Editorial

What lies behind us and what lies before us are tiny matters. Compared to what lies within us.

hen you have spent fifteen years in one school you tend to get to know it and the people within it very well. In fact, when I come to think about it, I've been at Hutchins for over one-tenth of its history, so perhaps I'm well qualified for the task of writing the editorial for the sesquicentenary Virtus.

As I look back on the 1996 Leavers' history I will remember that we were rightly known as the 'rum-uns'. We had a strange effect on people. After we finished Grade 6, the Head of Junior School decided to step down and take on another role. This trend continued in Middle School, because after we finished Grade 8 Mr Millington also decided to move on to another part of the School. Then, as we 'romped' our way through Senior School, the Headmaster decided that he wouldn't wait until our group had finished before moving off to the other side of the country. Clearly we'd made a significant impression on all three.

On a more serious note: throughout this year a great deal has been said of the School's history, and of its future which may even be the next 150 years. But perhaps not enough has been said of the present - or, as Holmes says above, about 'what lies within us.' For the students of today and the type of school it is today will determine Hutchins' future. How will we react when we come to educate our own children? Will the school be Hutchins? Will our memories of Hutchins be such that we would wish to send our own children to the same school?

When we look back on Hutchins in another fifteen to twenty years, the memories for us will centre around a school where we received a high standard of education; where we had opportunities to avail ourselves of sporting and music facilities that were second to none; where values such as dignity and integrity meant so much. Are these the opportunities and values that we will require for our children when they face the demands of the twenty-first century? What will our children need to 'lie within them'? Technology is moving fast, and so is public opinion about the way we choose to use that technology. So too are social attitudes changing rapidly.

There has been a lot going on at Hutchins in 1996. Sesquicentenary concerts, reunions, assemblies, dinners, books written etc. It seems like almost every week a new and exciting addition to the School's history or to the School's future has emerged. Yet what is most needed is a close look at what lies within the current Leavers of 1996 and the School that they were a part of. Dignity and integrity, along with all those other values such as loyalty, excellence, and honour, certainly have their place in society. But underlying these are still more basic principles which are not esoteric, mysterious or even religious ideals: principles that sustain all social philosophies, religions, and ethical systems.

I am referring to fairness, honesty and trust. These three self-evident and simple principles are the foundations that are essential to co-operation and long-term personal and interpersonal growth. You cannot duck them, nor can you bend them to suit your requirements. The school that survives in the twenty-first century



will range in a balance between modern technology and teaching methods aligned to these principles. I challenge Hutchins, as it moves towards the twenty-first century, to hold on to them.

This year Hutchins has not enjoyed quite the success on the sporting field or in other co-curricular areas that it has in the past. One could perhaps blame leadership. It's a strange thing, leadership, in that sometimes you don't recognise it until the event is over. I always remember a statement I once heard in House Chapel about leadership. It was made by J. P. Gell in the first Official Address to the Hutchins School on August 3rd 1846. He quoted the great Lord Chancellor Bacon in saying, 'Leadership means service and that service should be done with piety and not with pride.' Service and leadership go hand in hand; they are not a medal, and the leader is not an icon. Service and leadership are earned not won. He who gives service, and is honest, fair and trustworthy will be a success in the future just as such men were in the days of J. P. Gell.

As Hutchins moves towards its bicentenary, it must have the support of a strong Hutchins family. I call upon all of this year group to maintain links with the School and I ask those who follow to bring out true leadership amongst all students, to encourage an atmosphere of fairness, honesty and trust, and so fit the School for a happy and prosperous future.

I hope you enjoy this sesquicentenary edition of Virtus.

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150TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

his year marks the School's sesquicentenary, and the events planned ranged from a special Mission to the School to the striking of a commemorative bronze medallion.

Hutchins shares its 150th birthday with Launceston Church Grammar School, to whom we sent special birthday wishes at joint anniversary church services attended by the Headmasters and Prefects of each school.

Hutchins' celebrations were compressed as far as possible into Anniversary Week to enable interstate Old Boys and other visitors to return to Hobart for a few days and to participate in a wide range of activities.

The Mission to the School by the Rev'd Dr Tony Campbell was a very special time. Dr Campbell's fortnight at Hutchins at the beginning of Term 2 was spent talking and praying with boys, staff and parents at formal and informal meetings. His impact upon the life of the School was immeasurable, and his address at St David's Cathedral was very well received. A man of prodigious preaching and story-telling talent, Dr Campbell will long be remembered at Hutchins.

Anniversary Week was a crowded and joyous time. It commenced with a wonderful concert at Wrest Point Convention Centre, where musicians and choristers from the School were augmented by members of the Hutchins Family - brothers, mums, dads and sisters. The combined orchestras and choirs featured in the Schubert Mass setting. Special guest artists, Andrew Short and Mark Knoop, were also popular aspects of the evening.

To enable all of the School family to attend the festal Evensong, three services were held in St David's Cathedral - a special one for boys of Junior School, and two for the older boys and Old Boys. At the third service we were honoured to have as Guest Preacher the Most Reverend Dr Keith Rayner AO, Archbishop of Melbourne and Primate of Australia. A novel feature of each service was the 'Passing on the Light' ceremony, where three Old Boys passed to three current boys a lighted candle signifying the passing on of the Christian message, and observing the School's historic links with the past. The Choir of the Chapel of St Thomas, and the Choristers of the Cathedral Church of St David, under their Director, Mr Ken Willy, were superb leaders of the worship program.

A new feature this year for Old Boys was the Sporting Carnival. Featured sports included Table Tennis. Australian Rules, Rugby, Tennis, Volleyball, Soccer. Hockey and Badminton. The Old Boys won the Table Tennis, Badminton, Rugby and Volleyball, while the current students were victorious in Australian Rules and Soccer.

The Craft Display at the Cocktail Party was a tribute to the boys' ingenuity in problem solving, and the display organised by Mr Turbett, Miss Donnelly and the staff from the Faculty of Art, Design and Technology, was enjoyed by the capacity crowd of 400 guests.

VALE MR JOHN BEDNALL



An address by Dr Stephen Gumley, Chairman of The Hutchins School Board of Management, delivered at the farewell cocktail party for Mr and Mrs Bednall held at Wrest Point, 7 December 1996.

r Bednall has had a remarkable career at Hutchins. In the ten years since he joined the L School in early 1987, the student and staff numbers have grown more than 20% to the current establishment of 1050 boys and 90 academic staff. The School is in good health financially and its infrastructure is sound.

The sesquicentenary plan was developed by Mr Bednall and in co-operation with all arms of the School community it was successfully implemented, culminating in the educational themes and celebrations of the last two months. We now have a modern school, well equipped for the future, with good physical assets.

But it is in the realms of educational quality that John Bednall will be most remembered. Amongst many advances and improvements, there are six lasting achievements that I would like to highlight, each of which has changed the educational paradigms at Hutchins and will last into the future.

The first is the Centre for Excellence. Conceived, championed and implemented by Mr Bednall, it offers

The third change is about organisational design at Hutchins and is a consequence of Mr Bednall proudly being an educational democrat. He recognised the need to broaden decision making throughout the School and has increased interaction between its various parts. There are now active organisational structures that govern key tasks throughout Hutchins, including the School Cabinet, Administrative Committee, a system of educational Faculties, and a Lower School Development Committee. There is also significantly greater involvement of boys in decision making. Boys take part in the day-to-day administration of the School and are accountable as much to each other as to teachers or other authorities.

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remedial support and extension learning for boys, improving weaknesses and working to the strengths of individuals. The Centre for Excellence caters for boys at either end of the academic spectrum, drawing the best out of all.

Second, Mr Bednall has completely revamped pastoral care for boys within the School. Through the vertical house system, older boys are placed into positions of care and responsibility for boys up to ten years younger. The Housemaster is now a significant person in the life of the boys, and there is now ongoing support and continuity as a boy progresses.

Another lasting initiative is a change in School culture so that the ordinary boy is encouraged to broaden his experience, efforts and interests to the very best of his natural ability. Sporting ability and athleticism are still highly regarded, but no more so than prowess and excellence in music and other performing arts. Enhanced religious education, philosophy and thought have also become key elements of the educational experience at Hutchins. It is a softer, more rounded and empathetic environment. Of course, academic excellence is encouraged and our boys have done well under John Bednall's headship.

The fifth lasting improvement lies in the infrastructure of the important profession of teaching: the theme has been the linking together of process and outcomes. There has been keen development of the craft of teaching, and ongoing professional development to ensure teachers know what is happening in Australia and overseas.

The final outcome of Mr Bednall's headship is that, throughout Australia and increasingly the world, Hutchins is now a renowned single sex school for boys, with an excellent reputation as a leader in values education for boys. John Bednall is undoubtedly an international leader in this program and the philosophy



that underpins it. The Board of Management has repeatedly reaffirmed his vision. Boys' education is special and we can all be proud of what has been achieved under Mr Bednall's leadership.

These six themes well illustrate that from a strong educational and philosophical base, Mr Bednall has planned and implemented major and lasting structural, pastoral, and cultural changes throughout Hutchins.

John Bednall has been loyally supported by his wife Jo. A well respected educationalist in her own right, Jo has been a tower of strength for John, and indeed the entire Hutchins community. Thank you, Jo: we wish you well and hope you remember your friends in Hobart with affection.

It is the end of an era, but also the start of a new beginning, both for The Hutchins School and the Bednall family. To the man who has made so much happen at Hutchins, who has given a decade of unstinting service, who has led the debate about single sex education in Australia, who has earned the loyalty of so many boys, staff and community members, John Bednall: thank you for your outstanding ability, thank you for your untiring professional efforts, we wish you and your family sincere best wishes for the future.

Parting Words

Mr Bednall's address to his final Headmaster's Assembly, held in the Butler Auditorium on 5th September 1996.

I have had to wrestle for a few weeks with what I would say to you this afternoon. I need to admit that I am feeling a little wrung out emotionally and so forgive me if I falter a little in the next few minutes.

I have taken great comfort from a comment made by one of you in a sensitive, dignified letter to me today that in the midst of all the anguish and distress with which we have had to deal as a school community this week, it feels good to be able to express emotion openly without being ridiculed and to know that comfort and support are available within the school.

'I soon realised,' this Grade 11 boy continued, 'that this degree of maturity and mateship could only occur in a school like Hutchins.'

And this is why I badly want these final remarks to you as members of this school to be words of optimism and celebration, because you have great cause to celebrate what you have collectively made this school.

The greatness of a school is not measured in terms of stunning success in academic competitions, sporting premierships, music eisteddfods - as welcome and as invigorating as these might be. It may not even be measured by that wonderful display of colour on the ground floor of the Foster Wing demonstrating your generosity to a tiny school in the depths of South Africa. It will be found in the answers each will shape to a few very simple questions.

> You've heard these questions before. They will be familiar language to you. Have you done your best and have you done so with honour? Have you made a worthy difference in the affairs of those with whom you deal? Have you taken the right decisions and can you now stand by them with dignified pride?

You might be interested to know that my decision to leave Hutchins was actually not that difficult to take.

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Of course I am very sad and I have been immensely touched by what so many of you have had to say to me in recent days through your gifts, your gracious letters and cards, or even just through a brief handshake in the corridors or a quick trip up to my office.

But it would be nothing but sheer conceit for me to believe that Hutchins depends upon me. Worse still it would be a gross insult to you and to those who follow you.

You will make your own decision about what you seek to be and do as a member of this school and then into your futures, just as I have done.

My decision was entirely based upon what I believed after a lot of thought represented: the interests of Hutchins - ten years is long enough; the interests of my family - starting life in another city is never easy; and then, where I thought I could do my best, do so with honour, and perhaps make a worthy difference.

I have many stories to tell my new friends in Perth about my life at Hutchins, but so too do you have your own stories, and so too do many opportunities await you to take the right decisions. That is the theme which grew to characterise this sesqicentenary year - and how powerful and inspiring it has been to us all.

But the reason why I want today to be filled with optimism and hope is that the last story about me which I want to leave with you is my profound belief in the power of goodness and that our best decisions are those which tackle head-on the forces which sometimes threaten to crowd us with irritation and anger, and then despair and depression, like Port Arthur, like poor Tristan's death.

Life will triumph over death, good will always conquer evil, the positive will always defeat the negative, the

courageous will always overcome the cynics, the builders and affirmers will always outlast the knockers and the mockers

The trick is for each of us to seize the opportunity and take those decisions which will make us active in the pursuit of such hope, and to remember that we have the freedom to choose so to do.

What we become is what we choose to be from all the forces which swirl around us.

One of the great teachers of human history, John Wesley, wrote this:

I expect to pass through this world but once. Any good I can do therefore, or any kindness I can show to any fellow creature, let me do it. Let me not defer or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again.

Give yourself the time for contemplation and reflection. Find a spot in your lives where there is silence, and let yourself come closer to God. Live by a commitment to believe in Truth. It is too easy in this world to assume something is true because it is convenient, comfortable and familiar to do so. It gives our lives the character of a cliché and no energy exists to see out new ways of thinking. Thomas Merton, one of the great spiritual educators of this century, knew the dangers:

If our life is poured out in useless and familiar words, we will never hear anything, we will never become anything, and in the end, because we have said everything before we had anything to say, we shall be speechless at the moment of our greatest decision.

I will rest content if you all remember that the chances for your greatest decisions are yet to come. Don't be speechless when they do.

Thank you for these wonderful gifts, thank you for this wonderful assembly, thank you for all you have done for me at Hutchins by presenting me with the stories upon which I will make my own decisions.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

The Acting Headmaster

his year will be remembered as the year of our sesquicentenary. Details of this are recorded elsewhere in this publication, but the celebrations remain in my memory because, in their own special way, they focused as much, if not more, on what we were celebrating, not just the celebrating itself.

What were we celebrating? Certainly One Hundred and Fifty Years of existence, but that is probably to beg the question: what does Hutchins stand for? What is our mission? Why do people work so hard to maintain and support the School? What are we on about? Why do so many parents make such sacrifices to afford the Hutchins fees? The answer in part may be found in the aims of the School.

It is appropriate from time to time to re-visit these Aims and Objectives and critically examine how faithfully we are adhering to them. I do not propose here to carry out that review in any detail, but rather to touch lightly on some of their generalities.

In support of the first stated aim, one of the enduring legacies of the Bednall years will, I hope, be a continuing emphasis upon students being closely involved in their own management. In addition to creating new practices in the School, such as the Student Tribunal, significant modifications and alterations to many existing practices were implemented - the House System is the most obvious example of this. These changes had an enormous impact upon student involvement in their own management. This impact was not limited to the senior boys. The notion of using students in the planning and decision-making processes permeated the whole School. Students indeed have been given more avenues for personal growth than have ever existed previously.

Hutchins has a spiritual mission. The School was founded as an Anglican school. Buckland, the first Headmaster, said that in a Christian school the oral training and discipline must always be of far higher importance than the mere imparting of head learning. This view of the School has been variously described over the years, but in essence today we mostly focus on the notion of 'good character' arising out of Christian values.

Hutchins has three main aims. In summary they are:

1. To help each student grow to his potential in all possible areas of personal growth.

2. To create an environment sympathetic to the pursuit of excellence in all that is undertaken.

3. To develop in each student an awareness of the community outside Hutchins and to contribute positively to it.

Many would wish that good character grew out of Christian faith, but regrettably, the habit of witnessing and practising one's membership of a church is on the decline. It is difficult for a boy to declare publicly his Christian commitment when it is not fashionable within his community to do so.



Dr Tony Campbell's visit in June was, therefore, timely. He encouraged us to ask questions about our spirituality. For many that was a liberating experience. I would hope we can build on this. Spiritual awareness needs popularising and given a legitimacy, which currently it struggles to enjoy. The whole Hutchins community, as well as individuals, will be the beneficiaries if we can achieve this.

Our sesquicentenary celebrations gave us numerous examples of how well the School is doing in terms of creating a climate of excellence. The Headmaster's Assembly, the Music Concert (both of which were held at Wrest Point), the sports afternoon and the craft display at the Anniversary Cocktail Party were all outstanding showcases for the achievement of excellence. If the environment of the School was wrong these activities could never have taken place. It has been suggested by some that the Hutchins emphasis upon a liberal, all-round education of the whole person has put at risk the pursuit of intellectual excellence. That observation is valid if only to alert us not to be complacent. The aims of the Renaissance Man and intellectual rigour and excellence are not mutually exclusive. It becomes a matter of priorities. We do need to keep the balance right. Perhaps without prejudicing our commitment to the whole person we could sharpen our intellectual focus and value it more for its own sake.

Our third aim talks of community awareness. During our Sesquicentenary Year, in addition to our usual areas of involvement in the 'outside of Hutchins' community, the Students' Representative Council undertook a vigorous fundraising program to support a school in Africa - Tiamoko. As a result of some outstanding creative fundraising ideas, the student body raised over \$4,500.

Again, it is hoped that this will not be a 'once off' affair, but will form the basis of a continuing heightening of awareness that each of us lives in a community to which we should feel an obligation to contribute our talents. There is room at Hutchins for more outreach programs and active support for pro-active citizenship. Hopefully the Sesquicentenary Tiamoko Appeal did much to reignite in us the recognition of that need.

So the Sesquicentenary was more than just a series of self-indulgent celebrations. I hope it served to remind us of our heritage and gave us the opportunity to present to all, who might be interested, what we do and value at Hutchins. Most importantly, I hope it has forced us to pause and reflect on the nature of our School and what we aspire to achieve as a school. Our aims are clear. I hope the outcomes are faithful to them.

Mr Bill Powell returned to the School in Terms 2 and 3 to offer his considerable energy and talent in teaching Speech and Drama, and in Term 3 we welcomed Mrs Michelle Weeding, previously of Fahan School, as our new Director of the Speech and Drama Department. We have been very grateful for the experience and gifts of Mrs Laura Crabtree, who joined the Senior School staff in a part time capacity to teach English, and of Mr Daryl Plumb who taught ESL, English and Religious Studies part time. Mr David Bevan capably took on Mr Turbett's teaching responsibilities while he was on long service leave during Term 3. Mr Steve Leeper joined the staff to provide computer support for our expanding technology program.

At the end of Term 2 we said goodbye to Mrs Rossy Roberts-Thomson after many years of devoted service in the classroom and in the Nettlefold Library. Mrs Thomson will be remembered for her generous friendship and hospitality (including her famous pavlovas) offered to many members of common room, her cheerful and painstaking work in the library, and her magnificent flower arrangements which have adorned countless Hutchins functions.

Mr Martin Seymour retired from the Hutchins Foundation Centre for Excellence at the end of the year. As founding Director for the past nine years Mr Seymour has brought his vision and enthusiasm to bear in creating a model of what can be achieved in remedial and extension education.

Mr Bill Johnstone resigned as Director of the Speech and Drama Department at the end of Term 1 to pursue his career in the theatre in New York. He brought a level of professionalism to studies in voice, movement and drama which Hutchins has never experienced before, resulting in some outstanding theatre productions, most notably Beckett's Waiting for Godot in 1992 and Chekov's The Proposal in 1994. He also established the Hutchins Circus Troupe which delighted audiences on many occasions.

This year has shown very clearly that in times of celebration and sadness, God's light still shines through the darkness, even if at times the light seems dim.

As we look forward to a new era in the life of The Hutchins School, may we strive to remember Jesus' words: 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will have the light of life and will never walk in darkness.' May we take the Light of Christ and let it shine in our lives.

The Hutchins Foundation

The Lesser Known Founding Fathers

his year saw Hutchins celebrate 150 years of schooling in Tasmania. Hutchins was educating boys when Hobart was still little more than a provincial country town, when the mainstay of the colony was whaling, when bushrangers were a very real threat to isolated homesteads, and ships were still regularly bringing convicts from England. Indeed, it has been speculated that in the early days of the School. there was at least one teacher who originally arrived as a prisoner of the crown. Unfortunately the relevant documentary evidence does not exist, as far as we can determine. Thus his identity remains a mystery. Perhaps among some old photographs in an antique shop in Hobart, there is a photograph of this unknown teacher.

More than likely there are also portraits of other teachers and community members who, through their individual and singular contributions. ensured that Hutchins would continue to grow. Many of these founding fathers are familiar to us: the first Headmaster, J.R. Buckland, and Archdeacon Hutchins. after whom the School was named. Their faces have appeared from time to time in School publications. Many would be familiar at least with the name of Alexander McNaughton, the Hobart

merchant in whose name a Scholarship was established. Fewer would have come across his photograph. Very few, however, would recognise the name of the first Assistant Master in 1846, Robert Wigmore. Probably no one in the Hutchins community would have seen his portrait.

Among the earliest photographs in the Archives collection there are a number of these lesser known founding fathers and in retrospect we can be thankful to those who saw fit to put them aside and to pen in names and dates on the back, thereby ensuring they escaped anonymity.

The year contained a few very low points, the lowest being the untimely death of Tristan Valentine, a Grade 11 student at Hutchins. Sad that a young man should die in the prime of life. It was good to see so many of his friends at his funeral service, held in the Chapel on the last Saturday of Term 2. His cheerfulness around the Student Club and wherever he was will be sadly missed. It will take the School community a long time to come to terms with his death.

The horrific violence at Port Arthur had a profound effect on both the Tasmanian community and the School. That violence of this magnitude should occur in a peaceful state like Tasmania laid to rest the myth that we were immune to such violence. Our counselling services were, once again, called into action to support the boys and their families who had been affected by the tragedy.

Another low was the departure of our Headmaster to Wesley College in Perth. We will miss his inspired leadership, his wife Jo's tireless efforts with the Teaching and Learning Project and Peter's involvement in so many areas of school life. We wish them and Alice the best of fortune in Perth. It is always unsettling when the Headmaster leaves at the end of a term. Fortunately, we had Mr David Brammall to take up the reins and do a superb job of running the School until the arrival of Mr Bill Toppin in January.

I regard 1996 as the year of the story, with firstly the visit of Dr Tony Campbell, a Baptist Preacher from Boston, who led a mission at the School as part of our sesquicentenary celebrations. His ability to communicate was astounding. He related equally to old and young. It would be wonderful to have such a gifted preacher here in our community. We have kept in contact with him and hope that he will be able to return to Hobart in the not too distant future.

Story-telling was continued by Mr Bennett at the Anniversary Assembly and also by our new Chairman of the Board of Management, Dr Steven Gumley, at the Awards Assembly. We can all relate to characters in the past and we need to build up this tradition within our

School. Human characters are remembered; they enrich and sustain the heritage of our school.

One of the long-lasting effects will be the work that has been started on teaching and learning in the School. A group of twelve staff have been working very closely with Mrs Bednall on The Teaching and Learning Project,

It is a far more active form of learning as each student plays a vital part in the entire process.

We are moving towards a model, which has been successfully initiated in the Junior School, with team leaders working together each week to ensure that students are getting the very best possible teaching. The timetable next year, with fifty minute periods, will allow us to implement this new system and also to cut down on movement in the School during the course of a day.

What of other activities? In sport 1996 has been somewhat disappointing. So many of our teams reached finals and were unable to clinch the premiership. This was the case in cricket, water polo, athletics, volleyball, hockey, basketball, rugby and badminton. We did manage statewide premierships in tennis, swimming, soccer, cross country and the individual shields for junior and senior athletics. It has been interesting watching the development of clubs in the rosters for sport, with football moving towards an integration of

school and club teams into a single roster. This has already been achieved in junior soccer Our players will at least get the opportunity to represent the School in a substantial competition. Cricket still presents a challenge at the open level, but it is interesting that Friends will be playing in the cricket roster for the first time since 1991 next year.

An Anniversary Day with a Difference

It is now more than 150 years since J.R. Buckland took up his post as the first Headmaster of The Hutchins School. What has been achieved at Hutchins in that decade and a half is perhaps beyond Buckland's wildest dream.

The House that now bears his name is just as proud of its tradition as perhaps Buckland himself was back then on that cold Tuesday morning 150 years ago, on 3rd August 1846. If at the commencement of 1996 anyone had said to me that during the Sesquicentenary Anniversary Week I would not be at Hutchins celebrating with all the others, but that I would be in Varanassi, India, I would have laughed - but on August 3rd, 1996, there I was.

Varanassi Railway Station in Northern India is a long way from the comforts of Hobart and Hutchins. I was hot, dirty, stranded, tired and hungry. The train to Agra had been delayed for over 12 hours. It was 10 am, and I had spent most of the night on a railway bench. The railway station dates back to the turn of the century. Not much has changed since then. Cows frequently walk back and forth, dogs fight, and I would estimate over 10,000 people pass through it each day.

Begging was something that I had a lot of trouble coming to terms with in India. As a Westerner you are advised to ignore it. However, the sight of someone begging, who is at the final stage of suffering from leprosy, is something I had never experienced before. The Hindus come to Varanassi to die in order to be blessed by having their ashes scattered on the River Ganges.

So that is the scene: a middle aged man, on his own, who had never been out of Australia before - dirty, unshaven and disgustingly filthy; trying to catch a train in a country where no-one spoke English, and trying to turn a blind eye to six unfortunate lepers, begging for food and money.

I then heard a sound behind me, but it was not enough to hold my attention - the senses become very dulled in this part of the world. However, the cause of it soon came into view. I was both shocked and amazed. There, standing beside me, were what almost appeared to be two angels. In the filth, squalor and confusion of the railway station were two young Indian women. Beautiful in appearance, immaculately dressed in blue saris, each carrying a Bible in one hand, and a soup billy with plastic cups in the other. I recognised them immediately as members of Mother Theresa's Sisters of Mercy.

No more than a few metres from me they gathered the lepers together and fed them soup. Not a word was spoken by anyone. I felt shamed to think that I had rejected these unfortunate people, yet here were two young women, no more than 20 years of age, who were prepared to dedicate their lives to assisting the less fortunate. My embarrassment was such that I couldn't wait for them to go. I wasn't moving from the platform because my train would be coming through any minute; I was trapped and the longer I waited, the more their attention turned to me. The paranoia was overwhelming. Sweat dripped from under my arms. Then the ultimate humiliation occurred. One of the nuns got up and walked over to me. She placed her hand on my head and said in perfect English, 'God bless you, my son.'

The train suddenly appeared at the platform. In my pocket I had 200 rupees which I immediately gave to the nun - it was all I had. I think if I had 2000 rupees my reaction would have been the same. It was an occasion that I don't think I will ever forget. I have never been so humiliated in all my life as I was that morning on Varanassi Railway station. For me, it was certainly an Anniversay Day with a difference!

Wider Friendships

Toshima

hallenging economic times in Japan have caused a temporary cessation of our links with the schools of Toshima. In the five years since the Toshima City Board of Education began its Tasmania Experience program, sending groups of Junior High School students and staff to experience the famous Tasmanian hospitality and the equally famous Wilderness regions, Hutchins Grade 9 students and their families have played host to almost 200 children from the inner-Tokyo area. It is not known whether the program will be resuscitated. The City of Toshima sent delegates to Hutchins earlier this year to explain their decision to curtail the program, and to express their wish that it will resume at some stage in the future.

Hutchins students and Hobart's families have learned so much about Japanese life through the program, and while it has not been an exchange as such, four Hutchins boys were able to visit Tokyo and spend some time with Japanese families.

Tomei High School

This year, the Tomei High School, from Oita in southern Japan, visited Hutchins for the first time. A small group of High School students and staff flew from Japan to Korea and then on to Sydney and Hobart. Their brief time here followed a similar pattern to that created in previous years: some time spent looking at our native

wildlife, time with Host families, and a brief experience of life in our schools. In 1997 a similar group is expected. It is important that Hutchins maintain its international links, as we inhabitants of our small island recognise the value of friendships which span vast distances and the potential for greater understanding.

University School

Hutchins also played host to some boys and staff from University School, Cleveland, Ohio. Our continuing relationship with this fine school in the USA will see boys from Hutchins travelling North in 1997 to learn the American way of life. 1996 Leaver, Simon Ancher, has also spent twelve months at University School, as an assistant staff member, and has made a significant contribution to life there.

S.V. Concordia

An unusual international link in 1996 was the opportunity afforded to six Hutchins and six Collegiate students to fly to Adelaide and join the SV Concordia on one leg of its round-the-world educational journey. The Concordia is a Canadian tall ship - a 188 foot barkentine - which operates 'Class Afloat', a fully-accredited academic and sailing program for pre-tertiary students. Our students sailed from Adelaide to Hobart on the ship, and Hutchins played host to some of the staff and students during the ship's time here.

International Students

Finally, our own international students at Hutchins have added to the wealth of experiences Tasmanian boys at

Hutchins can enjoy. In 1996, Hutchins had Day Boy or Boarding students from many countries including Japan, Malaysia, Thailand, Hong Kong, Indonesia and Papua New Guinea. GAP students from England and Wales have also made great contributions Hutchins.

Tour to Indonesia

n May this year 21 Hutchins students, led by Mr Wilson, Mrs Seewang and Mrs Keller set off on a tour of Indonesia. Our first destination was the wood-carving village of Mas in Central Bali. Here we stayed for three days, which gave us time to shop at the local market and enjoy some Indonesian cooking, painting and batik making lessons. There was also time to relax, and one afternoon we had a kick of the footy which drew a huge gallery of bemused locals.

Our next destination was Yogyakarta, Central Java. As if Bali was not hot enough, Yogyakarta was hotter and the humidity high. There were some very interesting places to visit: the Sultan's palace, Borobodur, the largest Buddhist temple in Asia, a batik factory, Kota Gede (a centre of gold and silver work) and the Water Palace. Also we found a McDonald's and after four or five days of dodgy Indonesian cuisine this was frequently visited during our stay. Unfortunately for some, the Indonesian food had gotten the better of them and they were forced to stay in their hotel rooms.

After four days we moved on to Solo, a more traditional Javanese city. We visited another palace and a huge shopping complex. Just over the road from our hotel were the cinemas and a fun park. The dodgem cars, at a dollar a turn, were always in use. One night in Solo some of us, with the help of locals, jumped the fence to watch an inter-island soccer game. Solo was not a tourist area and this was shown when on returning to a restaurant the second night it was closed as they were out of food. There was no pool in our hotel in Solo but there was a tropical downpour and we welcomed this as a chance to cool down by showering under the roof spouts.

Next we stayed in Salatiga for two nights and journeyed up into the mountains to a Javanese holiday spot where we swam, ate and rode horses. We pulled out the football again here and Niall Seewang set off a car alarm with a kick which slurred off the side of the boot, and Ollie Cousland put the football on the roof of our three storey high apartment. David Keller and Marcus Owen were forced to sleep one night on their balcony here after their room was flooded with two centimetres of water, thanks to William Senior.

It was now back to Bali, to Kuta. Much shopping was done in the markets and streets. We watched a fire dance and visited Ulu Watu, a temple overhanging a 100m cliff. To the delight of Alex Heydon the surf was good, and Kuta beach had a lot to offer.

We thank Mr Wilson, Mrs Seewang and Mrs Keller for taking care of us and hope the next Indonesian trip is as enjoyable as this was for us.

The Director of Studies

his has been a busy year for curriculum and professional development. While we continued the emphasis on Values Education and Information Technology, we also commenced the work of the Lower-School Development Committee and the Teaching and Learning Project.

Outstanding results were achieved by the following Grade 12s: Michael Evenhius(100) and Richard Davis (100), James Hawkins (96), Damien Gilby (94), Leo Kwan (92), Andrew Binny (91), Angus Fotheringham (90) Roger Chung (89), James Burbury (80), Tom Wilcox (78), Tim Stacey (75), Michael Valentine (73), Alex Butterfield (73) and Geoff Inglis (70). There were some very good and a few outstanding results by Grade 11 boys, in particular Joe Bishop (76) and Nick Brett (73). Other very good scores were achieved by Adrian Harwood (61), Tom Millhouse (60), Nick Ellsmore (57), Mike Cardno (57), David Schreuder (56) and Chris Scott (51).

This year the School offered 84 different subjects at Grades 11 and 12, including fifty-hour A subjects on such things as The Principles of Flight and Ideas and Religions in Australia and Asia.

Lower School Developments

Mr Alan Dear headed a new Lower-School Development Committee ensuring continuity of educational experience for boys from K-8. Priorities for 1996 were the development of a new curriculum for Grades 7 and 8 in order to slow down the frenetic pace of the school day. Next year the boys will have a six period day and come into contact with fewer teachers. The aim has been to produce a more supportive learning environment. As part of this change Life Skills will no longer be taught by tutors but replaced by two strands: Personal Development, taught by specialist teachers who have a particular interest in this area, and Health Education, taught by PE staff.

SRC Curriculum Executive

The Curriculum Executive consists of four committees -Learning Programs, Curriculum Review, Activities and Clubs and Societies - and meets each week to manage its various activities. These include: the Scholars' Conference, The Hutchins Gift, a Speed Reading Program, Clubs and Societies Day, Battle of the Bands, the development of a Hutchins Internet site, reviewing the designs of the Student Diary and report forms. The Executive supports many other School events, including the Family Picnic and Grade 10 Activities.

The Teaching and Learning Project

Since the late 80s Hutchins has put a lot of energy into considering what is unique about a single sex boys' school and how it can best meet the needs of its students. The culture of the School has changed and the staff are being challenged to examine the sexist stereotypes that are so often thrust upon boys. Many of these changes involved the co-curricular life of the School and by 1995 the Headmaster wanted to give the same deliberate focus to what was happening in classrooms. Is there a curriculum that best provides for the needs of boys within a single-sex school? Are there teaching methods that are more effective than others in boys only classrooms? The Teaching and Learning Project was set up to help staff examine questions such as these. The School employed a variety of consultants to run workshops for various groups and to present a theoretical background against which staff could assess their classroom practice.

Twelve staff were asked to be Key Teachers for the year. They agreed to attend a four day course on co-operative learning by Professor Barrie Bennett from the University of Toronto, and half also attended a six day course on 'Teaching for Effective Learning', by Dr Julia Atkin, a consultant from New South Wales. They met regularly after school to share ideas and give each other the confidence to try out new strategies in their classrooms.

Finally they presented a workshop to their colleagues to demonstrate some of the new processes that they had been using.

We are not a lot closer to answering the questions posed above, although some progress had been made by individual Key Teachers. There is an emerging understanding that boys do not have to be sitting quietly in serried ranks of desks for effective learning to take place; movement, chatting and working co-operatively can all be part of a productive classroom. The importance of giving students a sense of ownership about their work has been illustrated many times, as has the positive effects of teachers explaining to students why they are doing what they are doing.

The project will continue in 1997 with a large number of staff agreeing to be part of reflective teams. Building on the model that the Junior School has provided in their grade teams, the reflective teams will meet regularly to talk about teaching and learning. Current research into change in schools makes it clear that collaboration between teachers is an essential component of successful implementation, and the reflective teams are an attempt to make that a more explicit part of teaching at Hutchins.

A fine start has been made to the Teaching and Learning project, due largely to the enthusiasm and commitment of the Key Teachers. On-going support from the staff, the administration and the wider School community will ensure that it realises its potential to have a profound influence on what is happening in classrooms throughout the School.

Values Education

Philosophy for Children

With philosophical discusions taking place regularly in all classes from Grades 2-10, Hutchins offers the most extensive program of Philosophy for Children in Australia. In classroom 'communities of inquiry' students are learning to clarify familiar concepts and to develop new ones, to reason more effectively, to think creatively and to co-operate in the pursuit of reliable knowledge. Their sense of curiosity, love of learning, fascination with language and willingness to listen both sympathetically and critically to others are being fostered and then transferred to other areas of the curriculum. Indeed, there is considerable research evidence that Philosophy for Children significantly benefits students' development in language and mathematics.

Increasingly our teachers are gaining the skills to replace the conceptually rich but aesthetically unsatisfying materials, created by the founder of Philosophy for Children, Prof. Matthew Lipmann, as the stimulus for philosophical inquiry, with literature which they have selected themselves from the vast store of wonderful books for children and adolescents. There is also a growing collection of stories and manuals being produced in Australia to support the program. Indeed, we have begun trialling an excellent anthology of philosophical stories by Judy Keen, a Hobart educational psychologist, teacher and writer.

In Term 2 I attended the conference of the Federation of Australasian Philosophy for Children Associations in Sydney. There I met Dr Anthony Imbrosciano who has developed a course in informal and formal logic for secondary school students. We are planning to trial this course in Grade 9 next year. In Term 3 Dr Phil Cam, Senior Lecturer in Philosophy at the University of NSW and a world authority on Philosophy for Chilren, visited the School to learn more about our ethics program and to run a workshop for teachers on how to develop their own discussion plans for materials which they have selected. This proved a great encouragement to our work.

The Curriculum

Ethics Education and Moral Development

The program of Ethics Education which is taught by every teacher in every subject throughout the School has been further consolidated this year as Faculties have been developing syllabuses and teaching materials appropriate to each of their subject areas. Students are being taught how to think rationally about the moral issues which arise in every aspect of life. At the same time the School is training students, through its entire curriculum, co-curriculum, chapel and pastoral care program, to adopt those virtues which befit a Hutchins man - a blatant process of indoctrination, one might say!

However, this inculcation of moral and other values is offset by our Ethics Education program which encourages students to question in a rational manner what they are being taught, and so to arrive at their own philosophy of life - or at least a more coherent version of the home, school and community values which are being handed on to them. As Socrates said: 'The unexamined life is not worth living.' Thus the challenge to the whole Hutchins community - teachers, parents, Old Boys, as well as students - is to subject our lives to rigorous



ethical scrutiny. How do we measure up as examples of what it is to lead ethically defensible lives? It is painful to go on year after year honestly asking this question, but the alternative is to slide into smug selfcongratulation and blind error.

Information Technology

The Hutchins internal network links classrooms. libraries, laboratories and offices to the outside world. This gives staff and students access to Internet and E-mail. At present the network links the Nettlefold Library, Stephens Library, Vincent Wing classrooms, offices and the Macintosh Computer Laboratory. In 1997 this network will extend to classrooms in the Junior School block and the Dudley Clarke Music block. It is envisaged that all parts of the School will be linked eventually.

This year the Macintosh Laboratory was re-equipped with 30 Power Macintosh computers, a scanner, laser printers and access to the school network. It is a general purpose laboratory, used by computing and other classes. Students and staff use it on a casual basis throughout the day. The IBM Laboratory is equipped with 25 IBMcompatible computers and associated equipment, and is used by the Commerce and Legal Studies Faculty. The Design and Technology Faculty use 13 state-of-the-art IBM-compatible computers and associated equipment for their design work. The Middle School Laboratory consists of 25 computers, mainly Macintosh Plus, and associated equipment.

The School's policy is to put computers into classrooms where they are wanted. For several years we have focussed on equipping the upper-primary classrooms with up-todate computers and training the teachers. This policy will continue next year. There are computers in all Junior School classrooms. Computers are also situated in Art, Manual Arts, Science, Geography, Physical Education and Mathematics classrooms as requested by faculties. By 1997 the Nettlefold and Stephens Libraries will each have six computers with Internet access for student use.

Faculties and Departments

Art, Design and Technology

esign is one important link common to all the subject areas in this faculty. It is a process by which individuals can solve problems in an interesting and enjoyable way. The focus in Art is to create more aesthetic solutions to problems, whilst other subject areas demand consideration of both aesthetics and function. Students this year have been involved in solving problems associated with the sesquicentenary celebrations: Tom Shoobridge's outdoor furniture, to be installed in the Senior School, is a fine example of this. Last year Mr Turbett spoke of 'exciting times ahead' and this year we have witnessed the fine products displayed at the cocktail party and read the glowing reports from subject co-ordinators that follow.

Electronics

As Electronics settles into its fourth year it was decided to run the Grade 10 classes with a theme of robotics. Some very creative products have resulted. Tim Pitman produced a robotics arm capable of picking up small objects and moving them from side to side. Adrian Biggs made a plotter which can draw rectangles and squares, Andrew Greenhill made a buggy which can follow a white line and Luke Littleford and Matthew Johnson made a buggy which can detect the edge of a table and move away from it. All the robots have involved some work with integrated circuits and digital electronics. The Grade 9s completed the year by making improvements to one of the projects they had built during the year. The result was a number of more powerful amplifiers and improved burglar systems.

Design In Wood

The design and manufacture of projects has again been of an exceptional standard, the emphasis being on individual design, based on a standard brief, followed by the construction of the product itself.

The Grade 11/12 group made its mark through willingness to work and displaying a creative spirit. Of the great variety of projects attempted those of Marcus Hodgman and his outdoor furniture, Sam Boyes and his rowing theme, and Brodie Neill with his piece of indoor furniture have stood out as being of a very high standard indeed.

At Grade 10 students have been challenged by a variety of demanding briefs. In Mr Moore's group the major brief was the design and manufacture of a stool. A number of interesting solutions were skilfully crafted in designs ranging from traditional to contemporary styles. Of particular note were those of Adam Commane and Josh Clark, who displayed exceptional skill and ability utilising a variety of different processes, including laminating and turning.

Mr Servant's Grade 10 had a productive year. Their major project involved the design of a side table. Most students, with the exception of Angus Boyes and Alex Playsted, attempted more contemporary designs, in which Aaron

Hogan, Peter Bednall and Will Gamlin excelled. The more traditional work of Angus Boyes turned out exceptionally well. The group project involved the construction of a 1:10 scale timber frame house. The class was divided into teams each responsible for a specific part of the structure. The enthusiasm displayed in this exercise was remarkable.

In Grade 9 Mr Servant's class started with a brief requiring the design and manufacture of a clock. This provided some very original results. Particular mention goes to Danny O'Donnell (who presented his to Mr Bednall as a farewell gift), Nathan Winter and Mark Groom. The second brief involved designing and making a game. Tom Miller did an excellent job of a small pool table and a number of others made chess boards.

Technical Graphics

Grades 7 and 8 have been developing strong 3D visualisation and drawing skills through various activities. Freehand sketching and model making has introduced new materials and techniques to the boys. Some of the activities have been held outside, providing many opportunities for discovering the environment through drawing and observation.

Excellent 'portraits in pencil' were drawn by Aup Koohapremkit, Tristan Briers, Guy Ellis, Tom Morris, Edward Webster and James Seddon. All boys deserve a mention for their skills and understanding in the introductory principles of Technical Graphics. Congratulations go to Bryce Taplin, Philip Freeman and Alex Reed on their commitment and achievements within the subject.

In Grades 9 and 10 students have enjoyed valuable and rewarding teaching from Mr Stevens and Mr Servant. In Grade 9, together with all types of projection, geometry and tangency, students continue to improve rendering and problem solving techniques. The major project involved engineering and structural aspects of bridge design. Rounding the year off nicely was the introduction to Computer Aided Drawing and Design. All the boys are to be congratulated for their application and achievement, with special mention of Nick Dwyer. Matthew Woolley and Jason Chuck.

In Grade 10, together with conventional technical aspects, the boys have been encouraged to develop skills in graphic communication through a more artistic freedom of visual expression. Tom Larkey, Sam Ireland, Marc Borrowman and Hiu Kong Mak produced excellent work based on 'life in a gum nut', a CD cover design and 'robotic viruses'. A major part of their studies involved 'surveying' a block of land and producing a complete design folio for the construction of a house. Chris Lane, William Moase, Simon Binny and Martin Matthews excelled in producing an outstanding folio of technical graphics. Term 3 has seen further developments in CADD with an introduction to 3D surface modelling and raytracing. Good results have been obtained through co-operation, producing many models of 'secluded refuges' using Caddsman Software.



Computer Graphics and Design

Boys in this area enjoy many design briefs which provide them with a greater knowledge of computers as powerful design tools. Grade 11s quickly develop skills in twodimensional drafting and three-dimensional surface modelling, and apply these to a variety of design challenges. These skills soon provide excellent examples of 'virtual reality.' A variety of software packages are explored and as often as possible the boys are encouraged to develop their own understanding of computer graphic principles. All have achieved excellent results with particular mention of Lyn Clarke, Richard Hewson and Garth Newton. Further developments will see boys involved with Industrial/Product design and CAD CAM applications.

The Grade 12 pre-tertiary class is made up of both first and second year students. Robert Cooper and Michael Stanojevic have enjoyed excellent theory and practical results. Harry Fiotakis and Anthony Racey have produced some very rewarding animation sequences. The major projects required each student to write a study proposal and the final folio must reflect the designing process with strong evidence of research and original thought. This year they range from jewelery design, shop fitting and aqua-culture to shearing, milking and beef facilities, architecture, robots and recording studios. Finally there is off-road vehicle design, light railway, jetty facilities for stock loading and an automotive display stand.

Art

This year has seen some of the strongest art work ever made by our art students. Miss Donnelly and Mr Fish continued to focus on the Junior School curriculum. Judging by the way the boys sprint into the art rooms, exciting things are happening. Mr Fish's class will never forget the project where every boy made a plastic model and then displayed it in a diorama. Imagine 26 boys with tiny plastic components using super glue. Mr Fish aged 5 years, but the results were excellent. Miss Donnelly visited Sydney to collect curriculum material and to attend a seminar on primary art teaching. The airline put on an extra plane to get back all the documents she collected.

We have continued to develop the Design Extended syllabus in Grade 10. The boys have made excellent steel sculptures based on flying creatures. This syllabus was written by the Hutchins ADT Faculty with the aim of combining technology and art, with design being the mortar. Recently other schools have begun to use the syllabus, and this year it was given full TCE accreditation.

Grade 11/12 work has been the strongest so far at Hutchins. Some students have produced five times the minimum required for assessment. The non pre-tertiary work has also been a feature with many students producing exciting, expressive work but not opting to do the external assessment allowing for far greater experimentation.

In Grade 9/10 we have concentrated on technique and craftsmanship in producing art work. This will be further enhanced next year with students being able to use artist quality acrylic paints, allowing students to be formally instructed in painting skills. The cheaper quality paints do not behave like artist paints, therefore more formal skills have not been possible to teach. especially where traditional realism is concerned.

Careers Education

Yes... it is important to think to the future!

Each and every one of you should concentrate on expanding and improving your range of abilities and aptitudes, developing new interests and hobbies, thinking about your values and what you stand for - get excited about something and give something new a go ... you will never, never know if you never, never ...! Continue to seek ways of being a self-starter, showing self-discipline and initiative, enjoy the challenges in front of you and be prepared to do something that is difficult - then you are on the road to the 21st Century.

Centre for Excellence

The Pilot Leaves The Ship

The Centre has its ninth birthday this year with 1800 children served over that time - nearly double the entire School population. And this is not counting parents and other non-Hutchins students who have attended our evening courses, summer schools or weekend activities. Having reached the age of decrepitude when it is time to retire and hand the reigns to younger blood and a new management philosophy, one needs to ask the question has it been worthwhile?

The first nine years have firmly established the Centre as part of the School life, providing a solid program of standardised tested support for those with learning needs and exciting new horizons for the gifted and talented.

It is always difficult to evaluate an educational initiative, and while much of the Centre work has been financially self-supporting it has nevertheless been a net charge against School funds and therefore parent fees. Could the funds have been better employed perhaps in, say, reducing class size by improving the teacher/pupil ratio? A thorny question.

The function of the Centre has been to cater for those learning needs not covered by the standard curriculum. This it has certainly done. The argument for or against is whether to provide more input for the general curriculum or to broaden it to cater for a wider range of needs.

Parent support for the Centre has always been outstanding. In any one year never fewer than thirty parents have given their active support to our programs, sometimes devoting several hours a week to assisting in roles as diverse as one-to-one remedial reading to acting as specialist mentors to gifted extension students.

We are constantly approached by prospective parents concerned that their sons will be able to receive specialist support in a need even before they enrol him. In 1995 320 students attended the Centre - a third of the School population. Ultimately a service must be judged by those who freely choose to use it.

This is not to say that much improvement is not possible. 1997 will see the Centre under new management, with perhaps a change in philosophy. I drop the helm confident that the next nine years will continue to improve a service that parents have made clear they wish to be maintained.

Several other boys also made the final short list of plans.

Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition

'E' Team

This year was the first time The Hutchins School has entered a team in the 'E' Team program, conducted by the Australian Quality Council. Mark Williamson, Andrew Beck, David Harper and Marcus Richardson, under the organisation of Mr Ray Stacey, worked with the Hydro Electric Commission and their management facilitator to develop a strategy to overcome a genuine management problem.

Technology

Two major initiatives have resulted in much-improved computer facilities for students. The refurbishment of the Macintosh Laboratory with Power PC computers enabled students to use the latest software for their projects. Most students are now using Internet and e-mail as normal tools of research, thanks to our internal network. The plan is to eventually link up all classrooms in the School. In the Australian Computing Competition Adam Eijdenberg and Christopher Line combined to become Tasmanian Junior Champions, with Brad Parker, Nick Ellsmore, Robert Howard, Tim Pitman, Nick Sonneveld, James Murdoch, and Arthur Pitman gaining Distinctions.

The AMP Australian Economics Competition

Several Grade 12 boys took part in this prestigious competition involving economic theory and general knowledge. On a state basis Tim Brabazon gained 7th place, Robert Cooper 9th, and Mathew Torenius 12th.

Marketing

As most parents are now aware, the School released several products this year to celebrate the many outstanding aspects of the School's program. Two of these are This School, a photographic essay of a year in the life of the School, and Adeste Fideles, an outstanding compact disc of Christmas carols, sung by the Choir of the Chapel of St Thomas and the Choristers of the Cathedral Choir of St David. Grade 9 Commercial Studies and Technology students were directly involved in the marketing of these products. This involved designing the marketing strategies, negotiating with the people concerned, and following through with the appropriate action steps.

Tasmanian Schools Constitutional Convention

English

I wonder how many students have been puzzled by some English teachers re-arranging their classrooms, promoting a variety of collaborative learning activities, and generally moving away from more traditional teaching methods? With the involvement in February of the whole staff in a seminar on different learning styles, and with three English teachers participating in the School's key teacher program, there have been some changes evident. However, we are not abandoning what went on before; we are simply looking at a wider range of approaches to teaching and learning English at Hutchins.

There has been continued emphasis on the product as well as the process in written expression. Pre-tertiary students are aware of the pressures on them in Term 3 as they prepare their writing folios for external assessment in Writers' Workshop, English Literature and English 821C. Developing a variety of writing skills in junior, lower and middle secondary years is immensely important. Also, there are many opportunities for good writers to have their work published. It might be articles for the Hutchins student newspaper, Vivit Post; or material intended for the wider community, such as Letters to the Editor, and reviews of plays, books and films; or state, national and even international writing competitions.

The Hutchins Short Story and Poetry Writing Competitions once again proved that we have an abundance of talent. At Headmaster's Assembly, the judge, Mr Warwick Hadfield, congratulated all the entrants on the quality of their work and stressed the importance of writing with passion and conviction. The winners were Tim Beckett (Senior), Nathan Harris (Intermediate) and Richard Charlton (Junior). Receiving honourable mention were Tim Brabazon and Ali Chaudhry (Senior), Ben Ashby, Stephen Catchpole, Mark Evenhuis, Charles Rayner and Roy Kwan [Intermediate], and James Porter, Jules Faber, Joel Bevin and William Bignall (Junior).

The Poetry Writing competition attracted some very good entries in the Intermediate and Junior Sections but nothing, unfortunately, at the Senior level. Let us hope the current Grades 10 and 11 boys set a new trend next year. The winners were Andrew Greenhill (Intermediate) and Oscar Potter (Junior). Mr Hadfield commended Stephen Kern, Matthew Irons and Marc Borrowman (Intermediate), and Tim Warren, Richard Chopping and Keitaro Yasudo (Junior).

The Poetry and Prose for Performance Competition, co-ordinated again by the indefatigable Miss Jackson, was even more successful in its second year of operation. Mr Mark Nicholson of The Friends' School was full of praise for the finalists in all three sections and congratulated

them on their excellent choice of material. Audiences of parents, teachers and students were thoroughly entertained at the two preliminary evenings and at the finals. The winners were Tim Brabazon (Senior), James Shoobridge (Intermediate) and Timothy Green (Junior). Such is the growing enthusiasm that it is planned to extend the competition into Junior School next year.

This year has seen the start of the Theatre Royal Kulture Vulture scheme, a wonderful incentive to students to see live theatre. It is available to all students from Grades 7 to 12 and this year more than 140 Hutchins students joined up, at minimal cost, to see a variey of top interstate productions at the Theatre Royal. The Faculty hopes to double the School membership next year. The experience of good live theatre can never be overestimated.

Mathematics

At Hutchins we have many talented mathematics students. In May, Simon Binny of Grade 10 won 1st prize in the Intermediate Secion of the Tasmanian Mathematics Competition and the following boys each received Outstanding Awards and a cheque for \$20 in that competiion: Nicholas Brett of Grade 12, Stephen Catchpole and Adam Eijdenberg of Grade 10, Matthew Woolley of Grade 9, James Murdoch, Ben Robinson and Nicholas Starkey of Grade 8, and Andrew Morrisby of Grade 7.

Later in the year Matthew Woolley and Stephen Catchpole experienced further success. Each won a prize in the Australian Mathematics Competiion. William Moase of Grade 10 also won a prize in that comeptition.

In August, five teams, each made up of four of our Grade 9 and 10 boys, took part in a Mathematics Problem Solving Competition against students from other secondary schools. The Hutchins team of William Moase (Captain), Simon Binny, Stephen Catchpole and Adam Eijdenberg won the trophy for first place in that competition.

This year the Mathematical Association of Tasmania conducted a new competition called Mathica. Rather than answer a series of questions, participants in this competition were invited to submit an entry on some aspect of mathematics. Matthew Woolley took out the trophy for the best entry in the Grade 9/10 Section of this competition. His entry was a mathematical analysis of the game of poker.

In October we learnt that William Moase had been invited by the Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee to attend their annual camp in Melbourne in December. This is a rare honour accorded to only 25 students from throughout Australia each year. William was selected on the basis of his performance in a four hour mathematics

Modern Languages

In Indonesian Liz Cromer, Liz Marriott, Annabel Squier, Jason Chuck and Jamie Chung-Gon gained the top results. Based on his fine results in French, Mark Brown has also entered the D'Entrecasteaux Competition.

A first was achieved this year when Toby Peach received the prize for the best pre-tertiary Indonesian result for a non-native speaker. Our congratulations go to him.

Another successful trip to Indonesia was also run during the May-June holidays. Two other staff members, 21 boys and I headed off to Central and Southern Bali and Central Java. Several of the boys were repeat offenders, having accompanied me there in 1994. They in particular noticed the huge difference in lifestyes and customs between mainly Hindu Bali and Moslem Java. The tour to Indonesia was a great success. An article specifically about the trip appears elsewhere in Virtus.

This year Ms Emily Putland joined us from Adelaide to teach Junior and Middle School French and Indonesian.

Last year it was atomic testing by the French at Mururoa Atoll and the issue of self-determination by the East Timorese people of Indonesia. This year Pauline Hanson's comments have sparked what some describe as the 'race debate'. They are all 'healthy' issues that should be debated in a country like ours. There is, however, a huge difference between informed debate and the ill-informed remarks of a bigot. Informed opinion has to be based on knowledge and not fear, spurious arguments and ignorance. One of the underlying principles of our Faculty is to build such knowledge, dispel fear and engender in the pupils a need to form considered arguments. For a country in Australia's geographical position and one which has received peoples from throughout the world for the past 220 years, it is vital that our youth develop an understanding of ways of life different from their own. We are offering boys the opportunity to study different languages and cultures, and to visit the areas whose customs they are learning about. If they take full advantage of this opportunity, we can avoid the insular and xenophobic attitudes that certain sections of our society seem to be offering up in the guise of factual, informed debate.

Music

They played everything from cool to trad, gospel to funk, and entertained an enthusiastic audience of 300odd jazz buffs.

There were some outstanding performances in the House Music competition, particularly in the ensemble section. The overall standard of performance was simply fantastic.

The Orchestra, String Quartet and String Ensemble have quite an extensive repertoire, and continue to perform regularly. They formed the backbone of the orchestra for the Sesquicentenary Concert and are now busy preparing for our Speech Night celebrations. Their performances at concerts throughout the year have been of a particularly high standard, and again enjoyed tremendous success at Hobart and Clarence Eisteddfods

The Treble choir has also continued to impress us with its talent and musical diversity. They won the Rowallan cup at the Hobart Eisteddfod for the third successive year, and will again be one of the featured ensembles at Speech Night.

The Sesquicentenary Concert in July must, however, be the highlight of the year for me. It featured our Orchestra and String Ensemble, as well as stunning performances by the Senior Choir, the String trio and Old Boys, Mark Knoop and Andrew Short. The choral item left everybody speechless. Present and past students, as well as members of the extended Hutchins family came together for a performance of the Schubert Mass in G, which proved to be an event which will not quickly be forgotten by audience or performers. It was an evening of superb music, one that I trust made a very real statement of where we have come to in music at Hutchins.

Physical Education And **Recreational Studies**

New building developments, facility improvements, syllabus upgrades, new staff, increased enrolments, new activities and clubs. This was the year 1996.

The re-development of the gymnasium has created a weights teaching room, toilet, sport store, viewing balcony, faculty office and a human performance laboratory. We could confidently say that we now have facilities that would rank with the best in the state. In 1997 the faculty will be teaching a re-

developed health syllabus, from Grades 7 to 10, within the normal physical education program to futher use these outstanding facilities.

The School has also purchased and renovated the old Masonic Lodge building for infant, primary and middle school classes in dance, movement, ball skills, gymnastics, fencing, table tennis and various other activities, including drama and after school care. Also we have up-graded the tennis courts and now have six super-grass courts that can be used not only for tennis, but for other sports such as hockey and soccer when required.

This year we welcomed Mr Wayne Brown to the faculty. He is a graduate of the University of Tasmania and holds a degree in physical education, health and history. Wayne is an excellent athlete who has represented Australia in under 20 basketball and under 21 men's netball. He has also represented Tasmania in schoolboy baseball, played first grade cricket for Midlands in the NTCA, played CBA basketball for the Launceston Tigers and he has played seconds football for South Launceston in the TFL. Wayne has proved to be a great asset; he is a confident professional within the faculty, he has run the learn-to-swim program and successfully coached basketball and cricket.

Sport Science has again seen record enrolments. Students seem to enjoy the practical application of this subject. A feature of the 11/12 class was the outstanding investigative studies that were completed. Nick McKenzie's investigation, titled, 'That ground conditions will determine to some extent the type and number of injuries sustained through a football match', was an intriguing look into the effect of ground conditions in the causes of injuries, the preventative procedures used by schools and TFL footballers, as well as treatments used by coaches, trainers, doctors and physiotherapists.

The re-development of the gym and weights room has seen an increase in the use of the facilities and the creation of programs to cope with this. The weights club has been running weight loss, strength and conditioning programs for senior students and staff. An activities program has been set up to provide lunch time sports and leadership opportunities for senior boys.

1997 will also see a few administrative changes to the faculty. Mr Hinds will become the faculty co-ordinator for the Junior School and Mr French will take on this role in the Middle School. Mr Brown will co-ordinate the lunchtime activities in the Senior School and Mr Stewart will continue to co-ordinate outdoor education and run the Stephen Hay camp at Southport. My thanks must go to all of the faculty staff for their continued support and hard work.

Outdoor Education

Twenty five outdoor education camps were held in 1996. Although the majority of these were at the Stephen Hay Memorial Campus at Southport, others took place at Woodfield Lodge, Port Arthur and Maria Island. The program was assisted by the tutors or teachers of each group and by our GAP students, Mr Rupert Fleming from England and Mr Matthew Robinson from Wales.

Boys in Grade 3 went to Koonya and examined the Aboriginal and European history of those East Coast promontories, returning three days before the terrible events of the Port Arthur massacre. The coal mines, beaches, caves and ruins of the historic site were visited with Mrs Short's and Mrs Collis' classes.

Grade 4 visited Chauncy Vale to consider the Aboriginal use of that valley and its fine sandstone escarpments. Staying at Harbach's Camp in the Dysart Range, they went with Mr Borchardt and Mr Morrisby to the waterfall and played the most demanding night search games in the bush.

Grade 5s studied caves. Mr Docking's group were able to get right into the serpentine tunnel waterfall in Entrance Cave, but Mrs Knight's class was prevented from doing this by heavy rain in the catchment. Both classes visited Newdegate Cave, the thermal pool and the Ida Bay Railway at Lune River.

Grade 6s went to Maria Island with Mr Woolley, Mr Barrenger, and Mr Herbert, staying in tents or in the old penitentiary at Darlington. They visited Bishop and

Clark, the Fossil Cliffs, the Painted Cliffs, the old cement works and the vineyards. Again history, astronomy and ecology were the main topics, and Mr Barrenger's class had the chance to look closely at the marine park wildlife from behind facemasks and snorkels.

Grade 7 with Mrs Burch and Messrs Addison, Fish, Manning and Hinds walked to Lion Rock on the South Coast, and boys learned to pack, carry and pitch all the equipment needed to camp in up to sixty knot winds, and to cook their meals on Trangia stoves.

Grade 8, in winter, used Southport as their base and travelled into thick bush from there to test skills learned. Navigation was the basic skill at which the camp aimed, and the chances were many to work as team members. Misses Putland, Hogan and Donnelly, and Messrs Lucas, Dear, French, Berndt and Moore struggled through thick cutting-grass and dense forest to follow brilliant young orienteers around routes they had planned the day before.

The Grade 9 camps, with aquatics as their theme, again used Southport. Ably assisted by Mr Richard Leo and Mr Matthew Robinson, boys surfed, windsurfed, sailed, abseiled and bushwalked or kayaked. The camps culminated in whitewater rafting on the Picton River which was in fine condition 1.8 metres above the average height, running so fast groups had to come ashore in the Huon River at Tahune.

Religious Studies

'But how do you tell the difference between a good leader and someone like that man who gassed all those people in the Tokyo subway? Anyway, how do we know Jesus wasn't a fake?' These are the sorts of questions that Grade 7s toss into the ring, usually when one is working frantically to finish off a topic which has no connection with the student's question. Grade 10 students tutored by the demands of a syllabus, have ceased to ask such outrageously bold questions and are much more considerate of their teachers whom they know are struggling to keep afloat in a sea of marking and preparation.

The 11s and 12s, with the prospect of exams looming before them are positively docile - so much so that on occasions their teachers actually ask them such questions as, 'How do you tell the difference between a genuine religious leader and someone like the leader of the Aum Supreme Sect in Japan?' Together, teacher and students struggle towards an answer: 'Well, I wouldn't trust someone who deliberately founds a personality cult,' says someone and, 'I don't see leaders who abuse those who belong to their groups as genuine religious leaders,' says another. 'Great religious leaders in the past, such as Buddha and Jesus, have been completely selfless as far as we can tell,' adds the teacher - 'Oh! So Jim Jones and others like him sort of rule themselves out by their own behaviour?' 'And is it true that some of those great leaders didn't want to be leaders even though people followed them everywhere asking for their advice?'

And so it goes on, until we have a picture of the religious leader as one who is much more than a New Age psychobabbler, or a teacher, or even someone who can levitate for extended periods. Through a dialectical process, teacher and students come to an understanding: the religious leader guides others along the path he has already heroically trodden, and acts as a trustworthy guide, warning his followers of the dangers they will have to face and overcome. Irrespective of the source of the leaders' knowledge, they still see the good in religious paths which are different from their own. No Jim Jones or David Koresh can match these qualities. But how does a teacher get a Grade 5 or Grade 7 class to concentrate long enough to come to such a set of conclusions? It is very hard indeed, because the boys love to hop exuberantly from topic to topic - so sometimes a really satisfying discussion has to wait until some considerable time down the track.

Isobel Huggan shared her hint for living life intensely and taking notice; Agnes Nieunhuizen spoke about favourite authors for teenagers, and Steve and Marion Isham shared The Tasmanian Tiger book and all its puzzles which had the boys poring over and working hard to solve riddles. Groups of boys went to hear John Marsden, Morris Gleitzman, and Graeme Base speak about the ideas they use in books.

Resources

The Nettlefold Library

Information technology has been pursued during 1996, with more internet stations being established in both library areas. Planning in 1997 will include discussion of establishing a CD-ROM server for our growing number of CD-ROM information sources.

Science

Once again, much happened in Hutchins Science. We said a warm welcome to Mr Graham Singleton at the beginning of this year. Mr Singleton took over Mr Starkey's classes whilst he was on long service leave in Term 1. Because of the illness of Mr Millhouse at the end of Term 1, Mr. Singleton stayed on in Term 2. We sincerely thank him for his contributions to Science education during these two terms.

Congratulations to James Jenkins and Nick Starkey (Grade 8), Ian Wilson, Joel Cairns, Michael Ashbolt, and Tim Starkey (Grade 9), Marcus Yong, Stephen Catchpole, Tim Pitman, William Moase, and Zacary Johnston (Grade 10), for gaining high distinctions in the Australian Schools' Science Competition. James Jenkins and Tim Starkey achieved the top marks for all boys in Tasmania. 89 students in Grades 7 to 10 entered the competition, and there were 8 high distinctions, 10 distinctions and 34 credits. 127 boys in Grades 5 and 6 also entered this competition. 29 received credits, 42 received distinctions, and 4 received high distinctions. In Grade 5, David Bennett and Nick Warren received high distinctions, with Nick gaining the top mark for all boys in Tasmania. In Grade 6, Alex Halse-Rogers and Henry Knipe received high distinctions Congratulations go to these boys!

Results in the National Chemistry Quiz were the best ever! 53 out of the 86 boys who entered gained certificates! (There were 29 high distinctions, 17 distinctions and 7 credits amongst our entrants.) The following boys finished in the top 400 entrants from a field of 83,600 Australian participants: Richard Chopping (Grade 8), Chris Halse-Rogers and Miles Thorold-Smith (both Grade 9), and Stephen Catchpole (Grade 10). This is in the top 4% in the nation! Well, done!

In the Chemistry Titration Competition, teams composed of Grades 9/10 boys and Grades 11/12 boys competed against other Tasmanian schools. The Hutchins Teams of Matthew Smith (Grade 9), Tim Whelan (Grade 11), Adrian Harwood (Grade 12) and John Orlowski (Grade 12), Philip Bender (Grade 11) and Mark McKenzie (Grade 12), were successful enough to compete in the National Finals of this competition. (Mark McKenzie was awarded a gold medal in this competition in 1995.) The performance of Matthew Smith is especially creditable, as he is a Grade 9 student. In the National Finals of this competition, Matthew Smith (Grade 9) and Philip Bender (Grade 11) each won a gold medal, whilst Tim Whelan (Grade 11), Adrian Harwood (Grade 12), Mark McKenzie (Grade 12) and John Orlowski (Grade 12) all won silver medals. Special thanks again go to Mr Peter Starkey for organising and coaching the Hutchins teams in this competition, and for running the National Chemistry Quiz.

Shortly before leaving Hutchins, the Headmaster announced that Arthur Pitman (Hutchins Grade 8) had won the C.H.E. Knight Science Scholarship for entry into Grade 9 in 1997. Congratulations to Arthur!

Although some sections of the Tasmanian Science Talent Search have already closed, no results are yet available. There was disappointment with our results for 1995 in this important competition, and we hope for better things this year. Junior School boys have constructed some excellent icy pole stick towers for the Technology Section. We wish them well with their entries. Mr Docking tells me that Grade 6H boys have set up a hydroponics display in their classroom, and that they have been growing lettuces. This year, Grade 6 classes also visited the CSIRO Science Education Centre and participated in a series of hands-on activities. The Hutchins Double Helix Club has met fortnightly throughout the year in the Junior School. There is now an aviary set up in the yard near the Prep. School.

Possibly the Science question of this year is, 'Is there, or has there been, life on Mars?' I am left wondering how it can be inferred from the meteorite found in Antarctica that, not only did it originate from Mars, but the remains of micro-organisms it contained could only have come from Mars. I wonder, too, if the geology of Mars is unique in some aspect, and what is unique about the interior of the meteorite.

Athletics
