more usable in the wetter months, and replacement of the existing pavilion, which is one of the first buildings to have been constructed on the Sandy Bay site in the late 1940s.

It is pleasing that in only three and a half years since the Master Plan was adopted, we have already implemented a substantial part of it, but we have a lot more on the agenda.

I want to also refer to the exhumation works that have been undertaken as part of the N J Edwards Hub building works. The School's records had led us to believe that the area of the soccer pitch had been exhumed in the 1960s at the same time as the area which now forms part of Churchill Avenue, and the area of the main Senior School buildings. In addition, we undertook geotechnical surveys on site to determine the classification of the soil in the soccer pitch involved an extensive grid of deep bore holes, none of which gave any indication of there being remains. However, as it transpired, our belief was misplaced.



The exhumation plan, which was approved by the Regulator of the Burial and Cremation Act, has been expertly implemented by Brad Williams and his team of 17 archaeologists and assistants. They have carefully and respectfully removed 1,981 remains which have been stored, catalogued and recorded in detail, and which will shortly be interred at Cornelian Bay, where the School will also place a significant memorial.

The work done by the archaeology team has produced a very important research resource for archaeologists, students and social historians for decades to come, and I thank them for their diligence in undertaking that work. At a recent function, Royce Fairbrother mentioned that in his 60 years in the building industry he had not seen such a professional and capable response to such an unexpected delay.

I thank the members of the School Board Michael Cooper, Vicki Wilkins, Tim Jackson, Anne Watchorn, Rev John McQuillan, Brenda Cooke, Tim Johnstone and David Clerk for their tireless contributions in Board and committee work as volunteers.

I want to thank the School's thoroughly reliable Executive team led by Dr Rob McEwan. They are very good at what they do, which makes the Board's job just that little bit less stressful. ### FROM THE Principal

Every year at Hutchins brings opportunities, challenges, growth, and sparks of inspiration. 2024 has certainly been no exception. The achievements of our students and staff have continually inspired us.

From state titles in the senior division of the Tasmanian Maths Relay, athletics, tennis, badminton, chess, sailing, hockey, the statewide high school football competition, Hawks Cup, cross country, and in rowing our First Eight won the state championships in the U19, U21 and U23 levels before going onto with the Head of the River for the 5th (14th time in the past 16 events) consecutive time. Our U16 Eight also went through their season undefeated. Our musicians won major choral awards at the Hobart Eisteddfod and on stage our dancers, musicians and drama students dazzled those in attendance with their highly polished performances throughout the year. Academically, our Year 12 cohort saw nine students place in the top 101 students in Tasmania, five students achieved an ATAR above 99 and the median ATAR of 88.05 meant 50% of our Year 12 cohort placed in the top 11.9% of all students in Tasmania. While these results are outstanding, it is important not to lose sight of the journey that led students to achieve success at the highest level. These achievements are the outcome of sustained effort and attention to detail over long periods of time.

Internationally, Hutchins students travelled to Munich, Germany, to participate in a Round Square Conference on Democracy where they learnt about deep fakes and fake news and its impact on democracy. The students also heard from a 100-yearold survivor of the infamous Dachau concentration camp who spoke about his life and his determination to survive the hardships he endured.

In July, nine students travelled to Hong Kong to participate in a Model United Nations Conference where they took on roles such as diplomats, ambassadors, journalists, and government ministers. Two of our Year 12 students, Archie Yarrow and Charlie Hugo, received the Most Outstanding Delegate and Best Speaker awards, respectively for the European Union which was a remarkable achievement amongst highly accomplished delegates from around the world.

In December, a group of Hutchins students travelled to India to participate in the International Student Science Conference where they worked on scientific and social challenges requiring innovative approaches. One of the Hutchins student projects used machine learning to train and create a system to recognise skin cancers, which caught the attention of other delegates, and the students were invited to present their work at a conference in 2025.

Nationally, 16 students were awarded High Distinction and 29 students achieved Distinction results in the Australian Maths Trust Competition, while our sailors represented Australia in the Interdominion Team Racing Sailing Championship in New Zealand where they finished as the top-ranked Australian team. Our First Eight rowers won the gold medal in the U19 Men's Eight at the National Championships.



This year's success at the national rowing championships coincided with the 60th anniversary of Hutchins inaugural national Gold Medal when in 1964 the Hutchins First Eight travelled to Canberra and won the national Schoolboy Eights. A wonderful connection exists between these crews as Andrew Edwards ('64), a member of the 1964 crew, is now one of the coaches guiding our Open rowers.

As a school deeply rooted in its history, it is poignant to reflect on the Hutchins crew that secured the School's first-ever Head of the River victory 101 years ago. That year, the race was contested in Fours, and of the five rowers in this inaugural winning crew, three later served in the Australian Defence Force during World War II. They were among the 1,152 Hutchins Old Boys who enlisted to defend the freedoms we cherish today, fighting on distant battlefields.

Each of the names inscribed on the honour boards in the chapel were once young students who walked through the halls and sat in the classrooms of The Hutchins School. Many of those who served were no older than today's Year 11 and 12 students.

It was deeply moving to see every student from Pre-Kindergarten to Year 12, alongside staff and visitors, gather on the War Memorial Oval to honour and remember the service and sacrifices of generations of Australian servicemen and women. Equally touching was the sight of our students creating and naming individual paper poppies in memory of Old Boys who served. Each poppy became a symbol of remembrance, connecting the School community to the courage, resilience, and dedication of those whose names adorn the chapel's honour boards.



Our students are fortunate to live in a time when the qualities we associate with the ANZAC spirit—loyalty, courage, and service – can be demonstrated through daily acts of kindness and compassion, rather than on a battlefield. It is through these small but meaningful actions that they embody the enduring virtues of integrity, respect and courage. The cultivation of character—grounded in these timeless virtues—remains at the heart of a Hutchins education.

Our school's vision is to provide an inspirational education where each student strives to achieve their personal best and is willing to serve their community as an informed and active citizen.

This year, students have shown exceptional dedication to community service. In the Middle School, students have prepared food for Loaves and Fishes to provide free emergency food relief to Tasmanians needing help, Year 6 students raised money for Anglicare and supported boys in Kindergarten and Pre-Kindergarten in a buddy program. Year 8 students visited Queenborough Rise regularly during the year to spend time with the residents and the Middle School Student Council raised money for the Leukemia Foundation and sponsored a student in Uganda who has been orphaned. Middle School students have also donated food to the Anglicare Christmas hampers and worked with the Salvation Army's Hope program.

In the Senior School, students raised \$41,787 was raised with donations supporting Make-a-Wish Foundation, the S.H.E. Foundation and SPEAK UP! Stay ChatTY. Students served food at the Salvation Army, Loui's Van, and ran a Winter Clothes Appeal for the St Vincent de Paul Society.

From fundraising for local charities to volunteering at school and community events, our students are embodying the values of service and compassion by making a positive impact on the lives of others.

This year has seen the state government commission an independent review of education following public outcry over Tasmanian educational outcomes languishing at the bottom of national results across all year levels in most, if not all, domains. For example, the number of Tasmanian students completing the Tasmanian Certificate of Education (TCE) sits at an alarmingly low rate of 53% compared to the national average of 76%. At The Hutchins School, the percentage of Year 12 students attaining a TCE in 2023 was 96%.



While our students' learning outcomes sit well above state averages, our teachers' commitment to school improvement is relentless and ongoing. This year's efforts to strengthen literacy practices for all students have included the introduction of DIBELS testing for every student in the Junior School, three times a year, enabling precise monitoring of student progress and tailored instruction based on each student's needs. We engaged Jocelyn Seamer, a structured literacy consultant, to guide staff in professional development throughout the year that included modelling Structured Literacy lessons and targeted coaching for Junior School year-level teams. We have also seen a marked change in the reading culture amongst students through the wider reading programs, author visits and book chat programs introduced in the Stephens Library.

In addition to weekly team meetings, a peer observation process was introduced this year to facilitate collaborative and reflective teaching practices using evidence-based instructional routines.

As we look ahead to 2025, we have introduced a new role, a staff literacy instructional coach, who will work with all teachers in the Junior School to refine and further develop staff skills in explicit direct instruction based on research evidence shown to enhance outcomes for a wide variety of students.

In addition to highly dedicated staff and a culture of continual improvement, our students benefit from strong supportive and highly engaged family partnerships that reinforce the importance of a holistic education.



Parents and carers who actively participate in their children's education, such as helping with homework, attending Kindergarten and Junior School assemblies, student-led conferences, Grandparents' Days, asking their children about their experience at school each day, as well as attending music, dance and sporting activities, reinforces the importance of school in your children's lives. It signals to them that their education is a priority.

I extend my gratitude to our parents and carers for their continued support and encouragement of our students and the School. Together, we are creating an environment where every student can thrive and grow into the best version of themselves.

The breadth and depth of opportunity available at Hutchins is made possible by our outstanding staff. I extend my deepest gratitude to every one of our staff for their commitment, tireless efforts, and care of our students and each other. Their dedication and inspiration shape the lives of students in ways that extend well beyond the classroom and remain with many for the rest of their lives. I thank the Parents' Association, under the leadership of Mrs Shirl Badenach, whose support and generous funding of \$150,000 towards the bush play area in the Junior School has created a much-needed play space. The Parents' Association also supported student and staff led initiatives to the value of \$42,000, as well as volunteering at School Open Days and Grandparents' Days during the year and hosting the Winter Wonderland, a parent and carer cocktail evening that saw over 100 parents and carers come together socially.

I extend my congratulations to Lachlan Brown, School Captain; Archie Yarrow, Vice-Captain; James Moy, School Whip; as well as the Prefects, House Captains, and all our Year 12 students. Through their exemplary leadership, they have set a new standard for our school's culture and made a remarkable contribution to our community.

I also express my gratitude to the Hutchins Board, led by Andrew Walker ('82), for their unwavering support, dedication, and expertise, all generously offered as volunteers. Their vision, leadership, and sound governance have been instrumental in enabling the School to develop cutting-edge facilities that greatly benefit our students. This year alone, we have seen the construction of a large, tiered seating area in the Early Learning Centre, the complete refurbishment of classrooms on the top floor of the Junior School, and the much-anticipated start of construction on the N J Edwards Hub. Despite a well-documented six-month delay due to the site's history, it is exciting to witness the extraordinary N J Edwards Hub rise from the ground. It is expected to be completed by Term 1, 2026.

I am deeply grateful for the Board's strategic leadership and wise stewardship, which continue to shape the future of our school.

Finally, I thank all students, staff, and families for their wonderful contributions over the past year.

### Igniting the spark of learning

2024 saw us continue to strengthen our literacy program, firmly grounded in the science of reading, this approach ensures every child develops strong foundational skills. Through explicit instruction, we teach phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. This structured approach helps all students to ignite the spark, thus becoming confident and proficient readers and writers. As teachers we continue to further our own learning and 'spark' off each other. Our classrooms have become places of 'research' and 'observation' as we learn from our colleagues, in a relentless effort to improve our practice.

#### We aim to cultivate student

engagement as we believe that engaged students are successful students. Our teachers use a variety of strategies to keep students actively involved in their learning. Teaching has traditionally been an isolated event with a 'closed door' approach. In doing our observational rounds we all strive to make learning more inclusive, engaging and relevant. Inquiry-based learning is at the heart of much of our curriculum as we encourage our students to ask guestions, conduct research, and explore topics in depth. This approach not only builds critical thinking skills but also sparks and nurtures a sense of wonder and discovery. In our Junior School collaborative planning teams, we work as teacher teams to foster that same sense of curiosity and exploration. Through our language programs we build understanding and cultural awareness; in music we work to cultivate creativity, teamwork and a love of music. Our health and physical education program develops fitness, team work and a healthy lifestyle. A constant focus on our school values remains central to our religion and values teaching and while creativity and self-expression should always be central, our art classes further nurture that through various mediums and techniques. Our wonderful nature-based learning space allows students to connect with nature and learn through play. By exploring the natural environment, students develop physical skills, creativity, and a deep appreciation for the world around them.

These views reflect Hutchins commitment to preparing our learners for a more connected and interdependent world. We do this by teaching the three areas of the Australian curriculum: learning areas, general capabilities, and cross-curriculum priorities. These areas outline the key skills students need to make a difference in their world, both now and in the future.

Our teachers build students' ability to think critically and creatively, act ethically, and understand and different cultures and perspectives:

# Dux of the School

I believe people aren't born evil and while undeniably malicious people certainly exist (think historical dictators, genocide leaders, and tyrannical rulers), it's unfair to label these people as evil from the moment they were born. People: their values, actions, and opinions are undeniably shaped by their surroundings, so why should we not consider these personality defining events in assessing someone?

The trigger word I've begun to use to summarise this mentality is 'perspective' to remind myself to approach a problem from a different perspective. Crucially, I try and do this casting aside my personal opinions. Instead of immediately judging someone, I found myself exploring the question: what drove them to think like that? Answering this question might involve looking at the traditional opinions of a generation, class, gender, race, religion, past experiences, or other factors that create personality.

Through this lens I thought about many of the tumultuous circumstances plaguing our world in 2024 and found that at its core, so many of these conflicts are driven by a fundamental lack of empathy and consideration of other's perspectives and situations. Think of the recent explosion of the ongoing Israel/Palestine conflict into the news cycle. I won't divulge my opinion here but instead create an exercise to for you to form a deeper understanding and opinion for yourself. Think about what circumstances led to the current geopolitical scenario and the end of World War II. Think about why Palestinian and Israeli people may have decided that attacks were required, no matter the inexcusability of them and suddenly you may find that it's not quite as cut and dry as you thought before. This realisation may feel unsatisfying, but welcome to today's world - where everything is either grey, grey or grey.

Consideration of perspectives is not also meaningful at understanding global-scale conflict, I've also found it effective at overcoming conflict within a household. One of these common conflicts I've seen spoken at length about online is ideological conflict between grandparents and grandchildren as typical generational values collide. I find these conflicts largely arise as some young people are unable to accept that the validity of older people's opinions. Naturally, people feel attacked when their opinions are invalidated, so it stands to reason that conflict arises where each person invalidates the other's opinions.

The way to manage this, I found, is to use a similar strategy as I stepped you through before, instead of trying to change someone's perspective completely, guide them through consideration of other perspectives. It then becomes far harder to actively invalidate opinions once someone knows the reasoning leading to them, and you may reach a middle ground where you both understand and respect the other's opinions.

I remember first developing this understanding in a particularly memorable Modern History class where we were ranking tyrannical dictators and leaders from bad to outright evil, leading to a heated class-wide discussion about whether Pol Pot was 'worse' than Stalin. This then led me to write the main essay of WWII Japan from the Japanese perspective, which while wasn't the task, developed my understanding of dealing with conflicting perspectives.



It really is the wonderful support from teachers, though Miss Gemma Leonard in History especially that allowed me to explore perspectives as I am now.

So, using the framework of CGP Grey's podcast: Cortex, instead of making a new year's resolution, I recommend that you make 2025 the Year of Perspective and consider other's perspective at every possible opportunity, you may find your worldview irreversibly altered.

In 2024 we have funded a number of projects throughout the School. We received parent/carer feedback during Term 2 about the need for more indoor activities for the students in the Junior and Middle School. We obtained proposals/ideas from staff suggesting suitable indoor activities. As a result, we approved the funding of a permanent 'buddy bench' in each sub-school area at up to \$300 each. We also approved funding for the following Stephens library resources: Lego x1000 pieces at \$175 (x2), storage trolley at \$475, and a deep storage cart (for soft blocks) at \$784.

Last September, we contributed \$25,000 towards a 2m x 2m climbing cube for the Middle School playground. ### Library

#### **Nettlefold Library**

The Nettlefold Library continues to be a popular space in the Senior School, with a growing number of study groups choosing to meet regularly in private study lines and at break times to work together. On the relaxation side of things, the cards and other games see daily use, and the wooden jigsaw puzzles are enormously popular. #### **Stephens Library**

The Book Chat program for students in Years 3–5 has gone from strength to strength with many students discovering new authors, series and genres to read. The 2024 Year 5 students are the first cohort to have participated in Book Chat for three consecutive years, which has been evident in the depth and quality of their book discussions.

In March, we celebrated the second Tasmanian Reads Week, celebrating reading and the joy of storytelling. The week was celebrated with many events such as:

- pop-up storytellers appearing in classrooms;
- oral storytelling with Tamas from Roaming Trees;
- a Hutchins/Fahan Kinder Storytime with Year 5 students sharing stories with the younger learners;
- a visit for Prep and Year 2 to the new Story Walk, We Love Country, at Dru Point in Margate; and
- a visit to Hobart Bookshop for students in Years 2–5 to select new books for the library.

The annual Children's Book Council of Australia Book Week, with the theme, 'Reading is Magic' was a Term 3 highlight for the ELC and Junior School.

In 2024, a new initiative for Book Week, Book-in-a-Bag, replaced the traditional Book Week Dress Up Day. The intended purpose was to re-orient the Book Week focus on books and support our continuing efforts towards building a positive culture of reading across the School. Students were invited to celebrate a favourite book by decorating a paper bag and filling it with items that represent that story. During Book Week, students shared their Book-in-a-Bag with their classmates and buddies.



We have been inundated with positive feedback and in a recent survey, 58% of families said that they would like Book-ina-Bag or something similar to replace the Book Week Dress Up Day moving forwards and 24% saying they would like to alternate the Dress Up Day with a Book-in-a-Bag style experience.

Also in Term 3, we held a Great Book Swap to raise funds for the Indigenous Literacy Foundation. Students enjoyed donating books and then stocking their home libraries with \$1 bargain books. During this event, we raised over \$600 for the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

Throughout the year, we took advantage of Australian creators visiting Hobart. In Term 3, Year 4 and 5 students enjoyed an author talk and book launch with Kate Foster who is passionate about teaching a wider understanding of autism and mental illness via positive approach and representation. In Term 4, keen comic artists participated in a workshop with David Blumenstein from Melbourne's Squishface Comic Studio, where students also enjoyed getting their books signed.

Library staff are grateful for the dedication and commitment of the library monitors who are rostered on throughout the week to assist with tasks such as shelving books, creating displays and labelling new books for the library. We also express our gratitude for the support received, particularly through the generous donations to the Library Fund by members of the Hutchins community and the generous book donations received during the annual Grandparents' Day Book Fair.

### Information Technology

In 2024, the ICT Services Team focused on maintaining and optimising the robust infrastructure established in previous years. The ICT Services Team worked to ensure the continued reliability and efficiency of our network and server systems. This year has been one of steady progress, with a commitment to providing systems and services that support the Teaching, Learning and Business needs of the School.

In March Hutchins and Collegiate began a trial of sharing a Head of ICT. This collaboration has many potential opportunities. By working more closely together, both schools can find better solutions and implement best practices more effectively. The shared leadership helps address ICT challenges and projects in a unified way, improving the learning experience for students and staff at both schools. We are excited to see how this collaboration may continue in the future, it has the potential to drive further technological advancements and enhance educational outcomes through our shared efforts.

One project that has come from this collaboration already and to be launched in early 2025 is the ability for parents with students attending a co-operating school class the ability to access class information and academic results in each other schools Virtual Learning Environments (Rory and myCollegiate). This will be a seamless experience for parents/carers with a link embedded in Rory that will log them directly into myCollegiate.



This is a much-requested improvement that has taken a considerable amount of planning and implementation by both schools. We hope it proves a welcomed enhancement to parents/carers.

Throughout the year, the ICT Services Team actively engaged with Middle School students to foster a sense of responsibility and care for their devices. By organising competitions where classes that best maintained their devices were rewarded with Pizza Lunches and regular device inspections. we saw a steady improvement in how students handled their technology. The initiative culminated in an exciting end-of-year event, where the top class enjoyed a trip to Hyperdrive, and one lucky student won an Xbox. This initiative not only encouraged proper device care but also heightened students' awareness and accountability, leading to a noticeable enhancement in the overall condition of their devices.

As we look to 2025, we plan for continued improvement, building on the progress of previous years. By staying adaptable and proactive, we aim to enhance our systems and provide a secure, innovative learning environment for the entire Hutchins community.

In truth, I am a healer, a thinker, a guardian of nature's gifts, My magic in harmony with the winds and waters, The creatures of the earth, the spirits of the air. But men see only what they wish to see, And in their blindness, they seek to silence me, To strip me of my power, they care not, nor understand.

Men may seek to define us, to confine us, But they cannot extinguish the fire that burns within. I am Sycorax, unbroken, unyielding, A sorceress of the wild, a beacon of feminine strength. And though they may banish me to the ends of the earth, My spirit remains indomitable, my legacy eternal.

# Head of Junior School

### Building a strong community through engagement and personalised learning

As we reflect on the past year in Junior School, it's clear that our focus on community engagement and personalised learning has created a vibrant, supportive environment for our students to thrive. From exciting playground upgrades to innovative educational approaches, we've worked tirelessly to enhance the learning experience for every child.

### Enhancing our learning spaces

The year began with significant improvements to our school facilities. The complete refurbishment of the Year 5 classrooms created an inspiring space designed to foster creativity, collaboration, and curiosity. Our Early Years area received new outdoor seating, providing students with a versatile space for outdoor learning and socialising.

One of the most anticipated projects was the redevelopment of our bush play area. Thanks to the generous fundraising efforts of the Parents' Association and school community, this area now boasts improved access, a yarning circle for storytelling, a multilevel fort, and various play structures. This space not only encourages physical activity but also provides opportunities for imaginative play and connection with nature.

### Embracing personalised learning

A cornerstone of our educational approach this year has been our work with Dr Cam McDonald on personalised learning and the Learn360 program. In February, we hosted a parent/carer seminar where Dr McDonald shared valuable insights into the impact of epigenetics on child development and provided practical strategies for personalising experiences to meet each child's unique needs.

Building on this foundation, we're thrilled to have extended this learning opportunity to our school families through the Parenting360 course. This initiative, generously sponsored by the Parents' Association, allows each family to access self-paced learning resources and participate in a Personalised Learning research project in collaboration with Parents International, Southern Cross University, and Learn360.

### Fostering community connections

Throughout the year, we've hosted numerous events that brought our school community together. Our welcome BBQ in Term 1 provided an opportunity for parents, staff, and students to connect and share insights into ongoing learning journeys. The official opening of our bush area in March was a testament to the collaborative efforts of our entire school community.

We celebrated special days that honored important figures in our students' lives. Our Mother's Day and Father's Day Breakfast BBQs, and classroom activities this year allowed parents/carers to share in their children's school experiences. Similarly, our Grandparents' Day was a cherished event where grandparents and special friends were treated to performances, classroom visits, and shared activities with their grandchildren.



### Promoting literacy and love for reading

Literacy has been a key focus this year, with several initiatives designed to foster a love of reading. During Tasmania Reads Week, we hosted a variety of activities, including visits from storytellers and a book-buying excursion for students to select new titles for our library.

We also participated in national events such as National Simultaneous Storytime, where our Principal read Bowerbird Blues to students, connecting us with schools across Australia and New Zealand. ## Fostering wellbeing through student engagement in the Junior School

At our Junior School, we recognise that student engagement is essential for both student and staff wellbeing, but what does student engagement truly mean, and how can we cultivate it effectively?

According to the Australian Council for Educational Leadership (ACER), engagement transcends mere classroom behaviour or attendance. It encompasses three key domains: cognitive, emotional, and behavioural engagement. Our commitment to enhancing student wellbeing focuses on these domains, ensuring that our learners are not only academically successful but also emotionally and socially connected.

When we consult our key stakeholders our students—the common theme that emerges is the importance of combining challenge and fun in their learning experiences to ensure high levels of engagement. This insight resonates across all year levels and aligns with what our teaching staff observe as crucial indicators of engagement: curiosity and connection.

In response to our stakeholder viewpoints, we've designed a variety of opportunities this year that emphasise challenge, curiosity, connection, and fun. Our classrooms are structured to build knowledge through explicit, differentiated content tailored to students' needs and interests. We also guide students in understanding what engagement looks like for them personally, using frameworks such as Learn360 Personalised Learning principles and the Zones of Regulation framework. This approach not only fosters a stronger sense of self in our learners, but also lays the groundwork for developing empathy and understanding toward others.

When structuring learning in our Junior School, our team works collaboratively to ensure that learning opportunities are scaffolded effectively to meet each student at their current level of understanding. We strive to integrate learning across various subjects, with specialist teachers linking their lessons to classroom activities, such as the Year 5 Art-Science project on the Great Barrier Reef, this serves to further enhance connection: connection to learning, connection to others, connection to self.

To further support cognitive function and readiness for learning, we incorporate regular brain breaks into our classroom routines. These short, interactive activities help strengthen neural connections, enhance focus, and provide moments of connection and enjoyment. Additionally, mindfulness practices are integrated throughout the school day, encouraging students to reflect on their place within their surroundings.

The curated spaces across our Junior School have also been developed with wellbeing in mind. For moments when students need a calming space or additional support, we have established 'The Den' in our early learning space, as a dedicated area for emotional regulation.





In our Early Learning Centre, we've introduced a loose parts play space to encourage creativity and problem-solving. Following its extensive upgrade last year, our bush area has this year facilitated nature play, fostering resilience and a connection to the environment – National Schools Tree Day was a wonderful opportunity for learners from across our Junior School to contribute to further enhancing this much-loved space.

Outside the classroom, our co-curricular activities, play times, and special events—such as our Book Week 'Book in a Bag' activity—offer further avenues for engagement. We foster connections between different year levels through buddy classes and prefect interactions, which build relationships across the school community and model our core values: courage, kindness, humility, and respect.

Our teachers observe that engaged students are:

#### 'Active and keen learners...'

#### 'Curious, involved, attentive, successful, motivated, and valued...'

#### 'Connected to their learning, their learning community, and themselves as learners.'

By focusing on these aspects of engagement, we are not only enhancing academic outcomes but also fostering a sense of wellbeing that extends beyond the classroom. Our approach underscores that engaged students are happy students, and this engagement is pivotal in creating a positive, thriving school community.

### Curriculum

### <u>Music</u>

Why do we teach music? As a Senior School student said to me recently, "Mozart started somewhere." Mozart was six years old when he began composing, as do our students here at Hutchins. It would be wonderful for Hutchins to produce a modern-day Mozart, but it isn't why we do what we do.

Our focus in the classroom is on creativity, self-expression, and risktaking. Our students are challenged with creating music by manipulating the music elements into a cohesive work. They learn to take risks by performing in front of others either through singing or playing an instrument. They are encouraged to express themselves both musically and in response to works of art.

It is in playing an instrument that Hutchins thrives. All students have the opportunity to learn an instrument. Our Year 3 students learn to work as a team playing string instruments. From Year 4, students have access to concert band instruments. We have held open rehearsals for families to attend, played at end-of-year concerts, and performed for special events.



Our co-curricular groups have also been busy. Pride Choir performed at the Festival of Voices, the Hobart Eisteddfod and a Broadway Spectacular. Amati Strings and Paganini Strings were regular performers for families throughout the year. Our individual students also feature heavily at performances and eisteddfods, but it's not for success that we teach music. It's for our wellbeing, working as a team, taking risks, building courage and resilience, and being creative individuals.

## <u>Centre for</u> Excellence

The Centre for Excellence at The Hutchins School is built on a profound belief in the inherent value of every student and their potential to learn.

At Hutchins, we recognise that learning doesn't always follow a straight path. Students experience phases of challenge, growth, and mastery. By fostering a nurturing and positive environment, we aim to help every child reach their full potential.

As we continue to grow each year, our commitment to evidence-based teaching remains strong. We focus on building structured literacy and numeracy programs through clear, explicit instruction, guided by data. Key programs like MiniLit, MacqLit, and Bond Blocks are central to our approach, helping to ensure that all students receive the support they need to thrive.

For the first time, Years 1, 2 and 3 have participated in the Bond Blocks Intervention Program during Numeracy Support sessions this year. The program's use of engaging number strategies and games has made practicing foundational addition and subtraction skills both fun and effective. Many students have found success in developing a stronger grasp of number concepts and place value through the use of visual and tactile materials, which help to solidify their understanding. The structured yet flexible nature of the program has allowed students to progress at their own pace, building confidence and competence in their numeracy skills.

Always with a focus on critical and creative thinking, our Gifted and Talented groups are continuously exposed to reallife problem solving, they are encouraged to think broadly and deeply, and they are guided and encouraged to generate unique ideas, analyse information and reflect on their own thinking.

The focus of the different year groups is carefully laid out to ensure a systematic improvement from year to year. In Year 1 this year, we have learnt about thinking skills, and we have practised our fluency, flexibility, originality and elaboration of ideas. We have used our STEM skills to build and program LEGO creations.

In Years 2 and 3 we have designed individual projects based around Bloom's taxonomy, stretching our brains into the higher-order thinking skills of analysing, synthesising, evaluating and creating. We have explored the ever-changing world of Artificial Intelligence, and we have enjoyed, as Richard said, 'the challenges that make [us] think'.

Students in Years 4 and 5 participated in the International Ethics Olympiad in June, competing with teams from around the world while showcasing their understanding of ethical concepts. Liam enjoyed the preparation during gifted and talented lessons for the Olympiad and describes always being challenged and encouraged as highlights.

'I'm always expanding in knowledge, having to learn ethically and efficiently and still having to learn even more!' he said.

Over the year, we have focused on fostering connections and creating a sense of belonging in the new learning space and shared outdoor learning area, while building a strong community and spirit of collaboration.

Our youngest students have been nurtured in the purpose-built environment, learning to take risks on the climbing net, learning to work together indoors and out. Building relationships and developing a sense of belonging to the School community.

Connection to the wider community is developed through inquiries that encourage noticing and wondering about nearby county, beginning with the views from classrooms and play spaces, the redeveloped bank and broadening out to kunanyi, River Derwent, Lambert Park and local beaches.

Skilled teaching in the Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten has seen the further development of structured literacy through the science of learning as important parts of each day. Through carefully planned use of high impact teaching strategies, which also foster children's sense of agency, students begin to develop lifelong learning skills including being able to talk about what they know and how they know it.



A combination of student-led conferences and open classrooms further highlighted each young student's sense of agency and offered families deeper insight into what and how their children learn and express that learning.

As we think on the past year, we can reflect that Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students have flourished in their new learning environments, growing in confidence, community, and curiosity. The thoughtful design of our spaces, combined with skilled teaching, has not only supported the development of foundational learning skills but also nurtured a strong sense of belonging and agency in our youngest learners. As we look ahead, we are excited to continue building on these successes, ensuring that our children remain at the centre of a dynamic and supportive educational experience that encourages them to achieve their personal best.

### <u>Contributions</u> to self, school, and the community

# Head of Middle School

Connections to community are essential for fostering a sense of belonging, facilitating social interactions, promoting health and wellbeing and preserving culture. Middle School connections play an important part in developing character at a crucial stage of adolescence.

The heart of our Middle School's culture is shaped and defined by the people and their daily contributions. Our values of kindness, humility, courage, and respect are more than just words.

Kindness was in everyday interactions: a smile in the hallway, a shared laugh, helping someone when they needed it or just saying thank you.

Humility played a role in personal growth. There were times when students needed to ask for help or acknowledge they didn't know the answer, which isn't always easy. Recognising personal limits takes honesty and courage, and our staff encouraged students to see these moments as learning opportunities, not setbacks.

Courage varied from speaking up in class discussions to trying out for a team or surviving the adventurous challenges of camps. Students realised courage is being ready and willing to carry on despite fear or difficulty. It is about individuality, not conformity. Each act of bravery, no matter how small not only strengthened individual character, but also connections to school.

Staff and students worked together to promote respect. It meant listening and learning from each other, embracing differences, and recognising that every person brings something valuable to our school environment.

The introduction of the Year 6 Character Evening showcased work around our school values and individual character strengths, developing trust and effective communication between students and parents/carers. Our school values are key links to the development of character and Outdoor Education nurtures self-development. Year 7 Camps enabled students to participate in a variety of challenges, including bushwalking, kayaking, swimming/surfing, coasteering, and cooking for themselves to develop essential teamwork skills. Year 8 displayed growth in character and identified with the School values through mentor activities, speeches for Poetry and Prose and service learning.

Students explored aspects of their local communities with hands-on experiences developing a deeper understanding of social responsibility by supporting Speak Up! Stay ChatTY and participating in the Push Up Challenge. Through exploring communities, engaging with younger students, participating in local events, and volunteering with organisations, students gained essential life skills and developed a strong sense of community spirit.

We recognised Reconciliation Week with conversations about the need for change in our understanding of history, education, respect and racism in connection to Indigenous people. Students created a personalised hand to acknowledge the issues around the need for reconciliation which were placed symbolically into a formation of the Aboriginal flag.

On Anzac Day, we recognised the contribution of over 1000 Old Boys who served in war with their names being placed on handmade poppies.

During Harmony Week, Year 6 bonded with their Pre-Kindergarten/Kindergarten buddies through creative cultural activities, playing and reading, while Year 7/8 students enjoyed making dumplings in Chinese lessons.

House spirit was evident at various competitions with House Leaders guiding peers with war cries and rallying participants to step up with courage to try something new. Kindness and respect shown as each student crossed the finish line, left the field or completed a debate or performance was noticeable.



In Anniversary Week, Year 6 participated in a Hutchins Anniversary Kahoot gaining an insight into historical facts about our school. Year 7 visited Soldier's Memorial Avenue laying magenta posies to commemorate Hutchins Old Boys who died in service during World War One. Year 8 attended the Anniversary Service with Senior School, and a highlight of the day was undoubtedly the BBQ lunch and cake.

Grandparents' Day is always a wonderful opportunity for connections across generations as families tour the campus together. There was also an opportunity for grandparents to choose a book with their grandson to donate to the Stephens Library.

During Science Week, we participated in a Science Fair with Collegiate. It was wonderful to see our students engaging with science outside of the normal classroom and applying new and varied skills to situations.

Our students continually amaze me with their diverse talents. At both the Music Celebration Concert and the Dance Showcase, Middle School was well represented. The courage, humility, and grace students displayed on stage were truly commendable. I'm deeply grateful to the staff who make these wonderful opportunities possible.

2024 has not just been about academics it's been about learning what it means to be part of something bigger than oneself. Thank you to our students who make Middle School the amazing place it is to be in each day. No day is ever the same and together we continue to grow and learn together. My gratitude extends to the dedicated pastoral team for their passion, hard work and commitment to making every day meaningful for our students. #### The Push-up Challenge

The Push-up Challenge in Year 7 was better than ever this year. In total, Year 7 raised almost \$1,000 for mental health, smashing our goal of \$500. In total, as a group, we did just over 28,000 push-ups over four weeks in June. This year, the amount of pushups that you were aiming for was 3,249, representing the number of lives lost to suicide in Australia in 2022. The Push-up Challenge was a fun way to raise money by doing fitness and learning about facts of mental health in Australia while you do it. In the Senior School developing intellectual character is central to our philosophy as we strive to develop learner dispositions that promote our school values and enable students to express their intellect in a purposeful, ethical and responsible manner.

## Head of Senior School

### <u>The sparks</u> of 2024

In Senior School we started the 2024 year with purpose, taking our student leaders to Southport for our inaugural Prefects' Retreat. It quickly became evident that we had a very special group of student leaders. Their empathy, inclusiveness and support for the greater Hutchins vision and values meant we had a unique opportunity to work as one to make significant improvement in our school culture. The Prefects chose the Year 12 theme: Be the Spark.

Lachlan Brown (School Captain), Archie Yarrow (Vice-Captain) and James Moy (School Whip) were outstanding as the Prefect executive, and they had excellent support from the House Captains and Prefects. The committee chairs all set achievable goals for their student teams and together they provided student voice and action in our school.

Overwhelmingly, the Prefect group felt that supporting students' mental health and wellbeing was important, and they believed that through their actions they could promote being a positive influence for others. They felt that as leaders, they should provide inspiration, encouragement, support, and enthusiasm to help others be their best.

They backed up many powerful keynote speeches, with the introduction of the 'Spark Board' in each House, where students can nominate each other, or staff, for being 'the spark'. It has been amazing to see students recognising each other and showing gratitude for the positive differences we can make in each other's lives, sometimes in the smallest ways. Each week, new students are added to a growing list of superstars making a positive impact in our community. In a collective effort to support student wellbeing, our school participated in two impactful initiatives: Speak Up! Stay ChatTY Shorts Day and The Pushup Challenge. On the shortest day of the year, students swapped their uniform shorts for unique ones, raising awareness about the importance of braving tough conversations around boys' mental health. Following this, we joined forces with Collegiate and Fahan for The Push-up Challenge, completing 737,230 push-ups and raising \$19,506 for Lifeline Tasmania. These studentled efforts, spearheaded by our School Captain Lachlan Browne-who received national recognition-highlighted our commitment to mental health. Impressively, our community ranked 1st nationally for push-ups among schools and 3rd for fundraising. This year's senior students have provided 'the spark' for us at every opportunity, and they have left a legacy of compassion, commitment, and inspiration to make a positive difference.

2024 will also be remembered for the work achieved by our outstanding teaching staff. This year school priorities have been to embed a Hutchins specific positive behaviour support structure (PBS). The whole teaching team have supported this and helped develop our Hutchins definition:

"PBS is a tiered, explicit and evidence-based whole school framework. It develops our culture to support wellbeing, positive relationships, and academic success, while reflecting the school values. It is consistent, inclusive and evolving."

Following developing the shared definition, staff participated in a whole-school data collection, through instructional rounds. As a result, we have now developed several recommendations for implementation.



One of the first was a revamp of our behaviour support structures. We now have a cohesive and consistent pastoral care reporting and follow-up procedure embedded throughout Middle and Senior School. We have also developed for the whole school, a behaviour matrix which aligns our behaviour expectations with school values, provides examples and opportunities to explicitly teach expected behaviour.

Recently, we have also embarked on a professional learning journey with Positive Partnerships, learning about meeting the needs of students with autism. This will benefit all students, allowing for more inclusive practice and catering for a broad range of student needs inside and outside the classroom.

It has been a busy yet highly productive year. Our student community has benefited from a broad range of opportunities through our continually improving academic program as well as amazing opportunities through our exceptional sport, co-curricular and outdoor programs. A highlight has been the ongoing success of our Power of 9 program. This program consistently provides our Year 9 cohort with lifeimproving opportunities.

Thank you, to our dedicated staff for their energy, professionalism and care of our students and each other. As a school we are very fortunate to have such a kind and skilled team of dedicated teachers. I also acknowledge the support of families. It is only with strong connections and shared values that we can support young people achieving their personal best.

## English and Art

This year, we highlight writing from a new course, English Studio TASC3.

Extract from "Titanwalk", set in the 1920s, in the alternate-history Europe, is a dieselpunk, science-fiction short story by Charlie Hugo. It follows a peasant farmer defending his homeland and family farmstead from the titans of war that stalk the landscape.

She took a single step towards the cottage before a noise stopped her. Previously, the weak sputtering of the mechs had been the dominant cacophony, but now a new sound joined their industrial chorus; a higher pitched whirring, the individual sounds of pistons and motors blending into a continuous note, VIIIIIIRM-ing away like the advanced airships she saw once at the local fair. No sooner did she comprehend this than a terrific crash originated from the barn, the stout wooden wall where Aleksy's workshop sat exploding outwards in a shower of splinters, thatch and paint.

Instinctively, Basia threw her arms over her head, ducking down to avoid any possible debris. Even the most grizzled-looking veterans flinched, and the greener troops threw themselves to the ground.

Once the dust had settled, Basia gingerly lowered her arms, and there, amidst the dust clouds, sat a mech. A heavily modified Strażnik, to be specific; she recognised the squat, barrel-like body and the four crab-like legs from old newspaper clippings. The pair of twin machine guns on either side of the main hull were replaced with eclectic weapons; the left side was occupied by a flamethrower, the streaky red paint harkening back to its Rusviet construction. The Frankenstein creation was powered by something esoteric in nature, given credit by the rear Tesla towers occasionally sparking between the squat exhaust pipes. Whatever this contraption was, it was functional and ready.

At this point, the cello felt like an extension of my body.

As my cue approached, the nerves melted away and were replaced by a deep sense of purpose, which was to communicate something meaningful to the audience. I drew the bow across the strings and the first notes filled the air, each one representing a story.

### FROM THE Head of House – Thorold

The pastoral care of our students is paramount to their success here at Hutchins and the growth I see in our students every day is a huge part of why this position brings me so much joy. With the conclusion of my second year as the Thorold Head of House, I have been so privileged to see the continual development of our Thorold students.

There have been many highlights across the calendar of Inter-House events for Thorold including our outstanding participation in the Winter Sports Day and a really gutsy performance at House Music from a lot of musical newcomers to the stage. These acts of service far outweigh the funds we raised, as we gained awareness about Lifeline as an organisation and what they do for struggling and vulnerable members of Tasmania.



For the new year, my hope is that we continue to build on these opportunities and look for more that we can do within our community.

Through the leadership of our House Captain Jack Wilson, Vice-Captain Jude Butler and House prefects Charles Boman and Joseph Mione, we raised \$1,200 for Lifeline Tasmania through our annual walk 'Out of the Shadows', our House Night in Term 3, House BBQs and a Pop-Up Hot Drinks stall. These events allowed us to work together as a team with a common vision of making sure no one ever feels alone, in support of the vision of Lifeline. # MIDDLE & SENICR SCHOOL Curriculum

Hutchins delivers the Early Years Learning Framework in Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten, the Australian Curriculum in Prep to Year 10 and the TASC Curriculum in Years 11 and 12.

### <u>Career</u> <u>Education</u> <u>& Vocational</u> <u>Learning</u>

It was another busy year with a wide range of career development activities for students occurring throughout the year. The combined Careers Expo between Hutchins and Collegiate was again the main large interaction for students and families with pathway providers. Hosted this year by St Michael's Collegiate, the Careers Expo was a great success attended by exhibitors from a wide and varied number of pathway providers. The university sector was well represented with online information sessions provided by several interstate universities including ANU, UNSW and The University of Melbourne. The University of Tasmania had a substantial in-person presence, including representatives from many of their colleges, providing detailed course information to students and families.

Employers' representation included exhibitors from a wide range of sectors including, Tourism and Hospitality, Building and Construction - engineer, architectural and commercial construction, Professional Services - finance and legal. Medical based professionals - physiotherapy, radiology, speech pathology, and pharmacy were also on hand talking to students. Employer representative from early childhood education, the Australian Defence Force, Fruit Growers Tasmania, Tasmanian Police and Tasmania Fire Services were also available for students to gain valuable pathway insights from. The willingness for these individuals, business and associations to support our students, giving freely of their time and knowledge is always impressive and greatly appreciated.

A large Year 10 cohort resulted in a significant range of work placements being undertaken, again with amazing support from the local business community. Photos of students undertaking a wide and varied range of work placements can be viewed on the School Facebook page. Students undertook placements within fishery research, food production, engineering, building and construction, and medical services as just some examples of student placements. Feedback from employers and students has been overwhelmingly positive, with many examples of students effectively using the transferable skills of communication, teamwork, and problem solving in real world context.

A large portion of the Year 12 students on tertiary pathways applied successfully to the University of Tasmania through their School Recommendation Program (SRP) and obtain early offers. The UTAS early offer SRP process significantly reduces the heavily ATAR reliant entrance requirement of much of the university sector, with students reporting a sense of security and relief knowing they have a university option prior to their final year exams.

During 2024 students completed a wide range of Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses, with short course in Responsible Service of Alcohol, White Card, Espresso Basics and First Aid completed by 133. VET courses in Building and Construction, Information Technology, Drone Aviation, Fitness and Business were also undertaken by students as full academic year programs with outcomes aligning to future certificate or apprenticeship pathways. Vocational pathways continue to attract student interests with many expressing interests in School Based Apprenticeship opportunities which allow them to complete Years 11 and 12 with their cohort, whilst working towards apprenticeship outcomes. The flexibility of a work and school program that facilitates connection to the cocurricular activities with friends is something that an increasing portion of students wish to explore.

Wishing you all a safe and happy Christmas New Year period and I look forward to working with you in 2025 on activities and initiatives that support students towards meaningful pathway outcomes.

### <u>Centre for</u> Excellence

At the Centre for Excellence, our mission is to empower every student, preparing them not just for academic success, but for a lifetime of learning and personal growth.

Structured Literacy is a cornerstone of our Literacy Support lessons, providing a systematic and explicit framework for teaching reading and writing. This method ensures that all students receive clear and consistent instruction in foundational literacy skills, which is crucial for building strong reading and writing abilities.

Our Gifted and Talented program continues to stretch thinking through real like challenges. Blood Moon Industries Request for Tender, Registration number 35: what a tagline! Our Year 8 and 9 co-curricular Australian Space Design Competition students have worked collaboratively this year, responding to an engineering Request For Tender (RFT) to design a futuristic space settlement including planning structural engineering, operations and infrastructure, taking into consideration personnel factors, automation, and business development. During Term 1, Year 6 students practised solidly for the da Vinci Decathlon. The Decathlon, which was held in April, had them working in teams of eight across 10 disciplines to solve complex problems. They thoroughly enjoyed the challenge, digging deep for resilience when the problems were hard. Luca Mignanelli said of the lessons that they keep his brain intrigued and that they have a good atmosphere. He added that sometimes he experienced roadblocks but always found a way around. Gordon Situ agreed and spoke of improvising and getting creative to solve problems.

Engaging our Gifted and Talented students in subject areas, across subject areas and in creative and critical thinking activities brings challenges and joy. Wesley summed up the experience of the Gifted and Talented program, saying that activities such as the da Vinci Decathlon are challenging and are a lot of fun. 'Plus,' he said, 'you will find it very rewarding when you finish.' Caesar Gao in Year 6 commented that 'the teacher doesn't ask you a question to answer but tells you to make your own question to challenge yourself,' adding that the challenges he enjoys most are the nearimpossible ones.

### <u>Design,</u> <u>Production</u> <u>& Digital</u> <u>Technologies</u>

Throughout their time at Hutchins, students are exposed to a range of learning opportunities within the genre of Design, Production and Digital Technologies (DPDT). In Year 6, they first enter the realms of our DPDT building where more discrete learning in this area occurs.

Our Year 6 students this year have spent two periods a week for one term under the guidance of Mr Mike De Borde and Mr Patrick Twyford where they have been designing and making small device stands. These projects have provided our younger students an opportunity to develop a fundamental understanding of our Design Production Learning Model while at the same time, introducing them to design, drawing techniques and production processes with safety being a priority.





This journey has continued into Year 7, where our students have been very fortunate in working with a number of different materials, learning their working properties and utilising them in the production of leather wallets, stainless steel BBQ spatulas and wooden 'personal treasure' shadow boxes. All of these projects further develop their skill sets and the understanding and application of key production processes.

Year 8 sees the introduction of our elective system, allowing students to explore an amazing diversity of learning experiences in a range of genres. From refining their design and making skills in the woodwork and metalwork shops, using clean technologies in our designer maker lab, creating outstanding creative responses to design briefs in Computer Graphics and Design, and Housing and Design or honing their coding and computational thinking skills in Instructional Technology subjects such as Game Maker, Computer Science and Robotics. These opportunities continue right through until Year 11 and 12, where students can undertake higher learning in TASC 2 subjects such as Design Production, Agricultural Enterprise, Digital Technologies and TASC 3 subjects in Housing and Design, Computer Graphics and Design, and Data Science and Digital Solutions.

The creative solutions produced by our students this year continue to astound their teachers and peers alike. The world of technology and materials is dynamic in nature, ever evolving. Our staff continue to embrace new innovations and incorporate them into their teaching and learning, maximising our students' exposure to cutting edge technologies, and industrial design processes supporting our Faculty Mission in providing 21st Century learning skills. However, we also recognise the value of learning and promoting more traditional hand skills providing students vocational pathways, but perhaps more importantly, enabling a cathartic experience in the joys of working materials by hand, learning their properties, and adopting a sustainable approach in the use of resources.

Several of our senior students achieved outstanding outcomes in their designed responses to the UTAS Object Design course they enrolled in this year. Two of the most notable performances were: Rafferty Ball's (Year 12) 'Reaction tables', representing changes in the Tasmanian landscape; and Max Gender's (Year 12) object representing the challenges of Tasmanian endangered endemic species; Estella Fitzallen (Year 12), our wonderful Fahan School student designed and created a beautiful rotating and light changing lamp emphasising the plight of the Great Hammerhead Shark. Apart from the high level of craftmanship demonstrated, their design folios were outstanding, resulting in High Distinctions being attained.

This year, we welcomed Alexander McLean onto our team as our faculty technical aid. He has made a huge impact, bringing energy and a new perspective on our facility operations. He has been invaluable in commissioning our new CNC machine and providing training to our staff. Finally, a big thank you to the amazing work and educational experiences that my colleagues, Mr Pat Twyford, Mr Martin Chambers, Mr Beau Leonard, Mr Mike De Borde and Dr Adam James continue to provide for our students. I and our students are extremely fortunate to have these gifted educators amongst our midst.

# <u>Humanities</u> <u>& Social</u> <u>Sciences</u>

The study of Humanities and Social Sciences at Hutchins provides rich and varied opportunities for the study of human behaviour in historical, environmental, economic, social and political contexts. Our teaching and learning practices have both a historical and contemporary focus as students move from their own lived experience to global contexts and consider the opportunities and challenges of the future.

While having a clear basis in historical analysis and critical reflection, studies in the Humanities and Social Sciences additionally have a very real and immediate contemporary focus in a consideration of the big picture challenges of the future, ranging from climate change to reforms to Australia's political and legal system as well as Australia's evolving place in the global economy.

Highlights from work across the faculty in 2024 include.

Deep time: Year 7 students embarked on an ambitious inquiry project this year, whereby they undertook their own investigations into the deep time history of Australia. This allowed students to delve back 65,000 years in time to study early First Nations Peoples of Australia. Students first learnt about early migration routes to Australia, as well as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, technology, farming and land management practices. They were then given the freedom to develop their own question about this period in history. This style of inquiry-based learning was a first for many students, but the cohort had ample curiosity for the job. Inquiry questions included: "What did First Nations Peoples use as toys?", "Where were their trade routes?" and "How did they send messages to other language groups?"

Many questions could not be answered with a simple search through Google; rather, they required tenacity and investigative skill. While this made the job more difficult, it also resulted in more satisfying results.

**\$20 Boss**: The Year 10 Business students engaged in the \$20 Boss program in Term 3 which required them to form groups to put their entrepreneurial capabilities to the test, each contributing \$20 in capital. Roles were assigned within the groups: CEO, Operations Manager, Marketing Manager, Human Resources Manager and Finance Manager so that each individual had their own responsibilities. Teamwork techniques and conflict resolution was the initial focus, before the students had to draw on their creativity to come up with ideas for a product or service to be delivered at Market Day in September.

The students displayed an array of skills in completing this extensive task across the term. Initiative, determination, creativity, critical thinking and self-organisation to name a few. Every group displayed excellent teamwork in running their stalls on Market Day amid the frenzy of multiple customers, orders and requests. The bar has been set and the challenge is now on to see if the 2025 students will be able to surpass the profits and charity contributions of the 2024 cohort.

There were many elements of the task that required complex thinking and calculations to achieve a better result at the end of the task." - Thomas Nation (Year 10) Philosophy: An area of strength in the Humanities and Social Sciences at Hutchins is the study of Philosophy. A foundational skill for teaching philosophy at any level is the development of "philosophical sensitivity" which is defined as the capacity to engage in identification of and reflection about the larger questions that underlie most of what we think we understand about the world. Philosophical sensitivity involves the development of our ability to identify and analyse fundamental questions about the human condition.

Topics such as Feminism, Cartesian Dualism, arguments for the existence of God, Stoicism, and What Makes a Good Life have all been studied this year. Students examined whether we are free or not and investigated the legal system in this context. We were left to wonder whether libertarian free will can exist.

Students have read individual philosophers such as Nietzsche, Descartes, Marcus Aurelius, Seneca, Aquinas, Hume, Simone de Beauvoir, Camus, and Sartre. We explored the value of struggling, as Nietzsche held, and the existentialist position held by Sartre that, 'we are so free that it terrifies us.' In Thoreau we examined the value of a simple life and that God can be found all around us, as nature, and not emblematic of nature; a sentiment first put forward by Spinoza hundreds of years earlier.

In closing, I want to express my heat felt thanks to the outstanding contributions made by staff within the faculty in 2024; Mrs Ronelle Shurville, Mr Adam Palfreyman, Mr Damien Marwood, Mrs Giovanna Padas, Mr Matthew Sayers, Mr Mike Webster, Miss Hailey Grayson, Dr Nick Eaves, Ms Lauren Carr, Mr Greg Rowlings, Mrs Ganga Fraser, Miss Gemma Leonard, Rev Lee Weissel, Rev Mark Holland, Mr Ivor Leonard and Mrs Anne Mather. # **Mathematics**

In a year that has seen so many successes in mathematics across the board, it is very hard to highlight just a few in the space that this report provides.

Over the last few years, we have seen a resurgence in high quality deep learning in mathematics. The Enrichment program has expanded to over 65 students from Year 3 through to Year 11. Teachers have been identifying and encouraging students who show mathematical aptitude to dive deeper than the utilitarian Australian Curriculum allows and instead immerse themselves in the rich world of mathematics.

Thus, we have had a record number of students achieve excellence in a number of competitions and programs, mostly via the Australian Mathematics Trust. Our Enrichment program extends from the Challenge (4 weeks) through to one-off competitions such as the Computational Algorithmic Thinking Competition. We also had some phenomenal success in the Australian Mathematics Competition with 44 students achieving a Distinction or High Distinction in this prestigious competition. Yuning (Kevin) Shen (Year 11) achieved Best in School and Kevin has also subsequently been accepted for the National Mathematics Summer School in January of 2025. Congratulations to him and we wish him all the best for this amazing opportunity.

We sent teams of students to the Mathematical Association of Tasmania's Mathematics Relay Competition and came first in the state at the senior level. Congratulations to Archie Yarrow, William Rumley, James Baird and Oliver Fowler (all Year 12) on their stellar performance. # <u>Outdoor</u> Education

The Hutchins School Outdoor Education Program recognises the pivotal transition into adolescence and beyond. It is a journey where students are challenged through adventurous experiences that foster character development, resilience, teamwork, and a deep curiosity for the natural world.

## Year 7 Outdoor Education

This year, Year 7 students participated in a four-day, three-night camp at our Southport campus. The camp aimed to build teamwork, strengthen friendships, and develop skills through a variety of outdoor activities. Students engaged in coasteering, sea kayaking, tarp construction and cooking, all designed to ignite an adventurous spirit. The program challenged students to face new experiences and prepare for future challenges.

#### Year 8 Outdoor Education

The Year 8 camp focused on a week-long bushwalking and climbing journey at Freycinet National Park. Students were divided into smaller mentor groups of 10– 12, with two leaders guiding them through four campsites and a series of activities around the Freycinet Peninsula. These activities included abseiling, climbing, cooking, navigation, and problem-solving challenges. The Year 8 camp serves to prepare students for the more complex adventures in our Power of 9 Program.

## Year 10 Outdoor Education

The Year 10 program builds on developing independent, resilient, and skilled individuals who are capable of safely pursuing their own outdoor adventures. This year, students participated in several overnight trips, including coasteering and navigation on Bruny Island, rock climbing and abseiling at Sand River Recreational Reserve, alpine snow walking and camping at the Walls of Jerusalem, packrafting on the Mersey River, and canyoning. The program culminated in a successful six-day journey along the Overland Track in September.

# Year 11/12 Outdoor Leadership

Students in the Year 11/12 Outdoor Leadership course participated in a diverse range of activities alongside a thorough study of leadership theories. They took part in a sea kayaking camp at Lake Pedder, a bushwalking camp at Cradle Mountain, and led individual leadership projects with Year 5 students. These students also engaged in various sessional activities in the greater Hobart area.

# <u>Science</u>

One of the most exciting aspects of being a Science teacher is the ability to teach in a practical way, allowing students to learn through hands-on experiences. This year, we have provided our students with new and recurring opportunities that have enabled them to view the world from a different perspective.

Science Week, as usual, was highlighted by our Middle School Science Fair. This year, in addition to our range of challenges with Year 7 students at Collegiate and Year 8 students at Hutchins, we included our Year 6 students, who utilised their science skills to complete a science-themed escape room. In addition, Middle School students were treated to a CSI investigation week where they used various techniques to identify a murderer!

Our enrolment in Science electives has been strong, with several classes at full capacity. Year 8 Science Extended and Marine Studies were particularly popular, and we were excited to have a STEM 10 class again for 2024.

The International Schools Science Conference will be held at The Doon School in India this December. Three Year 10 students will attend to present their research. Lachlan Crane will present his study titled "Exploring the Nutritional and Medicinal Potential of Tasmanian Seaweeds." For his efforts and involvement in Science this year, he has been awarded the Marinova Prize. Ansh Garg and Felix Yang will present their research titled "On Machine Learning and Applications in Medical Research," where they explored the use of machine learning in medical imaging and diagnosis.

Year 11 and 12 Physical Science and Chemistry students competed in the annual RACI Titration Competition at the end of Week 10 of Term 2, focusing on precision and accuracy in completing a chemical analysis to determine the mass of a provided sample without weighing it. Despite some impressive individual efforts, we did not qualify for further competition this year. The Royal Australian Chemical Institute, sponsored by the University of New South Wales (Sydney) School of Chemistry, offers a dynamic exploration of chemistry for school students in Years 7–12 through the International Chemistry Quiz. This international competition poses questions that encourage students to apply their knowledge to real-world scenarios and attracts participants from Australia and around the globe.

Alexander Healy (Year 8) received a Distinction award, and Henry Smith (Year 8) received a High Distinction, ranking as the highest scoring student in Tasmania, placing in the 92nd percentile of scores in Australia. Archie Yarrow (Year 12) also received a High Distinction, ranking in the 95th percentile of scores in Australia.

We provided several other opportunities for our students through various excursions and tours. Highlights this year included the Environmental Science class' excursion to Huon Aquaculture and the annual Senior Physics Tour, which explored power generation in Tasmania.

I want to extend my gratitude to all the Science staff for the incredible opportunities you offer to the students at Hutchins.

In an exciting game, Captain Oscar Sproule (Year 12) kicked into gear with a wonderful hat trick, propelling the team to win the title. The team then qualified for the State SATIS final against Marist Regional College. With Oscar injured in the lead up to the match, it was young gun Patrick Donegan (Year 10) who stepped up when it mattered to score his own hat trick and bring the SATIS shield back to the School.

# Hawks Cup victory

Highlighting a very bright future for the School's Australian Rules Football program, the Year 9/10 team were SSATIS Premiers, won the Gadomski Cup and qualified for the Hawks Cup by beating Clarence High School in an epic Southern final. The talented and committed team then travelled to UTAS Stadium to play against the highest qualified teams from the North and North-West of the State. For the first time in the competition's history, Hutchins were victorious maintaining their unbeaten run in 2024.

Over the years, the Hutchins rowing program has been recognised as one of Tasmania's best, in terms of achievement, participation levels and school community support, with the foundation for this being built by previous Old Boys, coaches and parents/carers. The 2023/24 rowing season saw Hutchins excel in all aspects and age groups, with record breaking participation levels and outstanding achievements. The Marieville Esplanade sheds were booming with magenta and black zooties every morning along with the many coaches, volunteers and parents/ carers. This year's rowing program saw the introduction of the new Director of Rowing, Mr Paul Westbury and under his leadership and delegation, we continued our strong presence at the Lake Barrington regattas across all junior and senior age groups.

Some of the many highlights that were enjoyed throughout the course of the 2023/24 season included the induction of the Year 6s to the rowing program, with Learn to Row and Rowing Camps at Franklin. The strong and continuous development of the U14 cohort, led by Paul Healy, the U15 cohort, led by James McIntosh ('90). The multitude of parent/ carer volunteers reached great lengths with one of the largest U15 age groups in recent times, winning events such as the Hobart Regatta Eights/Octo race. The U16s coached by Justin West ('92) portrayed their skill, fitness and talent throughout the season, taking out the Year 10 Eight's race at Head of the River and showed their talent on the national stage at the Australian National Rowing Championships.

The Hutchins Opens squad coached by Mark Stott, Andrew Edwards, Mr Shaun Killian, Nadia Westbury and Gerald Thurnwald, were motivated and hardworking throughout the season. The quality and talent of the Opens squad made it tough for seat selection and students worked extremely hard to earn a spot in the First and Second Eight. The hard work and commitment to every session on and off water ultimately led to the success at regattas, with the First Eight taking out the U19, U21 and U23 Eight events at the Tasmanian State Club Championships, the Tasmanian All Schools Championships and Head of the River.



The First Eight continued their success at the Australian National Rowing Championships, taking out the U19 men's 8+ event, which Hutchins previously claimed in 2011. Opens rowers Angus Whatling (Year 12), Sam Meikle (Year 12), Henry Pitt (Year 12), James Moy (Year 12), Brodie Wills (Year 11) and Joshua Fielding (Year 11) were all also selected to represent Tasmania in the Australian Pathway 8's. These stellar results earned us a well-deserved qualification for the National Championships in Goolwa, South Australia. The Hutchins/ Collegiate combined team placed a commendable 4th and the next Hutchins team was 6th.

Three months later, after many training sessions at the RYCT with our dedicated coaches Chris Jones ('10) and Hugo Allison ('23), the Hutchins Black and Hutchins Magenta teams flew to South Australia, eager to put their hard work to the test.

The Nationals proved to be a true test of skill and perseverance. Over the course of four days, both teams experienced a rollercoaster of highs and lows. Goolwa threw all it could at the competitors during the regatta, with a vast range of weather conditions put on display to test the 24 teams. By the final day, both teams were riding high, with Hutchins Black entering the finals series in 4th place and Hutchins Magenta securing the last finals spot in 8th place. This was already a significant achievement, as Hutchins was the only school to have two teams in the final series.

Hutchins Black faced a critical race against Scots College, the defending national champions, to determine which team would advance to the Grand Final. Although it was a close race, Hutchins Black narrowly missed out on the win. However, they secured a spot in the petite final against Iona, where they competed for 3rd place.

In the final set of races, our boys dominated, securing 3rd place overall and earning their spot in the Interdominion Championships in New Zealand later this year. 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# Celebrating our 2024 leavers

I am delighted to share with you just a very small sample of the outstanding academic achievements of our Year 12 students in 2024. These exceptional results are testament to the students' efforts and discipline to their academic studies throughout the year, together with dedication of our highly skilled staff who encouraged, challenged, and supported each student to achieve their personal best.

The following seven students achieved an ATAR above 99, placing them in the top 1% of students in the state. Congratulations go to Archie Yarrow 99.85, James Baird 99.7, William Rumley 99.65, Cliff Giddings 99.4, Hamish Cheeseman 99.35, Oliver Fowler 99.35 and Lachlan Browne 99.15.

#### Key achievements include:

- Median ATAR of 89.63, the second highest achieved at Hutchins since the introduction of ATARs in 2006.
- 14% of Year 12 ATAR eligible students achieved an ATAR above 98.
- 48% of Year 12 ATAR eligible students achieved an ATAR above 90.
- 28 students achieved an ATAR above 95.
- 11 students placed in the top 99 students in Tasmania.
- Hutchins students were listed 26 times for achieving the highest score possible in a pre-tertiary subject.
- Approximately 153 students completed Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses, from short VET courses through to Certificate III qualifications, in a wide range of training areas including information technology, construction, maritime operations, and hospitality.
- 92% of all Year 12 students obtained a Tasmanian Certificate of Education.

While the academic achievements of so many of our students are outstanding, a student's success at Hutchins is not measured by league tables, rank orders or comparing their results with others. The final examination and course results represent only a fraction of the experiences available to all students throughout their learning journey at Hutchins. Our school's vision is to provide an inspirational education where each student strives to achieve their personal best and is willing to serve their community. It is with this vision firmly at the centre of our efforts that I thank all staff who have inspired and supported each student along their own personal learning journey.

The summary of academic results included in this document, represent over thirteen years of learning. On behalf of the students and their families, I thank every teacher who played a significant role motivating, inspiring and supporting students throughout their full school learning journey. I also thank the staff at St Michael's Collegiate and Fahan School for their support and delivery of some of the Year 11 and 12 classes as part of the Co-operating Schools Agreement.
